Fought In Eighteen Battles In Civil War and Honorably Discharged As A Captain

It remained for Homer Ames to asswer the last bugle call before his aplendid record as a soldier fighting er Old Glory in the Civil War, came light. But few people in Marin county were apprised of the fact that the modest and unassuming pioneer itizen, Homer Ames, had fought his way up from the ranks in the Civil War, from 1862, as a private to that Captain. He fought in eighteen tatiles, beginning with the Second Bull Run and ending with Sherman his famous march from Atlanta to the sea, where he was honorably dis-Captain. He was charged as a wounded several times, and twice rewarded for bravery. He started out General Howard as a private, and fought in the following battles: Secand Bull Run, Battle of the Wilderness, at Gettysburg, Chancelorville Court House, Cedar Mountain, and in all of the battles with the Army of the Potomac. At the battle of the Wilderness he was rewarded for bravery. He swam the Potomac on two different occasions carrying mesages.

In 1913, at the instance of Chris. er of Gen. George Meade Post No. 48 into the G. A. R. and went to Gettysourg with Mr. Spiegel the same year. Mr. Spiegel, who is a veteran of the Civil War with a splendid record, in discussing the late Captain Homer Ames today, said: "I fought by the side of Captain Ames in several testiles. He was a modest man, but brave soldier. He was wounded several times, and was rewarded twice for gallantry and bravery. He had a wonderful record, and nonorably discharged as Captain. He was a man who said very little, but was loved and respected every member of the Post. But few soldiers in the Civil War had a beter record than the late mes:" Homer

Captain Ames was stricken last riday with paralysis, and passed way Saturday afternoon, following second stroke. He was 76 years of ge and was a resident of San Rafael ar oyer thirty years. For a number years he was janitor of the Marin ounty Court House, and up to some fonths ago was janitor of the San
