

C P BAXTER FOLLOWED HIS WIFE IN DEATH

C. P. BAXTER, CIVIL WAR VET-
ERAN, DIED AT EARLY HOUR
THIS MORNING.

FOR MANY YEARS A RESIDENT
HERE—HAD BEEN A PRIS-
ONER OF WAR.

After a little more than a week's illness, incident to the infirmities of his years and a general breakdown, C. P. Baxter, popularly known as Ferry Baxter, a Civil War veteran, and for many years a resident of the city of St. Cloud, passed away at his home on the East Side at 3 o'clock this morning, just one month after the death of his wife. The funeral arrangements have not yet been definitely made, but it is quite probable that the services will be held Sunday afternoon at the home with interment at North Star Cemetery. Rev. E. V. Campbell will officiate.

The deceased was born in Cataragus county, New York, seventy years ago. When the Civil War broke out he and two of his brothers enlisted in Company I of the 154th New York infantry which saw active service in a number of major engagements. At the battle of Gettysburg he was captured by the Confederates and was held a prisoner of war at Richmond for six months, when he was exchanged and, rejoining his regiment, served to the close of the war. He came to St. Cloud about thirty years ago and was for a long time employed by John Coates and also on the street car line. He leaves two adopted children, Ruth and Rubert, one brother James Baxter, of Clearwater, and another brother in Ortig, Washington.
