

Bonnie's Head For No. 10--And AP Poll Has 'em 9th!

Kent Is Wednesday -- Then, It's Calvin

Larry Weise's trying his best to play them one-at-a-time.

His Bonnies have different ideas, however. St. Bonaventure University's unbeaten basketball troupe left today for Kent, Ohio, and Wednesday's meeting with Kent State. But the Bonnies have only one game in mind — Saturday's sellout clash at the University Center with Calvin Murphy and Niagara University.

You could sense that the Bonnies, now 9-0, had other things on their minds last Saturday night in that 81-69 win over Baldwin-Wallace. A crowd of 5,320, largest of the season,

saw the mistake-prone Bonnies guilty of 20 turnovers. Yet, they do the job they have to do." That's win — and comfort-ably.

For the first time this season Weise abandoned his basic zone defense and went with a man-for-man the second half. In the Toledo game when the Bonnies got behind Weise switched to a man defense.

"When you play a zone, they control the ball more, you are waiting for them to do something. In a man-for-man, you force the play, you stir things up a little. I think it did." To this degree: Bona led at halftime, 43-34. But with 18:09 gone, in the second half, the Bonnies had blitzed their way to a commanding 51-34 edge. Later it was 56-40, with Big Bob Lanier the No. 1 gun. The 6-11 sophomore had nine points in that spurge.

CLARK EXPLAINS

Baldwin-Wallace coach Bill Clark also discussed the defensive switch. "They came out and we watched for awhile. It took a little time to adjust. But I was pleased," he added, "that we forced them out of their favorite defense. That's the way I read the situation."

Clark, the onetime Mansfield coach of Otto-Eldred's Jim Kinsler, Coudersport's Lee Felsburg and Austin's Jim Turner, felt that Billy Butler damaged his club the most. "He did the job against us. Of course, with his cleverness, he's going to get the shots. He's good, with fine body control," Clark added.

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Bona Vaults To 9th Spot

The old year tournaments and the new year Associated Press poll brought a revamping of college basketball's Top Ten and its unbeaten today except at the top where, year out, year in, UCLA and Houston remain 1-2.

The overpowering Bruins, 8-0, collected 36 first place votes and 369 points and the Cougars, 13-0, got the other No. 1 vote and 320 points as they strengthened their clique at the top with tournament victories.

The voting is done by sports writers and sportscasters throughout the country on a basis of 10 points for first place, nine for second, etc.

UCLA won its own Los Angeles Classic for the sixth straight time Saturday after routs over Minnesota, St. Louis and Wyoming for 42 consecutive triumphs. The Bruins topped Wyoming 104-75 in the title game. Houston, less impressive, bounced Bradley, Marquette and then edged North Texas State 45-43 for the Rainbow Classic title in Honolulu.

Few changes are expected until the two powerhouses collided in Houston's Astrodome Jan. 20.

But behind them, the teams are bouncing about like a basketball as three new teams entered the Top Ten, all unbeaten, and three of last week's ranking clubs dropped from the undefeated list.

Davidson, ranked eighth before losing to Vanderbilt 80-67 in the Sugar Bowl final Saturday, and Boston College, No. 10 before losing twice in the Holiday Festival in New York, also dropped from the Top Ten.

North Carolina, 7-1, won the Far West Tournament with a 68-61 victory over Oregon Saturday and replaced Indiana in the third spot, a jump from fifth.

27 Rebounds For Lanier In 8th Win

(Dec. 22, University Center)

Bob Lanier's All-American bandwagon picked up another believer Friday night.

The 6-11, 265-pound sophomore added still another coach to the growing list of knowledgeable basketball experts, who know the genuine thing when they see it.

Loyola of Baltimore lost, 94-78, to St. Bona last night before 5,246 fans in the University Center.

AND ONCE again it was Lanier who drew the plaudits of the opposing coach. Ed Doherty of Loyola resorted to a 1-3-1 zone defense in an effort to check the big guy. It didn't work. Lanier had 34 points and 27 rebounds. That last figure is a new Bona mark erasing the old standard of 23 held by Tom Smith and John Conners and, that's why it's to be the season-long, one statistic after another going down the drain.

"That was the only way we could defend Lanier," explained Doherty. "If we had played him man-for-man, he would have gone over us all night. As it was, he did it many times. He's tough."

Doherty added: "For a sophomore, I'd say he's better than any big man I've seen. He's better than Wally Dukes (the one-time Seton Hall All-American). I played against Dukes, and he was the best big fellow on the East Coast until now."

Lanier, according to Doherty, "looks like he could play the corner he's so smooth. I've never seen a big guy with that soft touch. He can go out 10-15 feet and still hit. He has good body control and he stays up there."

Maravich Leads Again, Murphy Averages 45.0

Niagara University's celebrated Calvin Murphy is no longer No. 1.

The super soph's lead in the collegiate basketball scoring statistics vanished in recent days, thanks to some hot-shooting by Louisiana State's Pistol Pete Maravich.

Maravich ran in 58 points in his last game to up his seven-game average to an even 47 points. He has 129 field goals and 71 free throws for 329 points.

Murphy stands at second place with 101 field goals and 68 free throws adding up to an even 45 point average for six games.
