But, in 1906, although 64 years of age, he longed to be again in the pasterate. As he was not rigorous physically, and was so old, he asked for different work than he had been accustomed to have, and preferred to be on light stations. Adderdinglyk he served the small but worthy stations of Lacota, and Climax, two years each, and there was two years at Plaintell. His last year there was attended with much physical suffering and, at the Conference of 1912, at his own request, without urging from his people, or District Superintendent; and with the best of feeling toward his last flock, and Conference brothern, he was placed on our Retired List.
