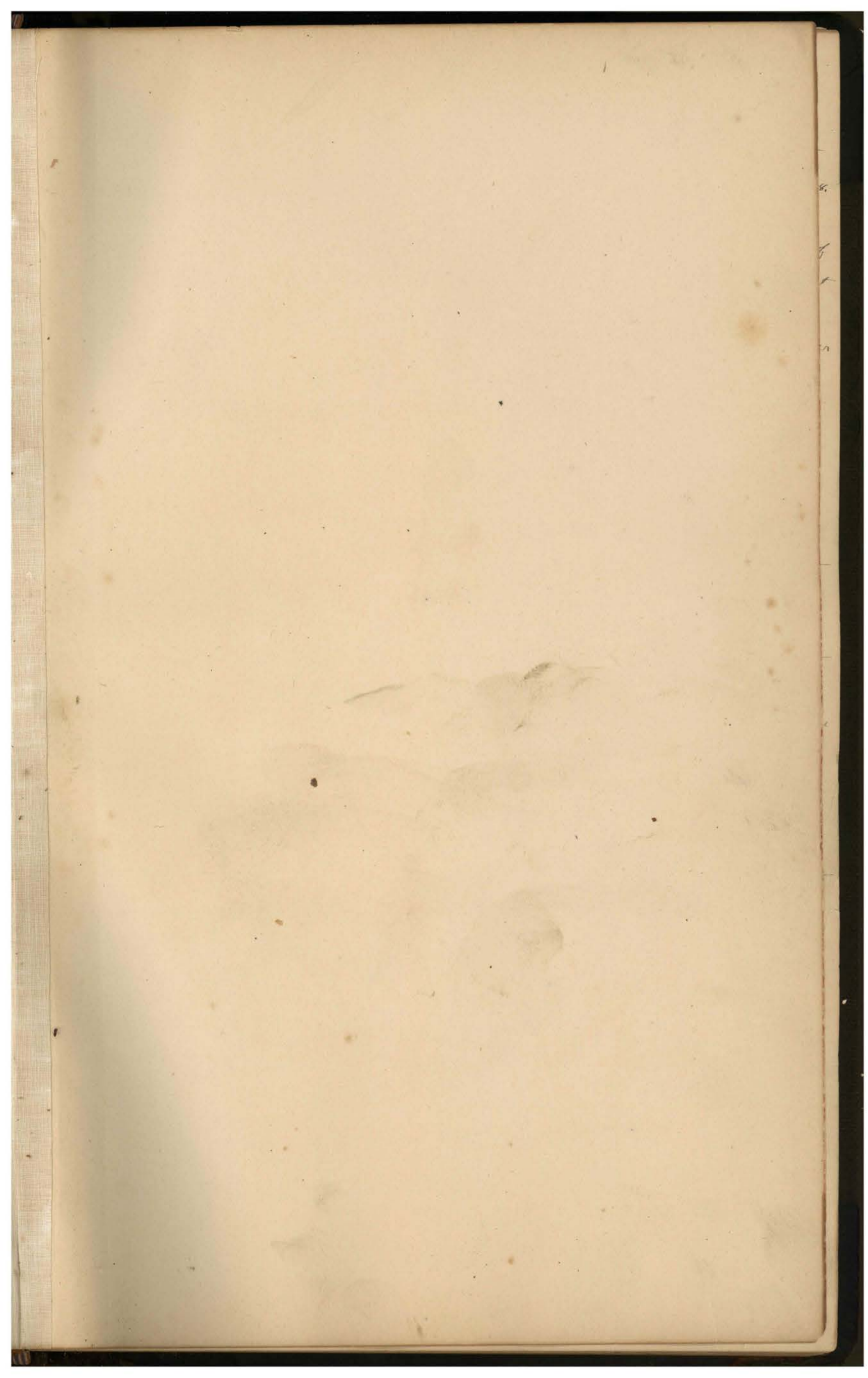
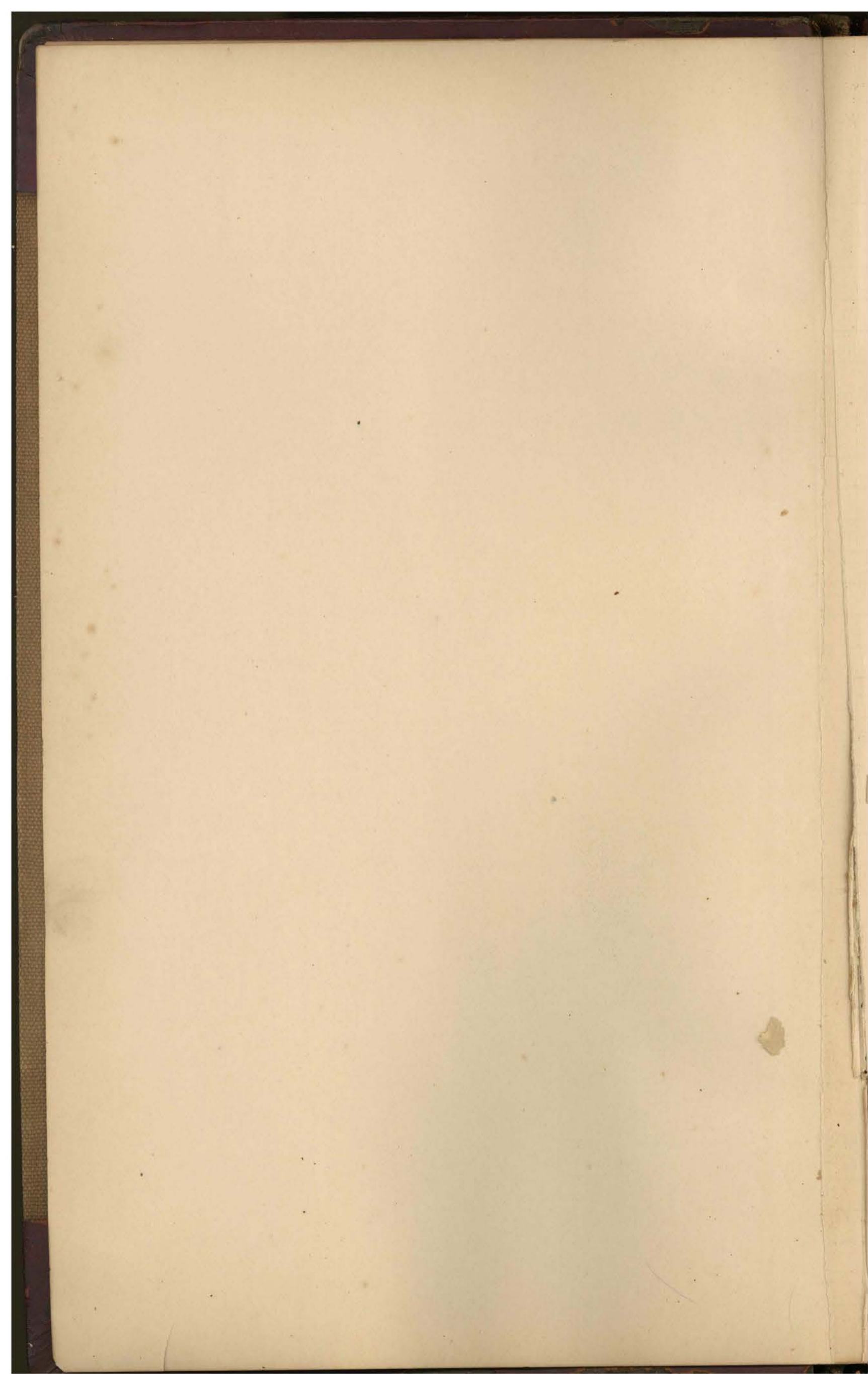

