cold day. This morning I
recd a New Year present. Glass

SATURDAY 3

Another cold & windy day,
I have made out with
the good help of Elk Tangle
An Annual Return of Cas-
ualties, 63, The Company
having no fatalities, we just
with the exception of a few
beans for dinner.

SUNDAY 3

Another cold & windy day,
hard at work all day in
the office - no mail
or news from home

MONDAY, JANUARY 4, 1864.

Rainy & a little warmer, have made out the Annual Return of casualties for 1863. One of the Boonies fell a tree a limb of which struck my tent, breaking it down, but happily injuring no one.

TUESDAY 5

Nothing unusual happened today. Wrote a letter to Sister, attended recitation in Gaelic this evening at Regt. H. Q.

WEDNESDAY 6

Everything passed off smoothly for the day. Chaplain Lowing having received his discharge & delivered his farewell address to the regt on parade. A meeting of officers was held to adopt proper resolutions in regard to the matter which was done.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 7, 1864.

Still very cold. Chaplain Lowing left for home today - after receiving a copy of our resolutions & expression of regret.

FRIDAY 8

This morning Mother Earth is covered with snow & a good light to us in the Army. Nothing new.

SATURDAY 9

Nothing except a letter from home (W. K.) stating they had not heard from since the fight, & not get a letter through.

South by west Chattanooga

SATURDAY 7

Marched in direction
of Gording Springs,
passed through that
place & camped near
it

THURSDAY 5

Marched this P.M. in search
of Logan in direction
of S. P. Co., camped
at 10 P.M.

SUNDAY 8

Marched to ^{Rogers} ~~Benjamin~~
Ridge. A large
party of ^{rebels} ~~rebels~~ and
the Rebels in this
quarter. Our Brigade
formed line of battle
at 10 feet and marched
on to the heights in
the face of a gallant

MONDAY, MAY 9, 1864.

Lay near Gen Grant's H.Q.
Spent breakfasts at night

TUESDAY 10

Lay in breastworks all day
after crews of Grants shifting
over Lee near the old
Chancellorsville battle
ground

WEDNESDAY 11

Marched to Snake Creek
Camp and camped very
cold -

THURSDAY, MAY 12, 1864.

Marched to Snake Creek
Camp and through camping
with Gen M. Sherman
troops - together with the
1st & 3rd Divs of Corps
C. R. Braxton of my
regiment to forward
at night - he threw
away his gun in the
dark night & since has looked
in the "meat"

FRIDAY 13

Moved by slow marching
& frequent halts - in
the direction of the
R.R. South of Dalton
fighting in front all
day - Gen Sigel of the
Confederates of Dalton
Gen Howard slept
in breastworks at night -

SATURDAY 14

Heavy fighting on our
left. Moved late at
night - to the support
of Gen. Howard on the
left. Gen Hooker saves
a battery by a little
pounce of mind

SUNDAY, MAY 15, 1864.

Were ordered to be ready for action this morning. Advanced by "cavalry" in "mass" on the rebel works and carried them at a breakneck speed until dark. Our Brigades were sent in front of a rebel fort at night & met with an unpleasant adventure.

MONDAY 16

Our Army advanced to Resaca and found the enemy gone. Moved on South in pursuit of the enemy and a hot day.

TUESDAY 17

Crossed the Canasota River at dark and camped on the South bank.

WEDNESDAY, MAY 18, 1864.

Marched by a circuitous route through a fine country very recently left by the rebels. Camped at 8 P.M. and spent the night.

THURSDAY 19

The Corps moved up the South - our Regt. remained behind as rear guard. I am on picket with 30 men - a very warm day. Some fighting in front this morning.

Moved on with train at 4 P.M. Camp at 10

FRIDAY 20

Remained in camp near Corville, a pleasant village of about 1,000 inhabitants.

SATURDAY, MAY 21, 1864.

In camp near
Cassville

SUNDAY 22

In Statu quo

MONDAY 23

Marched at daylight
in direction of
Blount's River.
Crossed the River
on Canvas Ponton
and camped on the
South bank.
Col. Bushnell
took his leave
C. R. B. wounded.

TUESDAY, MAY 24, 1864.

Marched on to Burnt Hick
ory Ridge and camped
for the night.

WEDNESDAY 25

Crossed Wilmington Vine
Creek about noon and soon
were firing at the head of the
column. - We form line of
battle and ascertain that we will
meet the rebels in force marching
to intercept us at P. V. Cr.
At 5 P. M. Our Corps charged upon
and drove them 3 m. Lost near
by - but slight in our Regt

THURSDAY 26

Laid on our arms last night.
Through a bitter rain storm
at daylight threw up breast
works under fire of the
enemy. Our Batteries and
went into position heavy
& knocking her - no
general engagement.

FRIDAY, MAY 27, 1864.

Remained in Breast-works under fire.

SATURDAY 28

In Stetinger's

Alarm at night - and heavy firing caused by supposed advance of the Rebels - great panic among cooks & Quartermasters.

SUNDAY 29

Remain under arms. Continual skirmishing going on - We are getting pretty well worn out.

