BIRD WON.

Appointed Superintendent of Highways for Cattaraugus County.

Alex Bird was appointed county superintendent of highways by the board of supervisors at Little Valley, last Friday, for the term of four years, his salary being fixed at \$2,000, with expenses not to exceed \$500.

The Salamanca Press says: The appointment of Capt. Bird as superintendent took but little time. His name was presented by Supervisor J. G. McMahon of Ellicottville, who spoke of his excellent military record and of his subsequent experience on contract works. He said that Mr. Bird enlisted in July, 1862, in Company G, 154th N. Y. Vols., was promoted to corporal in May, 1863, and to sergeant in September, 1863, and to first lieutenant in July, 1864, after which he commanded Company F as acting captain. All of his promotions were for conspicuous bravery on the field of battle. He fought in the battles of Chancellorsville, Rocky Faced Ridge, Pine Mountain, Lost Mountain, Bushy Mountain, Kenesaw Mountain, Galgoth Church, Nancy Creek, Peach Tree Creek, at the Siege of Savannah and many lesser engagements, and was with Sherman on his march to the sea. After the war he worked as foreman and inspector for three years under the state superintendent of public works; superintended the construction of roads and dry dock float at 25th street, Brooklyn; for the Brooklyn Dock and Terminal company; was foreman for the Virginia Copper company in that state; was superintendent for the United Ice Lines in New York; and was for five terms street commissioner at Ellicottville. Mr. McMahon said that Capt. Bird would "give actual service worth the money paid him;" that he is a man of "sterling qualities, determined resolution, clear ideas and good judgment."

A communication was read from the state civil service commission giving the results of the examination and stating that Capt. Bird's appointment was mandatory, and he was chosen unanimously. His bond for the faithful performance of his duties was fixed at \$2,500.

Capt. Bird briefly expressed his thanks, and said that he would try to earn his salary. "I am no orator," he said, "but I will see that the roads are improved, and that the highway law is lived up to, let the lines fall where they may."
