Mr. and Mrs. Adrian Fay Celebrate 50th Anniversary

Bradford, April 13.—Yesterday was a happy occasion in the lives of Mr. and Mrs. Adrian Fay, two of Bradford's best known residents as upon that date they celebrated their golden wedding anniversary at their residence on Leigh street. During the day they received their many friends who called to offer best wishes on the happy occasion.

The house was handsomely decorated with yellow and white. A buffet luncheon was served. They were also the recipients of many handsome gifts. Mr. and Mrs. Fay, the latter of whom was formerly Miss Sara Flint of Great Valley, N. Y., were married 50 years ago in Great Valley by Rev. Charles Wilkinson, pastor of the Baptist church of that place. There are only three persons now living who attended the ceremony. They are Mrs. Agnes F. Kelsey of Salamanca; Irving Flint of Great Valley and Mrs. Esther F. Parker of Chester, W. Va.

Mr. Fay is a veteran of the Civil War, having enlisted January 3, 1862. It was while he was on a furlough that he married Miss Flint. After a short honeymoon, Mr. Fay returned to the war leaving his bride in Great Valley. Following the discharge of the former from the army, Mr. and Mrs. Fay made their home in Great Valley for 12 years. In 1894 the family came to Bradford and for the greater part of the time since then have lived on Leigh street.

For a number of years Mr. Fay was employed by the B., R. & P. railroad and later became janitor of the fourth ward school building. During the early days he was an active member of the Bradford volunteer fire department.

Mr. and Mrs. Fay are the parents of eight children, seven of whom are still living. They are Mrs. Fred Adams, Salamanca; Mrs. B. L. Fellows, Dunkirk; Orville F. Fay and Carl E. Fay, Ridgway; Ralph Fay and Miss Gertrude Fay of Bradford. There 12 grandchildren living. All of the children of the couple were present at yesterday's celebration.

TEN CLAIMANTS TO REWARD

Of \$600 Offered for Conviction of Postoffice Burglar

Warren, April 9.—Local police officers are worrying over who is going to get the \$600 federal reward which has been made available by the conviction of "Choky" Farrell and his two accomplices in the federal court at Erie on the charge of having attempted to rob the North Warren postoffice last December. The government has a standing offer of \$200 reward for the conviction of any man upon this charge.

Ordinarily the reward would go to the one or two men directly connected with the arrest of the burglars but in the local case there are at least 10 persons who consider themselves eligible for a share of the melon when it is cut, and it is likely that if the reward is evenly distributed none of them will receive more than \$50.
