SATURDAY 2

Another cold & wintry day.
I have made out with
the good will of others
An Annual Return of Cos
wallis, 63, The Company
having no returns, we part
with the exception of a few
beans for dinner.

SUNDAY 3

Another cold & wintry day
and at work all day in
the office - no mail
or visitors from home

MONDAY, JANUARY 4, 1864.

Rainy & cold - little
warmer, have made out
the Annual Return of
Casualties for 1863.
One of the Revenues fell
across a limb of which
struck my tent, breaking
it down, but happily
injuring no one

TUESDAY 5

Nothing unusual happened
to day - wrote a letter
to Sister, attended
vegetation in Section
this evening at Regt.
H. L. W.

WEDNESDAY 6

Everything passed off
smoothly from the adjt's
office to day. Chaplin
Leaving having received
his discharge, delivered
his former address to
the regt in private, A meet-
ing of officers was held
to adopt proper resolutions
regarding the fact that
a white man was made free

THURSDAY, JANUARY 7, 1864.

Still very cold - drizzling
rain left for home to
day - after receiving a
copy of our resolutions
expression of regret.

FRIDAY 8

This morning Mother Earth
is covered with snow
a great sight to us
in the Army.
Nothing new

SATURDAY 9

Nothing except a letter
from home (W. H.) stating
they had not heard from me
this night, and get a letter
through.

THURSDAY 5

Moved, the R.M. in rear
of town in direction
of Lookout Mtn., camped
at 10 P.M.

(Has dictated by the second author)
Left camp & marched

SATURDAY 7

Marched in direction
of Gordon Springs
passed through that
place & camped near

SUNDAY 8

Marched to Ridge (or Rock-faced
Ridge) at night ~
Very steep Mt. and
the Stock held off
the Rebels in their
greater numbers. Our Brigade
formed line of battle
at the foot and marched
on to the heights on the
face of a walling down

MONDAY, MAY 9, 1864.

Lay near Blue Mary's H. p. 29
Spent breastworks at night

TUESDAY 10

Lay in breastworks all day
Aged green of granite flying
over Lee near the old
Chancellorsville battle
ground

WEDNESDAY 11

Marched to Bridge over
Lap. and crossed. very
cold -

THURSDAY, MAY 12, 1864.

Marched to Drake's
gap and through Culp's
Hill. Gen. H. L. Thomas
forces together with the
1st & 3d Divs. of ours.

C. R. Brown of my
Co. failed to return
at night - he was
away his gun on the
battlefield & never looked
in the morn

FRIDAY 13

Moved by slow marches
to Joseph's half - an
illustration of the
R. R. South of Dalton
fighting in front all
day - Redan of the
Capon of Dalton
by Gen. Howard. Slept
in Breastworks at night

SATURDAY 14

Heavy fighting on our
left. Moved late at
night to the support
of Gen. Howard on the
left. Gen. Hooker gave
a battery by a little
process of mind

SUNDAY, MAY 15, 1864.

Were ordered to be ready for action this morning. Advanced by "galloping in mass" on the rebel works and carried them at a breakneck speed until dark. Our Brigade were sent in front of a rebel fort at night & met with an unexpected adventure -

MONDAY 16

Our Army advanced to Resaca and found the enemy gone. Moved on Locust in pursuit a fine country and a hot day

TUESDAY 17

Crossed the Canasota River at dusk and occupied on the south bank.

WEDNESDAY, MAY 18, 1864.

Marched by a circuitous route through a fine country very recently left by the rebels. Occupied at 7 P.M. and encamped.

THURSDAY 18

The Corps moves up the Locust - our Regt remains behind as rear guard & are occupied with 30 men - A very warm day. Some fighting in front this morning -

Moved on with train at 4 P.M. camped at 10

FRIDAY 19

Reinforced in camp near Cassville, a small ancient village of about 1,000 inhabitants.

SATURDAY, MAY 21, 1864.

In camp near
Cassville

SUNDAY 22.

In Stal-mug.

MONDAY 23.

Marched at day-light
in direction of
Elk Creek River -
Crossed the River
on Canvas Pontoon
and captured on the
South Bank
Col. Burnside & Co.
fork his Scare
C.R. P. was wounded

TUESDAY, MAY 24, 1864.

Marched on to Burnt Hick
ory Ridge and camped
for the night.

WEDNESDAY 25

Crossed mountain into
Creek about noon and soon
had firing at the head of the
column. We form line of
battle and ascertain that we may
meet the Rebels in force marching
to intercept us at T. V. Cr.
Col. G. M. McRae charged upon
and drove them 3 m. back heavy
but slight in our Regt.