MONDAY, MAY 30, 1864.

Same as above

TUESDAY 31

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 1

Our Corps relieved by Logan's (14th). We marched to the left and camp in the woods - of which we have been an inhabitant since crossing the Etowah - Our Regt on Picket to night.

THURSDAY, JUNE 3, 1864.

A heavy rain storm
rained at noon.
in support of 23^d
A.C. which charged
upon & drove the rebels
left - 3 miles.
Camped in the
"woods" of course.

FRIDAY 3

Remained in camp
skirmishing in front.

SATURDAY 4

Remained in camp.
Rebels retreat - & the
occupies their work.

SUNDAY, JUNE 5, 1864.

Remained in camp
somewhere in the woods.

MONDAY 6

Left these "woods" and
marched till noon
when we arrived
at an old log hut in
the "woods" got dinner
and camped near
by building breast-

to march at 8 a.m.,

Ordered to pack up
again this morning
and fall in - but
it - proved a fizzle
So here we are
still in the woods

SUNDAY 12

Ordered to pack up
and march but
didn't - so the letters
went down to the train
and took dinner with
I M Sherman
black beans
Raining hard
3 letters from home

MONDAY 13

Ordered to march - but
didn't
Raining very hard

TUESDAY, JUNE 14, 1864.

Moved at 10 am. 1 mile
to the rear and went
on picket duty. At noon
recd orders to march
marched up within sight
of the reb. and went
into camp for the night

WEDNESDAY 15

Our brigade marched
at noon to the front
and formed line of
battls in a dense wood
our Regt was deployed
as skirmishers for the Regt
we had hot work during
the rainy about 2 hrs when
the battle became severe
our loss? Killed 24 wounded

THURSDAY 16

Built breastworks for
night - moved this morn
ing to a position
within of battle
D. & Burkard killed
Capt. A. Crocker, wounded
Bredt - breastworks
at night.

FRIDAY, JUNE 17, 1864.

Received the orders to
leave our front - ahead
all day light advanced
into the night night
found the enemy very strong
At noon the army moved
on finding the enemy
near Kennesaw mountain
here we had the fiercest an
tillery fighting of the war
part of night - breastworks
at night SATURDAY 18
rained very hard
heavy artillery fighting
Remained in our
entrenchments
keeping skirmishers
in our front -
for Mr. Franking wounded

SUNDAY 19

Received the orders to
draw from our front
and on change of mind
to the rear - Rained
at night as I ever opinion
I would win of battle as
usual in the woods about 10
a.m. From Gov or order
I went to the camp post
of Birdseye's battery
Did not become engaged and built breast

MONDAY, JUNE 20, 1864.

Our Regiments received the word
lying in the front line and our
brigade: all quiet.

TUESDAY 21

Were ordered by a Regt from
4th Corps. Marched by the night
1 1/2 miles and intrenched.

WEDNESDAY 22

Moved 1/2 mile to the front -
and again intrenched. Enemy
in plain view across an open
field. About 4 P.M. The
Enemy advanced in three lines
and attacked the 1st Div. furiously.
Our Div moved into line on
their left and built works
in great haste. The enemy was
repulsed with great loss.

THURSDAY, JUNE 23, 1864.

Strengthened our works and
expected an attack.

FRIDAY 24

Remained quiet - on the
skirmish line to night -
in a very exposed position -
all the day long expected
an attack.

SATURDAY 25

All quiet.

SUNDAY, JUNE 26, 1964.

Stomach turned
up. A fresh machine
loaded with its former
occupants. Cool
study spot. Plenty of
bullets whizzing in
the air.

MONDAY 27

Clear die moved by the
left and formed line
of battle. Our boys in
front with 207 90
as reserve. Charge
at a double quick
driving therebs
within their wires and
established ours a half
mile in advance.

TUESDAY 28

Worked some upon pos-
sion of breackworks

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 29, 1964.

All quiet except the
usual picket firing
in front. We killed
Co. B killed and
Mullower and wound
ed.

THURSDAY 30

Mustered for pay -
were ordered at night
and marched till day
light - relieving a portion
of 29th A.C. went on
to the front. Line as
soon as melted.

FRIDAY, JULY 1

Remained in Skirmish
Line till dark.

SATURDAY, JULY 3, 1864.

Remained in Boon-works

SUNDAY 4

Enemy retreated last night - we follow on capturing many cartridges - reach the rebel position at night and camp

MONDAY 4

Remain in camp bands play - the only thing to record on of the day - very warm go on picket at night

TUESDAY, JULY 5, 1864.

Rebels retired last night - we follow on find their works the most formidable I ever saw - reach a point in Hickajack Creek near Chestnut River where the spikes of Atlanta can be seen

WEDNESDAY 6

Find the enemy in front - remain in camp - till 4 P.M. when we move 7 mi. to the left -

Take up position between 14th & 15th Corps and go into camp

Advanced a half mile
and halted by Ross's high

was driven back by a
rebel charge - general
engagement - resulting in
a total repulse to my
rebel not clear

worked around over

and reconnoitered
