the name of Lieut. JOHN C. GRISWOLD,
of Co. F, 15th N. Y. V. Lieut. Griswold
was an old resident of the town of Arkwright,
in which he had held important positions as
a town officer, having been for many years a
Justice of the Peace, and three times elected
Supervisor, which position he held at the
time of entering the service of his country.
He was an upright and worthy citizen, and
his death will be deeply regretted by the community
where he lived. His age was about 42. He
leaves a family to mourn his loss.
