### PARALYSIS CLAIMS VETERAN SAD DEATH OF POPULAR YOUNG WOMAN

#### Fought in Eighteen Battles in Civil War and Honorably Discharged As A Captain

It remained for Homer Ames to answer the last bugle call before his splendid record as a soldier fighting for Old Glory in the Civil War, came to light. But few people in Marin county were apprised of the fact that the modest and unassuming pioneer citizen, Homer Ames, had fought his way up from the ranks in the Civil War, from 1862, as a private to that of Captain. He fought in eighteen battles, beginning with the Second Bull Run and ending with Sherman's famous march from Atlanta to the sea, where he was honorably discharged as a Captain. He was wounded several times, and twice rewarded for bravery. He started out with the 11th Army Corps, under General Howard as a private, and fought in the following battles: Second Bull Run, Battle of the Wilderness, at Gettysburg, Chancellorsville, Court House, Cedar Mountain, and in all of the battles with the Army of the Potomac. At the battle of the Wilderness he was rewarded for bravery. He swam the Potomac on two different occasions carrying messages.

In 1913, at the instance of Chris. Spiegel of Corte Madera, Commander of Gen. George Meade Post No. 48 G. A. R., he joined and was initiated into the G. A. R. and went to Gettysburg with Mr. Spiegel the same year. Mr. Spiegel, who is a veteran of the Civil War with a splendid record, in discussing the late Captain Homer Ames today, said: "I fought by the side of Captain Ames in several battles. He was a modest man, but a brave soldier. He was wounded several times, and was rewarded twice for gallantry and bravery. He had a wonderful record, and was honorably discharged as Captain. He was a man who said very little, but was loved and respected by every member of the Post. But few soldiers in the Civil War had a better record than the late Homer Ames."

Captain Ames was stricken last Friday with paralysis, and passed away Saturday afternoon, following a second stroke. He was 76 years of age and was a resident of San Rafael for over thirty years. For a number of years he was janitor of the Marin County Court House, and up to some months ago was janitor of the San Rafael schools.

He was a man who was reserved, and his whole ambition was for the comfort of his loving and devoted wife, Mrs. Marie Ames. A grandchild, Joseph Clucel, and his good wife survive him.

The funeral was held yesterday at 2 p. m. from St. Paul's Episcopal church. The services were conducted by Rev. H. Buttrum of Sausalito. The remains were incinerated in San Francisco and the ashes placed in the National vault at the Presidio.
