

**Wanted Work at Owatonna.**

Among the papers found upon Thos. Graves, the young man who was killed by the cars north of this place last week, was a slip bearing the address of W. A. Stanton, 122 E. School St., and a card G. E. Bonnell. That these men are both residents of Owatonna, is shown by the following from the Owatonna Journal-Chronicle:

"Mr. Bonell tells us that Graves, a refined and nice appearing little chap, came into town Tuesday and applied at the Gem Theatre for work. They had nothing for him, but Mr. Bonell gave him a letter to a friend in the business at Sioux Falls, where he knew there was a job open. He also entertained Graves at supper Tuesday evening, just before he left on the 10 o'clock Rock Island train. Graves said nothing to Mr. Bonell about being broke, but he told his predicament to W. A. Stanton of the telephone company, to whom he also applied for work. Mr. Stanton had nothing for him excepting a job of wood sawing which Graves didn't make much of a success at, being unused to such labor.

"From the information he gave both Mr. Bonell and Mr. Stanton it appears that Graves had been working in the telephone business at Detroit, then came to New Richmond, Wis., to go into the moving picture business and went broke there. Then he went to Minneapolis and looked for work till he was nearly destitute, and then went to Faribault, having just enough money to pay his fare there. From Faribault he walked to Owatonna.

"The information of his death greatly shocked Mr. Bonell and Mr. Stanton, upon both of whom Graves made a good impression. Mapleton authorities are following up the above information gained from this city, to try and locate his relatives."

He witnessed and participated in many of the hard fought battles of the Civil war and witnessed through a glass the now historical charge of the First Minnesota at Gettysburg. He was mustered out in June 1863 and the following October found him in Minnesota. Since which time he has made his home either in Mapleton or Sterling where he is held in high regard by those who have been his friends and neighbors all these years.
