Last Rites for Daniel B. Allen of Buffalo Will Be Held in Otto. 1.1

Funeral services for Daniel B. Al-len, 95, of 122 Fairfield street, be-lieved to be the last of 500 com-manders who engaged in the battle of Gettysburg, will be held today in the Otto Congregational church. The Rev. W. E. Van Dyke, pastor of St. Luke's Episcopal church, Smethport, Pa., will officiate. Mr. Allen died Tuesday in his

home.

home. Mustering a regiment in James-town in 1862, Mr Allen received the rank of colonel and saw service in the Civil war until 1864, when he was released because of illness. He was born in Otto April 7, 1839, and received his education in the Grand River institute, Austinburg, O., Genessee Wesleyan seminary, Lima, and Genessee college, now a

Lima, and Genesee wesleyan seminary, Lima, and Genesee college, now a part of Syracuse university. In 1862, he was admitted to the bar in Buffalo and later opened an

bar in Burialo and later opened an office in Olean, abandoning it the same year to enter the war. Later he established a law office in New York city, and in Washing-ton. He also had practiced law in Constituum Schemance and Otto ton. He also had practiced law in Jamestown, Salamanca and Otto. He served as supervisor from Otto for 19 years. For the last ten years, Mr. Allen had resided in the home of Mrs. Fred M. Austin in Fairfield street. Mr. Allen was a lifelong admirer of Abraham Lincoln. For years he never retired without a picture of
