

Duchess appeared on the platform for a moment and the former acknowledged the kindly expression. The royal party reached Ottawa at 12:05 and the Duke arrived in his favorite uniform of admiral of the British navy, alighted at once accompanied by the Duchess and the members of his staff. They were formally received by Lord Minto, governor general and escorted to a state barracks. A guard of honor from the Forty-second Regiment was drawn up across the approach to the depot and an escort from the Royal Canadian Dragoons was in waiting. The dragoons reined their horses along side the barracks and the Duke and Duchess were driven to parliament hall.

SPLENDID DECORATIONS.

The streets through which they moved were splendidly decorated and thousands of people were banked behind the police and fire lines.

It was in parliament square formed for the classic buildings that the formal ceremony of greeting the heir apparent took place and here was gathered the largest crowd of all.

The royal pair were cheered heartily as they entered the square and were shown to a flag-covered stand. Here were gathered Premier Laurier and his cabinet, Mayor Morris and the city alderman, the Supreme Court justices, the bishops of the Roman Catholic and Anglican churches and representatives of a score of municipalities and organizations. The Duke was attended by Viscount Crichton, Lord Roxburgh and Lord Wenlock. Prince Alexander of Teck and his military and naval aides in brilliant uniforms and the scene in parliament square as they advanced up the carpeted walk to the reception stand was most picturesque. The several addresses were presented at once and the Duke made an extended reply of his appreciation of the honors shown.

At the close of the address of the Duke three thousand school children raised their voices in the strains of "God Save the King." The party then left the stand and drove at once to Rideau, the official residence of the governor general, where they are to live during the four days they remain in Ottawa. As they rode through the flag hung streets surrounded their carriages and offered new tributes of cheer.

To-night at Rideau hall there was a state dinner on behalf of the notables gathered here were hidden to attend.

THEIR SAFETY CONSIDERED.

Vancouver, B. C., Sept. 20.—Preparations are now being formed for the safe conduct of the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York across the continent to this city. The entire line of railroad from Quebec to Vancouver will be guarded and patrolled during the royal progress. Thousands of men have been specially engaged for this purpose by the Canadian Pacific Railway. Each guard will be in sight of his neighbor on either side. The royal train will be preceded all along the route by one or more pilot engines, which will keep a sharp watch