By Laws adopted at James town N.Y. Sept 13th 1887. and
 Endorsed by the members of the 154th N.Y. V. at their first
 Annual Reunion held at Elliecuttville N.Y. Aug 30th and 31st 1888.

We the Survivors of the 154th N.Y. V. are desirous of
 forming a permanent Organization of the Regiment
 and to hold a Reunion of the Regt Each year in
 the future. We therefore this 13th day of September
 1887. at James town N.Y. accept the following By
 Laws. to govern the organization.

- 1 The name of this association shall be the Veteran
 Association of the 154th New York Volunteers.
 - 2 The Officers of the Association shall be a President,
 Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer, also an
 Executive Committee of ten to consist of one
 member from each Company in the Regiment.
 - 3 The Officers and Executive Committee shall hold office
 for one year, or until their successors are
 Elected.
 - 4 It shall be the duty of the officers, by and with
 the advice of the Executive Committee to appoint
 the time and place of holding the Annual Reunions
 and to make all necessary arrangements for
 the same.

at a meeting of the Officers and Executive Committee held at Salamanca N.Y. May 7th 1892. there were present
 President: J. R. Aldrich, Vice President J. A. Andrews, Treasurer, James Frink, Executive Committee E. D. Ames, Lerra Burcher, Moses Bowen, J. O. Spencer, Samuel Shirley, and several members of the Association. It was decided to hold a joint meeting with the Committee of the 64th N.Y. Association, which resulted in an agreement to hold a Reunion of the two associations at Salamanca N.Y. June 28th and 29th 1892.

The reunion of the veterans of Cattaraugus county struck a bad streak of weather Wednesday and yesterday, which very materially interfered with the pleasure of the occasion. Still there was a very fair attendance, and the exercises at the opera house were of much interest. The 64th headquarters were at the Dudley, the 37th and 154th at the Keating, and the Sons of Veterans at the Avenue House. Of the 64th there were registered 71, of the 37th 27, and of the 154th 126.