THURSDAY 26

Laid on our arms last night
through a bitter rain & storm
at daylight threw up sand
works under fire of the
enemey. Our Batteries are
red into position. Heavy
& harassing fire - no
general engagement.

FRIDAY, MAY 27, 1864.

Remained in breast-works under fire

MONDAY, MAY 30, 1864.

Same as above

SATURDAY 28

In Staging

Alarm at night
and heavy firing caused
by supposed advance
of the rebels - great
panic among cooks
& laundrymen.

SUNDAY 29

Remain under arms.
Continual skirmishing
going on - we are getting
poorly well worn out.

TUESDAY 31

Ditto

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 1

Our Corps received by
Lafayette (14th Inf.) - we march
to the left - and camp
in the woods - of which
we have been an inhabitant
since crossing the
Elowah - Our Regt on
Picket - to night -

THURSDAY, JUNE 3, 1864.

A heavy rain storm
passed at noon.
in depth - of 23°
A.C. which changed
upon & above the river
left - 3 miles.

Camped in the
"woods" of course

FRIDAY 4

Remained in camp
Surveying in front.

SATURDAY 5

Remained in Camp
Rebels retreated - 28 A.M.
Occupied their works

SUNDAY, JUNE 5, 1864.

Remained in camp
Somewhere in the woods

MONDAY 6

Left these "woods" and
marched till noon
where we arrived
at an old log hut in
the "woods". got dinner
and camped near
by building breast-
works. Our Camp
near Caworth & me

TUESDAY 7

Rec'd order from Gen
Sherman that we
would march on
the 9th

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 8, 1864.

All quiet - except alarm
of marching for front

THURSDAY 9

Packed up but the
order to march was
countermanded so
far as concerned our
corps. 4th A.C. passing
all day

FRIDAY 10

Ordered to be ready
to march at 8 A.M.
but we didn't go
rainy

Ordered to pack up
again this morning
and fall in - but

and march out -
didn't - do the latter

and took dinner with
Gen Sherman

MONDAY 13

Ordered to march - but
didn't -
Raining very hard

TUESDAY, JUNE 16, 1864.

Moved at 10 A.M. 1 mile
to the rear and went
out Picket duty. About
mid orders to march
marched up within sight
of the rebels, and went
into camp for the night.

WEDNESDAY 17

Our brigade marched
at noon to the front
and formed line of
battle in a dense wood
our Regt. was deployed
as skirmishers for the Brig.
We had hot work driving
the enemy about. I met with
the battle became general
our loss? killed 2, wounded

THURSDAY 18

Batt. breastworks here
night. Moved this morn-
ing to a position
2 miles off battle
D. L. Borden killed
Capt. A. Crook, com-
died.

Spent the morning by
left over front. And

into other rifle pits

SUNDAY 19

Spent the morning with
driving from our front
now on horseback much
to the eastward. Recd
a hard and evergreen
and removed him of battle as
usual in the woods about 10
A.M. Then gave orders
to go up to the top of

MONDAY, JUNE 20, 1864.

Our Brigade advanced the front
lying in the front line on our
right - all quiet -

THURSDAY, JUNE 23, 1864.

Strengthed our works and
expected an attack

TUESDAY 21

Men relieved by A. Rousse from
4th Corps. Marched by the right
17th and went into march

FRIDAY 24

Remained quiet - on the
Skirmish line to night -
in a very exposed point -
all the day forces expected
an attack

WEDNESDAY 22

Moved $\frac{1}{2}$ mile to the front -
and again intrusted enemy
in plain view across an open
field. About 4 P.M. the
enemy advanced in three lines
and attacked the 1st Div forward.
Our Div moved into line on
their left and built works
in great haste. The gunners
refused with great loss

SATURDAY 25

All quiet

SUNDAY, JUNE 26, 1864.

General Lee
in Joseph Mansfield's
cabinet by its former
occupants. Coal
shuttle spot - plenty of
bullets whizzing in
the air

MONDAY 27

Clear day passed by.
Left and followed line
of battle - our boys in
front with 2^o & 3^o
in reserve. Cheered
at a double quick
driving the rebels
within their works and
established ours a half
mile in advance.

TUESDAY 28

Worked once upon our
line of breastworks

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 29, 1864.

All quiet except the
usual picket-firing
in front. McBride
Co. 13^o killed and
Mallowover cut wound
ed.

THURSDAY 30

Muskrad for day -
were relieved at night
and marched till day
light returning a portion
of 2^o Co. S. Cavalry on
Perry's Rd. Line as
soon as rec'd.

FRIDAY, JULY 1

Remained in Pickwick


