

DEATH'S CALL.

Isaac Emery, an aged and respected citizen of this city died at his home Monday afternoon at 3:45 o'clock of pneumonia after a short illness, at the age of about 73 years,

Deceased was born at Lynden, N. Y. Feb. 28, 1831, was a soldier in the federal army, Co. D. 154th N. Y. regiment enlisting at Elmyra and served during the greater part of the war. Had he lived until the 26th of this month he, with his aged wife would have celebrated the 50th anniversary of their wedding. Eight children, four sons and four daughters were born to Mr. and Mrs. Emery, seven of whom are living.

For the past twenty-five years Mr. Emery has been unable to perform manual labor. The funeral services will be held at the M. E. church tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 conducted by Rev. Witherbee. The G. A. R. will assist with their funeral rites at the grave.

Mr. Emery came to Wisconsin with his wife in 1867 and has been a resident of Elroy for about ten years.