The Cattaraugus martial band furnished good old-fashioned music in liberal quantities, much to the enjoyment of the veterans, and on Wednesday evening Priggs' cornet band, a new organization of this city, contributed some of their best selections. The boys were warmly applauded.

The platform exercises of the reunion opened at the opera house at 1:30 p. m. Wednesday with Col. Fassett of the 64th acting as chairman. The Salamanca Glee Club, consisting of Mrs. Wait, Mrs. Cobb, Mr. Hoag and Mr. Doty, sang "America." Hon. H. Ansley gave an address of welcome on behalf of the citizens of Salamanca. This address had been assigned to another, who was unable to be present, but Mr. Ansley is always ready and filled the vacancy with satisfaction to all concerned. When the Glee Club had sung "One Thousand Years" Comrade N. A. Chaffe of the 154th responded to the address of welcome in a manner to win the hearty plaudits of the audience. The Glee Club sang "Hurrah for the Flag," as a trio, and Mrs. G. N. Shedd gave a recitation, paying an eloquent tribute to the common soldiers, on whom fell the brunt of the war in field and camp. The recitation was given in Mrs. Shedd's best style, and was appreciated by the veterans. This closed the afternoon session.

The evening session opened at 8 o'clock with a selection from Priggs' band. The Glee Club sang "Columbia, the Gem of the Ocean," and then Comrade J. O. Spencer of the 37th gave a brief sketch of the battle record of that regiment. Two companies, H. and I., were raised in Cattaraugus county, and were the first from this county to offer their services in defence of the Union. The 37th participated in the peninsular campaign, was in the battles at Yorktown, Williamsburg, Fair Oaks, Seven Pines and Malvern Hill, was in the second Bull Run battles, the battle of

Antietam, Fredericksburg and Chancellorsville. The two years term of service expired just before the latter battle, but the regiment voluntarily remained and took a creditable part in that memorable contest. Mr. Spencer read from McClellan's memoirs where honorable mention was made of the 37th's record in the battles while he was commander of the army.

At the close of Comrade Spencer's interesting address Miss Aldrich of Ellicottville recited "The Ride of Brave Jennie McNeal," receiving a storm of applause as she closed. The Glee Club then sang "The Army Bean." This struck the veterans in a tender spot and the singers were encored.

Comrade T. R. Aldrich of the 154th gave a very interesting description of the 154th in the battle of Chancellorsville. This was the first engagement of the 154th, and through lack of judgment on the part of the corps commander, the division in which it was placed was unexpectedly struck in the rear by Stonewall Jackson and routed with much loss. The 154th, however, helped hold the rebels in check until troops could be got in position to beat back the rebel forces. Comrade Aldrich also read a letter of greeting and regret from Comrade J. F. Wellman of the 154th, now residing in Lawrence, Kansas.

Comrade R. R. Crowley read an original poem appropriate to the occasion written by Comrade Charles Klock of the 64th, now residing in Dunkirk.

Capt. Wm. L. Ross of Boston, Mass., of the 64th, spoke of the achievements of that organization, and read its record as given by the *National Tribune*, which showed it to be one of the 300 fighting regiments of the war of the rebellion. Capt. Ross boldly declared that the 64th participated in more engagements than any other infantry regiment in the Union service in that war, and justly said Cattaraugus county has reason to be proud of its brilliant record.

The evening session closed with "Jake Schneider's Ride" recited by A. W. Ferrin, and "Marching through Georgia," led by Mr. Doty, the audience joining in the chorus.

Yesterday forenoon was given up to the 64th Regiment. A business meeting was held at which the following officers were elected: President, Col. L. H. Fassett, of Franklin, Pa.; secretary and

treasurer, Capt. J. M. Pettitt, of Fredonia, N. Y. Executive committee, representing each company: E. T. McCutcheon, Co. A.; R. R. Crowley, Co. B.; Joseph Charlesworth, Co. C.; J. H. Kingsbury, Co. D.; Wm. Glenney, Co. E.; H. H. French, Co. F.; W. L. Ross, Co. G.; B. C. Ketchum, Co. H.; Wm. Spraker, Co. I.; E. W. Clark, Co. K. Col. T. J. Parker, field officer; Dr. G. W. Barr, medical staff.

The Glee Club sang "Tramp, Tramp, the boys are marching," after which Comrade J. G. Johnson read a paper explaining the change of the 64th Regiment from a state militia organization to a Union volunteer organization, and Comrade R. R. Crowley read a paper describing the military experiences of the 64th from Yorktown to and including Fair Oaks. The morning session closed with the "Trumpet Song" by the Glee Club.

Yesterday afternoon the 154th held a business meeting at which the old officers were re-elected as follows: T. R. Aldrich, president; J. A. Andrews, vice president; W. C. Clark, secretary; James Frink, treasurer. The executive committee representing each company we did not get.

