.3. The uniform system of county government does not fit the un-uniform conditions of the state. For example in New York City there should be no county government. The big counties, the little counties, the poor counties, and the rich counties need county government charters which vary just as much one from the other as do city charters within the state."

To meet this situation, the Commission will recommend to the legislative two important bills. Plan B provides for a county Executive to be appointed by the county board of supervisors without fixed term. The county Executive under this plan will appoint and supervise all nonconstitutional officers and will prepare and execute the budget after its adoption Neither of these plans can alter the make up of the board of appervisors as this is established by the state constitution on the model
