Civil War letters of our Great Uncle, Harvey Earl. Most were written to his brother, Alfred Earl, and his wife, Almina "Tip" Hubbard Earl.

Spelling is as written in original letters. No periods were used in these letters. But it is surprising how well the writing has been preserved. I was told by Wilson Milks (in 1972) that Harvey Earl never returned from the war, and no news of what happened to him was ever received. He, himself, while travelling in Virginia, tried to find some record of his death, but could find none. It was said that at one time during the Civil War, there was an exchange of prisoners and when they were lined up for the exchange, Harvey was one of the last in line and that he stepped b ack and allowed another to go in his place.

October the 5 862

Dear brother I thought I would rite a few lines to you to let you no that I was alive and well and I hope that these few lines will find you well we are camped in Vrginia about three miles on the other side of the Potomac river it is rather warme heer I did not see you when I cum thru Calmaca I seen Joe Gorge he cum up whar the cars stoped bill was over heer to day he is as tuff as A buck tell J rite to me as soon as you git this

Wal tip I thought that you I would rite A word or to to you tell Jane that I am very glad that she cum over to your house that knight for I would hav hted to cum away without seeing her you and Alfred must rite to me and all of the folks must rite and not wate for me god good by for this time Drect to Wasingten D.C. 154 C rigment US State Volenteers Co. H in care of Cap F J Nelson from your a ferende this is badley crald up from Harv Earl to Mister Alfred Earl and Co Remembr Harvey Earl

Farifax Oct the 19 1862 dear frie-brother I got your letter this morning and was glar to hear from you and to hear that you was well your letter found me well and I hope those few lines will find you well I dont like sodering very well when we mached from washington it was a weake a go to day and we marched all day it was about 10 oclock at knight we camped and raind like heel all knight and we slep out in the rain like hogs I was as wet as A drowned rat what kind of wether is it out ther it is warmb dayes and cold knigts heer I was glad to hear that father had traidid of that jugnut I sent him a letter a good while ago and hav not got eney from him atole I cant write eny more so good by

rite Wal tip i will rite a few lines to you to to let you know that I am alive and well and as foolish as ever and I hope those few lines will find you well that liknes I sent you was rather poor Joes was better J Jane sent me a letter I got it yesterday I hav a hard place to write you must excuse my poor riting and speeling I don't know whare Bill is now I hav not seen him since I rote to you before how dose Olive get A long now She will git mad at me if I dont write to her it is as helthey heer as it is ther with the same kind of for it is hard fare that makes the boyes sik heer in sted of the climet

Dear brother

I resevd your letter this morning and was very glade to hear from you and to hear that you was well your letter found me well and tuff as a buck I am giting fat I way 159 pounds now well Alfred we had a very cold rain hear last Sunday it was very cold that knight the boys run into woods to make a fire to ceape warmb I think we shal stay hear all wintr

I rote in Charleys leter to tell you to send me sum stamps I wint you would for I cant git eny hear send sum if you can I had A leter from father the other day he was well

I hav seen the place whare Nate Hourd was shot (Note—he had an arm shot off—mentioned in another letter.)

I was out on picket gard the other knight I hurd sum houns a runing a fore the fox run rite clost to me I dart not shot at him it made me think of home I cant think of much more to rite

give my love to all of the folks rite soon

Wal I hav just ben to grub we had to a good meal this morning we had sum potatos and we stold a quarter of beaf last mi nite but for a generel thing we hav rathe hard fair it is very bad wether now it snows one day and the next day it will rain that makes rather hard times for us Wal you rot me a very short letter you must do better then that Wal what do you think of I doing this sumer I hav got the starte of you I know what my bisness will be for 2 years if I should happen to liv Wal what is gorges folks doing this winter did Charley git this my letter I rote him he did not rite to me since teel rachel that she mite rite a few lines and let me know how she gets a long let her rite and send it with your letter

I recived your sad letter last nite I was was felt the worst that I hav been since since I hav been in Vergina when I red that leter but tell you must ceap up good curag he has gon to a place whare they nevr hav war he will see his little aunt ther I feel so bad that I cant rite if you hav eny more bad nuse dont tell it to me for it is bad a nuf to stay heer with out heering eny bad nuse from home I am not very well at present but I hope that I shal git better in a few dayes it is plesent wether hear now the birds sings just as swet as they evr did in old Cattaraugus it make me home sik but that never will do I will ceap up good curag and they when this wor is ovr I will come home and see my friends once mre and nevr go to rambel agane then I will have good old times once more ther is a olde fortion teeler hear and I am going ovr and hav him tell mine in a few dayes ther has bed sum of the boyes ovr and he ses that this regment will never see a fite but I don't think he knows eny thing a bout it but the boyes that has had thern told say he will tell what has part just as it is

I cant rite eny more now for my hand trembels so so good by for this time from Harvey Earl

I had a letter from rachel the other day she rot me a very good letter

Wal they say that we are nine months meen but that is a camp story I think that is to good to belive

Wal it is nite now it is a bad nite it rains sum and it is quite cold the boys will hav a harde time on picket but I know how to pity them for I hav had sum hard times on picket and expect sum more before this thing runs down

Wal the rods is very bad yet but as soon as they better they will put us on the move agane we hav been in this camp five weaks

Wal you must rite and let me know how all of the folks gits a long Wal I shal send this without a stamp for I hant got eny I thought I would try it and see if it would get thro(?)

We hav got marching orders now but we may stay heer to weaks yet but when they move a gone they will take us in to a fite I think but it mabe that they wont

Wal this is Monday morning the snow is a inch deap and ground it is very cold hear for this time of year

Dear brother and sister I thought I would write a few lines to you to let you know that I am a live and well but a little sore on my leg that wont amount to much

I hav got a little time and I will try and tell you a little about the fite our brigade left this camp the 15 of april and went to keles ford we stade ther a bout to weaks and we had to go on picket evry other day and then we had to put down the pontons bridgs the nite that the armey crosed the river and then we had to wate for the armey to cros it and then we had to gard the bageg train thru to whare we had the fite we marched 21 miles in one day had 8 days rshens but the rebs got them and all the rest of the thing that I had in my knapsak that pare of soks you may charge to the rebs they got them i think for I throd them evry thing a way and the balls cum round my head like hale sone and the meen was a falling on all sids of me I hope I shant see a nother such a time it ant a very plesent place to be in they hav gon ovr the rver to day after the wounded men the story is heer that they burnt the ded up for they could not git them undr ground

Harmen Fisher is among the misin I dont know whether the was kild or not

Wal I cant write eny more now So good by for this time

May the 23 1863