The Cattaraugus County Veteran Association also held a business meeting at which was elected the following officers: J. O. Spencer, president; Joseph Charlesworth, vice president; T. R. Aldrich, secretary; Chas. B. Potter, treas.; P. A. Markham, chaplain.

The chairman of the meeting, T. R. Aldrich, was authorized to appoint an executive committee of one from each town in the county.

The time and place of holding the next reunion was left with the officers and executive committee.

The public exercises of the afternoon opened with a prayer by the Rev. M. L. Dalton, and a song by the Glee Club. Miss Mena Spencer of West Salamanca recited "Whispering Bill" in a manner very creditable to one of her years, and then Comrade W. W. Henry gave some reminiscences of the 64th experiences, and Comrade Charles Groat of the 154th related how he tried to make biscuits for Captain Vedder but signally failed.

Miss Jennie Henry of Little Valley gave a recitation with musical accompaniment by Miss Kenyon, which was very fine indeed.

The veterans voted hearty thanks to the Glee Club, the bands, the ladies who had given recitations, etc. The Glee Club sang "The Star Spangled Banner," and the reunion was brought to a close.

Survivors of the 154th Regiment and
Companies H and I of the 37th
Regiment, New York Volun-
teers, Met and Talked
Over Old Times.

Ellicottville was dressed in its gayest attire last Friday for the annual reunion of the Veteran's Association of the 154th regiment and companies H. and I of the 37th regiment, New York Volunteers. These regiments were recruited in Cattaraugus and Chautauqua counties, and participated in some of the hottest battles of the civil war.

The association of the 154th regiment was organized at Jamestown September 13, 1887, largely through the efforts of Commander T. R. Aldrich of Ellicottville Post, G. A. R. The first officers were: President, T. R. Aldrich; vice president, Wm. Callahan, Jamestown; secretary, Alexander Bird, Ellicottville; treasurer, W. S. Cameran, Jamestown, and an executive committee of ten. The first reunion was held at Ellicottville the following year, when the two companies of the 37th regiment were added. Though there have been many deaths during the twelve years of the association's existence, it still has a membership of nearly 400, though much of it is pretty well scattered over the country.

Over one hundred of the veterans attended the reunion at Ellicottville Friday. As the gray old warriors in their blue coats marched up the main street with flags flying and bands playing they were received with hearty cheers by the crowds that lined the street. Hundreds had come in from the country side to do honor to the veterans. Every business place and nearly every residence in the village was gaily decorated with flags and bunting. The weather was perfect and for the time the veterans seemed to renew their youth. It did one's heart good to see the pleasure they took in again meeting old comrades, and their high spirits generally.

The air was filled with martial music furnished by the Great Valley brass band and Smith's fife and drum corps of Yorkshire. Again were heard all the great national airs that proved such an inspiration and helped to save the Union during the dark days of the civil war.

At noon a substantial free dinner was served to the veterans and their families by the ladies of Ellicottville.

Long tables were spread in a vacant store in the Reed block, and the old soldiers did full justice to the repast.

The reunion exercises were held in the old court house. Among those seated on the stage were J. A. Andrews and J. O. Spencer of Salamanca. The meeting was called to order by Mr. Aldrich, who introduced the president of the association, W. W. Pemberton of Killbuck. He made a few appropriate remarks, the band played "Rally Round the Flag," the Rev. Mr. Remington offered prayer, and a male quartet sang "Marching Through Georgia." Then the speakers were introduced. Hon. C. P. Vedder and E. B. Vreeland were expected to deliver the principal addresses, but for some unexplained reason neither of them put in an ap-

pearance. However, their places were ably filled by the Hon. W. G. Laidlaw of Ellicottville and J. O. Spencer of Salamanca.

Mr. Laidlaw delivered a most eloquent and inspiring address. His theme was the Guiding Hand of the Almighty in the Affairs of Nations. He began by describing the political situation before the war, showing how the anti-slavery agitation had embittered the south, until the integrity of the union was threatened. But even after the war began, it was not the purpose of the Federal government to abolish slavery; the one idea was the preservation of the union. But the Almighty has a law which he applies to nations—the law of necessity. There came a time when the north seemed exhausted; when the boys would no longer volunteer. Then came in the law of necessity. The colored man was given a musket and sent to the front. After he had fought for his country he could not be sent back to slavery. Moreover, it was folly to leave the colored man on the southern plantations raising provisions for the confederate armies. And so it became absolutely necessary to issue that

greatest of all documents, the Emancipation Proclamations, and this country became for the first time in fact a land of freedom.

It takes a long time to get a philosophy into men. You have to feed spellingbook and school maam for generations. They need it down south now. A negro lynching is a public holiday. When the cup of their abominations gets full enough the Almighty will again apply the law of necessity to them.

The great benefits secured by the civil war and the great men it produced were dwelt upon by the speaker, and then he contrasted that struggle with the recent Spanish war. The soldiers in that war, he said, should not compare themselves with the "boys of '61." The issue was not the same. If we won or lost it was of no importance, compared with the struggle for a national existence in the sixties. San Wan wouldn't have been a skirmish with pickets in '61.

