Old Age Claims Veteran of Civil War, Lifelong Resident of This Vicinity.

James Hale, age 82, a lifelong resident of this vicinity, died at the Salamanca hospital Friday afternoon at 5 o'clock. Death was due to diseases incident to old age.

Mr. Hale was born in the town of Little Valley, January 7, 1840. He was a veteran of the Civil War, having served in the 154th Regiment, Co. H.

He is survived by four daughters, Mrs. Walter Squires of Belmont, Mrs. Otis Ames of Salamanca, Mrs. Sarah Davis of Elwood City, Pa., and Mrs. Blanche Curly of Ambridge, Pa., two sons, Edward Hale and Walter Hale, both of Great Valley.
