March to the Sea

With the 154th N. Y. Vols.

Editor of The Post:- I ran across one of my old army diaries that I kept during the Civil War and am sending you the memorandum kept from day to day from Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 15th, until we entered Savannah, Ga., Doc. 21st. It will bring back memories and incidents to my old comrades of the 154th N. Y. and may be of some interest to some of their children and to others.

ALEX BIRD.

Nov. 75th 1864. Left camp at 8 a. m. marched out on the Decater road and camped for the night near Stone Mountain. Weather fine.

16th. Marched northeast 15 miles and camped for the night. Foraging. Good country, level after leaving Atlanta.

17th. Was detailed for picket duty. Marched at 5 a. m. and did picket duty at night. Four miles from Social Circle.

18th. Marched through Social Circle and took dinner at Rutlage. Killed a pig and camped for the night near Madison.

19th. Marched at 5 a. m. Passed through Madison before daylight. Morning threatening to rain. Took dinner at Buckhead. Marched four miles beyond and camped for the night. Tore up railroad track until dark.

20th. Marched at 7 a. m. Struck the Oconee river at 10 a. m. and marched south and camped on a fine plantation with plenty of pork, chickens, and sweet potatoes. Rained at night.

21st. Marched at 8 a. m. Passed to the east of Eatonton. Rained all day and cleared up at night and froze very hard.

22nd. Pleasant but very cold. Reached Milligeville at 5 p. m. Marched through the city with flags flying and bands playing. Crossed the river and the regment went, on picket. The Confederate legislators in session and they hurriedly left the state house without taking time

23d. Lieutenant Ames and myself went out to the front about eight miles, loaded the buggy with the necessaries of life consisting of hams, bacon, flour, chickens and a lot of ofgars, and arrived at the picket line at 7 p.m.

24th Marched at 7 a m nearly both: Crossed Dam creek and camped