In the Spanish war Mr. Laidlaw thought the Almighty had applied the same law of necessity. The corruption and cruelty of the Spaniards in Cuba, filled up their cup of abominations, and it had to be purged. In spite of its reluctance to undertake the task, this government was finally compelled to act. Now we should send some school maams and spelling books to Cuba, and then let each man work out his own salvation. That is all any government should do—let each man have what he can produce, and extend help when needed.

As to the Phillipine war, Mr. Laidlaw said he had been too busy to make up his mind as to the rights of the matter. He would have to leave it to his friend Spencer and to Providence. In conclusion he extended a hearty welcome to the visiting veterans on behalf of the people of Ellicottville.

After music by the drum corps, the quartet sang "Rally Round the Flag," and then Mr. Spencer was introduced. He spoke eloquently of the patriotism displayed by the people of Ellicottville during the civil war, and the respect and esteem they have ever since shown for the veterans. He then compared some aspects of the civil war with the recent Spanish imbroglio. Lincoln raised an army of over a million men, and took care of them. None starved to death except in southern prison pens. Now after 35 years of prosperity the country seems unable to care for an army of 50,000 without feeding them on rotten meat and starving them to death in practice camps.

The speaker asked why, when Grant's monument was unveiled, the veterans of the civil war were forced to march in the rear of parade, and also why they were treated the same way in the recent Dewey parade. Why were Department commander Kay and National Commander Shaw ignored. He thought a rebel army had been in front there would have been no objection to the veterans heading the line.

When the civil war broke out the government was glad to get veterans of the Mexican war for officers and profit by their experience. Why were veterans of the civil war refused commissions in the late Spanish war, and young sons of somebodies with political pulls but no experience appointed? The administration even made a ruling that veterans enlisting in the late war would lose their pensions.

He thought a reform should be made in one feature of the national encampments. Instead of erecting fine stands in which the people could sit and watch the old veterans march past, they should be given the seats and the people should do the marching. Of one thing he was sure: When all get into the Golden City, the rest of the crowd will have a good time trying to march ahead of the veterans.

After some more music by the band, the Rev. C. C. Eggleston of Elton was introduced. He spoke of the pleasure it gave him to meet his old comrades at the reunions, and of the love he felt for all of them. He told of his service in the civil war, and of his being wounded in one of the big battles. His comrades could testify to his devotion as a soldier and the service he had rendered. He had been recommended for a pension and his claim was now fifteen years old. He had not received one penny, and he thought he had a right to be indignant.

The speakers were all heartily applauded by the immense audience, and their criticisms of the present administration seemed to evoke the sympathy of all present.

After singing "America," the

audience was dismissed and a business session was held. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year:

THE 154TH REUNION.

A HAPPY GATHERING OF COM-
 RADES IN ELLICOTTVILLE,
 FRIDAY, AUG. 22.

The surviving members of the 154th regiment, with other comrades, have met once more with hearty handshake and greeting, and recalled, with mingled joy and sadness, the stirring events of the sixties, when they were engaged in the defense of home and country. The veterans cannot march as they once could; the vigor of youth has fled, the eye less keen, the step less firm, while whitening hair and beard tell the story of the ravages that Father Time has made among the once strong "brave boys in blue." Each year their ranks grow less in numbers, comrades answering to the last roll call. Some of those who were here, this year, will be missed from future gatherings, but they will not be forgotten. The time of sectional strife and turmoil has passed, war's alarms are no longer heard, a new generation has arisen. But so long as the nation endures, the deeds of the Union veterans of 1861-5 will be recounted with pride; so long as one comrade survives he will be honored by a grateful people.

FOUGHT THEIR BATTLES OVER

Veterans Gathered Round the Camp Fire on Tuesday.

Reunion of the 154th and Companies I and H, 37th Regiment, Was a Grand Success — Splendid Speeches by Whipple, Cole and Others. A Gala Day.

Perfect weather subscribed to the fund of enjoyment that had been stored up in honor of the veterans of the 154th and Companies I and H; 37th New York volunteers, for their annual reunion on Tuesday, and the gray-haired warriors in memory again participated in the triumphs of the 60's with a zest that proved an inspiration to all with whom they came in contact.

Up to noon and even later incoming trains brought delegations from a distance, who were escorted to headquarters at city hall, where, after registering, they were provided with badges and tickets for dinner, which was served by the women of the Relief Corps at their headquarters in the Nies block.

Business places about the village were generously decorated in honor of the veterans and many private dwellings displayed the natural tricolors.

Shortly after 2 p. m. nearly 100 old soldiers were formed in marching order by Marshal George N. Shedd and paraded through Main street behind the Citizens band which discoursed patriotic and popular airs. Although the weather was perfect, there was a slight chill in the air, and it was deemed advisable to hold the exercises of the day in the city hall, where the veterans and many citizens assembled immediately after the parade.

