Stay of Sentence Granted to Ruthenberg

TO ASK FOR NEW TRIAL

Announces Attorney Will Be Appealed to Michigan Supreme Court

ST. JOSEPH, June 4-(By A. Ruthenberg, P.) - Charles E. Cleveland radical convicted in the Berrien circuit court in March of violating the Michigan anti-syndicalism act, escaped prison sent-ence when he appeared before Judge White this morning, his counsel securing the court's permission to appeal the case before sentence is pronounced.

Attorney Frank P. Walsh pre-sented the motion in behalf of Ruthenberg, asking for a stay of sentence until the conviction could be appealed to the Michigan Prosecuting Atkilled supreme court. He was arrested with 15 others, aukee on Aug. 22, 1922, when a sheriff's posse and federal agents raided Maine, the second annual convention of the Communist Earty of Ameriin ca. held in the lonely sand hills e and near Bridgeman, this county. The raiders found two barrels buried in the woods and from them, took portfolios containing the personal papers of 16 delegates. hundreds of pamphlets, books and manuscripts of radical nature, a half dozen typewriters, two duplicating machines and other paraphernalia of the convention.

State Supreme Court Hits at Dry Agent Practices

REVERSE 2 LIQUOR CASES

Sanctity of Private Residence Must Be Preserved, Declare in Decisions

Warrants for the search of private dwellings and the seizure o found on the premise: must be based on facts sworn to in complaints by the complaining parties, and are not valid wher based on "information and belief," according to two opinions handed down by the Michigan su preme court Monday.

In one of these cases, which comes from Ottawa county, is which George Mertz is defendant the count opinion states that the warrant was issued on a complaint which set forth that the place was a private dwelling that Mertz had given the witness some "home brew," and the wit ness had had some moonshine it the Mertz home, The court held

"the search warrant is void."
The court opinion points ou that the 1921 law, relative to search and seizure of intoxication liquors, applies only to thre cases: first the premises must b n place of public resort; second they must be used for lawful manufacture of intoxicat ing liquois: ithird, they must b used for the unlawful sale of liq The complaint, according to the opinion, did not so charge nor did It contain the require substantiate facts to charges.

Preserve Sanctity of Home The court says: "These provi

sions (of the 1921 law) are aime to preserve the sanctity of th home which should not be frit tered away by a loose construc tion of the statutes."
