Thursday Was Big Day

With Col. Theodore Roosevelt,
 assistant secretary of the Navy, and
 Col. William J. Donovan, assistant
 Attorney General, as the big drawing
 cards, the streets began to fill with
 people shortly after noon on Thurs-
 day. Mr. Roosevelt arrived from
 Salamanca with Senator Albert T.
 Fancher and Bret L. Andrews and
 was kept busy shaking hands greet-
 ing old friends and seeing the village.
 Col. Donovan drove in shortly before
 noon in his car from Buffalo and
 the two Colonels were tendered a
 luncheon at The Ellicott by the Cal-
 umet Club and other guests of honor
 including Senator Fancher, County
 Chairman Andrews and several local
 prominent men. The speakers' stand
 in front of the Court House was
 surrounded by a vast throng long be-
 fore Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Dono-
 van appeared. When they were es-
 corted there by the band, they were
 given a big ovation by the crowd.

Both men were introduced by Sen-
 ator Fancher and their addresses were
 heartily enjoyed and closely followed
 by the large audience. They both
 spoke on the National question and
 made a plea for "Coolidge and Com-
 mon Sense" in the coming presiden-
 tial election.

**DEATH OF JAMES BIRD
 AT ANACORTES, WASH.**

Brother of Alex Bird Of This Village
 Of Frontier Fame. Knew Fam-
 ous Characters of "Covered Wag-
 on" and "North of 36"

James Bird, brother of Alex Bird,
 of this village, died August 7th, at
 his home at Anacortes, Wash. He
 was 84 years old.

As a young man he served through-
 out the Civil War as lieutenant in a
 New York regiment. After the war
 he went west and for years was a
 mining prospector in Colorado and
 other western states. He located
 the Tin Cup mine in the Gunnison,
 Colo., field. This he sold for \$5,500
 and the mine is still a heavy produc-
 er and has made hundreds of thous-
 ands for its late owners.

Mr. Bird's travels took him thru
 all parts of the southwest in the days
 when life was in the raw. He was
 acquainted with many of the so call-
 ed bad men of the period and his ad-
 ventures would fill volumes. Some of
 the characters in Emerson Hough's
 great stories, "The Covered Wagon"
 and "North of Thirty-Six" were
 known to him.

Mr. Bird's body was cremated.
 He leaves a widow, formerly Mrs.
 Henrietta Blaisdell, widow of H. M.
 Blaisdell, attorney and later editor,
 to whom he was married 15 years a-
 go.