The meeting was called to order about 2:45 by A. G. Park of Wesley, N. Y., president of the association, and the choir, in charge of Mrs. E. R. Phillips, rendered "America" in pleasing style, the audience joining in the singing.

After a fervent invocation by Chaplain Trippe, James O. Spencer delivered a brief address of welcome, which was responded to in a patriotic and earnest address by Comrade N. A. Chaffee, who grew eloquent in his review of the past and prophecies of the future.

Following another musical selection, J. Spencer Whipple read the principal address of the day which was characteristically eloquent and forceful. The speaker gave a rapid but comprehensive review of the military history of the nation and pointed out the monumental service which the soldiers of the north had performed for their country in making the Union indissoluble and wiping out the awful curse of human slavery. Mr. Whipple pointed out that defeat would have rendered impossible the unprecedented advancement which this nation has made in the past 40 years and closed his address with the following peroration:

"To you who cut your names high on the walls of fame all honor is due. May you live many years to meet in the valley's shade of towering trees, where soft winds blow and where running water makes sweet music while you rest. Let hand grasp hand in warmer clasp, and eyes once bright with the courage born of battle, often meet and hearts grown old with

weary waiting and watching, throb again as comrades come and tell the story of battle days. It is not long until for you the last bugle will have sounded and the last roll call be made; yet, even until the time when the last man goes, may those who have since been born pay you all respect and all honor."

The evening campfire was in charge of James O. Spencer. After music and prayer by the chaplain, Mr. Spencer made a few remarks and told a story, and was followed by District Attorney George W. Cole, who spoke with enthusiasm, expressing his admiration for the heroes of the war, and emphasizing in particular his belief that next in importance to their services in saving of the Union had been the example set by the veterans of the war in showing respect for the laws of the country and inspiring a love of law and liberty in the younger generation. Mr. Cole's address was replete with amusing anecdotes and was received with strong evidences of approval.

Marvin Cole of Machias spoke at some length on topics nearest the heart of the soldier, and was followed briefly by Editor H. A. Parker of the News, Matthew Weber of the Republican and John Groat.

The musical numbers reflected much credit upon the members of the improvised choir, "Just Break the News to Mother," by Miss Mattie Stevens, being especially pleasing in sentiment and rendition.

The officers and executive committee will arrange the time and place of the next reunion at a future time.

FOUGHT THEIR BATTLES OVER

Veterans Gathered Round the Camp Fire on Tuesday.

Reunion of the 154th and Companies I and H, 37th Regiment, Was a Grand Success—Splendid Speeches by Whipple, Cole and Others. A Gala Day.

Perfect weather subscribed to the fund of enjoyment that had been stored up in honor of the veterans of the 154th and Companies I and H, 37th New York volunteers, for their annual reunion on Tuesday, and the gray-haired warriors in memory again participated in the triumphs of the 60's with a zest that proved an inspiration to all with whom they came in contact.

Up to noon and even later incoming trains brought delegations from a distance, who were escorted to headquarters at city hall, where, after registering, they were provided with badges and tickets for dinner, which was served by the women of the Relief Corps at their headquarters in the Nies block.

Business places about the village were generously decorated in honor of the veterans and many private dwellings displayed the natural tricolors.

Shortly after 2 p. m. nearly 100 old soldiers were formed in marching order by Marshal George N. Shedd and paraded through Main street behind the Citizens band which discoursed patriotic and popular airs. Although the weather was perfect, there was a slight chill in the air, and it was deemed advisable to hold the exercises of the day in the city hall, where the veterans and many citizens assembled immediately after the parade.

The meeting was called to order about 2:45 by A. G. Park of Wesley, N. Y., president of the association, and the choir, in charge of Mrs. E. R. Phillips, rendered "America" in pleasing style, the audience joining in the singing.

After a fervent invocation by Chaplain Trippe, James O. Spencer delivered a brief address of welcome, which was responded to in a patriotic and earnest address by Comrade N. A. Chaffee, who grew eloquent in his review of the past and prophecies of the future.

Following another musical selection, J. Spencer Whipple read the principal address of the day which was characteristically eloquent and forceful. The speaker gave a rapid but comprehensive review of the military history of the nation and pointed out the monumental service which the soldiers of the north had performed for their country in making the Union indissoluble and wiping out the awful curse of human slavery. Mr. Whipple pointed out that defeat would have rendered impossible the unprecedented advancement which this nation has made in the past 40 years and closed his address with the following peroration:

"To you who cut your names high on the walls of fame all honor is due. May you live many years to meet in the valley's shade of towering trees, where soft winds blow and where running water makes sweet music while you rest. Let hand grasp hand in warmer clasp, and eyes once bright with the courage born of battle, often meet and hearts grown old with

weary waiting and watching, throb again as comrades come and tell the story of battle days. It is not long until for you the last bugle will have sounded and the last roll call be made; yet, even until the time when the last man goes, may those who have since been born pay you all respect and all honor."

