NEWTON A. CHAFFEY IS DEAD
1916
 Prominent Gowanda Citizen and Veteran of the Civil War.

GOWANDA, March 16.—Newton Adelbert Chaffey died at his home here yesterday from a stroke of apoplexy. He was born in Gowanda, August 31, 1841. On August 2, 1862 he enlisted in the 154th New York Volunteer Regiment. He participated in the battles of Gettysburg and Chancellorsville and was with Sherman on his march to the sea. After the close of the war he engaged in the grocery business at Gowanda for two years after which he sold and opened a general store at Dayton, which he conducted until 1883, then going to Westfield for two years. He returned to Gowanda in 1885 where he had since resided.

He was a director of the Bank of North Collins; has held several village offices, a member of Darby Post, G. A. R., and of Phoenix Lodge, No. 262, F. & A. M. Has been an elder and treasurer of the Presbyterian Church for eighteen years.

On June 6, 1866, he married Luna, daughter of the late Homer Woodin, who survives him and a daughter Mrs. E. B. Dewey of Jamestown. Funeral services will be held from his late home Saturday at 2:30 P. M., Rev. James C. Euchannon, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, officiating, assisted by the Masonic and G. A. R. fraternities. The interment will be in Woodlawn Cemetery.

FORMER BUSINESS MAN DIED AT EAST RANDOLPH

Long Record as Merchant—The Funeral will be Attended on Friday Afternoon.

Homer Dixon, a life long resident of this place, died Wednesday morning, March 29th, at 10 o'clock. Mr. Dixon has been sick nearly seven years. Deceased was born at East Randolph, May 12, 1837; one of a family of seven children born to Daniel and Sarah Dixon, and one of whom a sister, Miss Eliza Dixon, who has passed the four score mark some time since, alone survives him. For 50 years Mr. Dixon conducted a grocery store in a building on Main street in this village. During his business career of half a century, no one ever questioned his honesty and fair dealing. In early life Mr. Dixon married Miss Tina Ganoung, who died after a few years, leaving two children, a daughter Mary, now Mrs. Joseph Westcott, and a son Leonard, who died several years since. A few years after the death of his first wife he was married to the wife who survives him and who has patiently and tenderly cared for him during his long illness.

The funeral will be held from the E. Church, which he was attending, Friday, March 31, at 10 o'clock, the pastor will officiate.

H. C. RICH EXPIRES AT CALIFORNIA HOME

HAS BEEN IN POOR HEALTH FOR PAST SEVERAL YEARS

FORMERLY LIVED IN RANDOLPH

His Body to be Laid at Rest in a Mausoleum he Constructed in the Local Cemetery—Will Reach Here Next Week. *July 10-1916*

L. W. Rich received a telegram on Monday afternoon announcing that his uncle, H. C. Rich, had died on Monday morning at his home in Los Angeles, California. It had been known here for some weeks that Mr. Rich was in very poor health, in fact, communications previously had been received conveying in telligence that he could not long survive. His trouble has been of long duration.

The telegram also stated that the body would be brought to Randolph and that friends here would be informed when the funeral party left Los Angeles.

H. C. Rich had been identified with the business interests of Randolph for more than thirty-five years; he came here in 1880, then a young man of about thirty-five, and entered the hardware business with his brother, the late Charles Rich. That business was closed out and H. C. entered the manufacture of lumber, which he followed with great success during the active period of his life. He has been a director of the State Bank of Randolph for some years.

Mr. Rich had constructed a beautiful mausoleum in the Randolph cemetery, and it is expected that interment will be made at that place. He was married to Miss Addie Caskey of Randolph, who survives.

It is with deep regret that Randolph people learn of the death of this sterling gentleman—one who had the ability to make and to keep the warmest friendships.

Mrs. Eugenia Rich received a telegram on Tuesday, which stated that the body of H. C. Rich would be brought to Randolph, reaching here on Thursday, July 20. It also indicated the services here would take place after the arrival of the trains from Buffalo on the 21st of July.