Cole, who spoke with enthusiasm, expressing his admiration for the heroes of the war, and emphasizing in particular his belief that next in importance to their services in saving of the Union had been the example set by the veterans of the war in showing respect for the laws of the country and inspiring a love of law and liberty in the younger generation. Mr. Cole's address was replete with amusing anecdotes and was received with strong evidences of approval.

Marvin Cole of Machias spoke at some length on topics nearest the heart of the soldier, and was followed briefly by Editor H. A. Parker of the News, Matthew Weber of the Republican and John Groat.

The musical numbers reflected much credit upon the members of the improvised choir, "Just Break the News to Mother," by Miss Mattie Stevens, being especially pleasing in sentiment and rendition.

He said the only fight he wanted to get in was the first one, but he would have given all the world, if it had belonged to him to have been in some green pasture lot or shady wood in old Cattaraugus, that afternoon. He ended with a glowing tribute to the late Captain B. A. Johnston, "who never turned his back on the enemy or on a friend."

The glee club, Miss Jessie Bird, Miss Lois H. Bryant, Wallace Bryant, and Bert Cohen, sang "Tenting on the Old Camp Ground," followed by a recitation by Miss Stebbins.

Comrade J. O. Spencer of Salamanca made a short address. He also spoke of the kind treatment always accorded the veterans by Ellicottville, and of their pleasure in coming to Ellicottville. NEARLY 300 VETERANS

ATTENDED RE-UNION HERE LAST FRIDAY

Officers Elected—Resolutions Adopted, Etc.

With mingled feelings of joy and sorrow—happy in the knowledge that their efforts were not in vain, proud of and glorying in the splendid country which they helped to save, glad to meet again, but mourning the loss of many, many a comrade—fully 300 of the surviving members of the 9th cavalry and the 154th regiment and companies I and H of the 37th infantry, assembled in Salamanca Friday to renew old acquaintances, keep up their organization and retell their experiences in the great civil war.

The reunion this year proved a distinct success. The veterans began arriving Thursday evening, and the morning trains brought the others. R. as the greatest distinction a man could possess in the United States, dwelling at some length upon its significance, and concluded with a discussion of the things that go to constitute success, saying in part:

"The man who cares nothing for the opinion of his fellows is likely to be a dangerous man to have in the community. All men want to be successful. But what constitutes success? Have the lives of the old soldiers gathered here today been successful?"

"Some people think that riches mean success; but some of the most miserable and fruitless lives that have ever been lived are those of men who have been consumed by the notion that there is nothing worth while in the world except to make money. Any man can get rich who will set out to get hold of every penny he can lay his hands on and then save it. Others think that to hold high office means success; but that depends entirely on how the duties appertaining to the office are performed. High office may bring great honor, or it may bring the deepest disgrace.

"I imagine that on the pages of the great book of life success may be rated differently than it sometimes is among men. The men and women who are living clean, quiet, peaceful lives, doing their duty from day to

day, whose names, perhaps, are never seen in the newspapers and who are not known outside of the community in which they live, will hold places of honor on the pages of that book. And who among us has done more for mankind than the soldiers who went out to serve their country, who saved the nation's life, who struck the shackles from four millions of slaves, who declared that government by the people should not perish among men?"

J. O. Spencer and Capt. Robertson responded briefly to the address of welcome on behalf of the veterans. Commodore P. Vedder of Ellicottville delivered an eloquent address, Mrs. E. R. Phillips, Mrs. W. C. Banton, Mrs. H. R. Finch, F. W. Gardner and Matthew Weber sang, and the 154th and 37th then held their business meeting.

At the camp fire that evening interesting talks were given by several of the veterans. Capt. Lapham spoke of the helpfulness of the reunions. Frank Baker, superintendent of the zoological gardens at Washington, showed how the sharing of the vicissitudes of months of campaigning had developed the strong bonds of friendship among the old soldiers—bonds the strength of which the rising generation could have little conception of—and spoke at some length of the need for magnanimity on the part of the North towards the South. Rev. M. F. Trippe spoke on the great strides which the country has made since the civil war, particularly the development of brotherly feeling, the breaking down of the old bitter partisanship, and the setting up of new

and higher ideals of citizenship. Capt. Cheney read a letter from Senator Vincent of Kansas expressing his regret at his inability present, and a letter was also read from Col. G. W. Bentley, in which he made interesting comparisons between the great battles of the civil war and the engagements of other wars of modern times.

Just prior to adjournment the veterans of the 9th adopted resolutions deploring the death of "comrades who had made brilliant records in the history of the association," and extending sympathy to the families; and expressing "heartly appreciation of the generous hospitality extended by the citizens of Salamanca."

"Among the many who have contributed by their kindly services to the success of our meeting, thanks are especially due to Comrade C. W. Terry in his official capacity as president of the village, to Comrade J. O. Spencer for the use of his skating rink for our meetings, and to Comrades M. M. Fay and Philo Gates and other members of Sherwood Post for their active interest in promoting the comfort of all visiting comrades."

Headquarters 154th N. Y. Vols.

To the surviving veterans of the 154th Regt. of N. Y. Volunteers. By an act of the New York legislature, chapter 513 laws of 1910, provision was made for the free transportation of 564 of the survivors of the 11th and 12th army corps that participated in the campaigns and military operations about Chattanooga, October and November, 1863, to attend the dedication of the New York state central historical memorial, erected by the state on Lookout Mountain, Tenn.

The commission has fixed, Tuesday, Nov. 15, 1910, as the date of ceremonies of dedication. Under the distribution fixed by the commission, 30 of the survivors of the 154th will be entitled to free transportation.

OLD VETERANS MEET ONCE MORE.

Survivors of 154th and Cos. I & H, 37th, in Reunion Here.

(Salamanca Press, Sept. 7)

Fifty years ago this summer the 154th Regiment, New York Volunteers, and Companies I and H of the 37th Regiment, including in their ranks a goodly portion of the flower of the youth of Cattaraugus county, marched away for Southern battlefields in defense of the Union and the nation's honor, there to win everlasting fame as a part of the great army of the "Boys in Blue" in one of the greatest conflicts humanity has known. Today the remnant of these commands, half a century older; battle-scarred and silver-haired with many hands that formerly grasped the musket or wielded the sword clasping a supporting cane, gathered in Salamanca to the number of about 100 for their annual reunion and marched along Main street with faltering steps but well-kept lines to the Baptist church where the exercises of the day are being held this afternoon.

Yet infirm as many of them appeared, it was the seeming youth and not the age of the grim fighters that impressed those who mingled with them. As they talked over the old days and scenes and recalled the exciting experiences of war times, the curtain of the years was lifted and they were again the "boys of '61," happy at the opportunity to extend greetings to comrades and pleased at the heartiness with which they were welcomed by the people of Salamanca.

The visiting veterans were met at the railroad station by a delegation from Sherwood Post and escorted to the post headquarters, where they registered and received badges. FOUGHT THEIR BATTLES OVER

Veterans Gathered Round the Camp Fire on Tuesday.

Reunion of the 154th and Companies I and H, 37th Regiment, Was a Grand Success — Splendid Speeches by Whipple, Cole and Others. A Gala Day.

Perfect weather subscribed to the fund of enjoyment that had been stored up in honor of the veterans of the 154th and Companies I and H, 37th New York volunteers, for their annual reunion on Tuesday, and the gray-haired warriors in memory again participated in the triumphs of the 60's with a zest that proved an inspiration to all with whom they came in contact.

Up to noon and even later incoming trains brought delegations from a distance, who were escorted to headquarters at city hall, where, after registering, they were provided with badges and tickets for dinner, which was served by the women of the Relief Corps at their headquarters in the Nies block.

Business places about the village were generously decorated in honor of the veterans and many private dwellings displayed the natural tricolors.

Shortly after 2 p. m. nearly 100 old soldiers were formed in marching order by Marshal George N. Shedd and paraded through Main street behind the Citizens band which discoursed patriotic and popular airs. Although the weather was perfect, there was a slight chill in the air, and it was deemed advisable to hold the exercises of the day in the city hall, where the veterans and many citizens assembled immediately after the parade.

The meeting was called to order about 2:45 by A. G. Park of Wesley, N. Y., president of the association, and the choir, in charge of Mrs. E. R. Phillips, rendered "America" in pleasing style, the audience joining in the singing.

After a fervent invocation by Chaplain Trippe, James O. Spencer delivered a brief address of welcome, which was responded to in a patriotic and earnest address by Comrade N. A. Chaffee, who grew eloquent in his review of the past and prophecies of the future.

Following another musical selection, J. Spencer Whipple read the principal address of the day which was characteristically eloquent and forceful. The speaker gave a rapid but comprehensive review of the military history of the nation and pointed out the monumental service which the soldiers of the north had performed for their country in making the Union indissoluble and wiping out the awful curse of human slavery. Mr. Whipple pointed out that defeat would have rendered impossible the unprecedented advancement which this nation has made in the past 40 years and closed his address with the following peroration:

"To you who cut your names high on the walls of fame all honor is due. May you live many years to meet in the valley's shade of towering trees, where soft winds blow and where running water makes sweet music while you rest. Let hand grasp hand in warmer clasp, and eyes once bright with the courage born of battle, often meet and hearts grown old with

weary waiting and watching, throb again as comrades come and tell the story of battle days. It is not long until for you the last bugle will have sounded and the last roll call be made; yet, even until the time when the last man goes, may those who have since been born pay you all respect and all honor."
