Another of the prominent citizens of  
Portland has just closed his earthly career.  
James B. Haywood, living in Portland

merchant at Brocton, died very suddenly  
last Saturday evening at the residence of

Mr. Haywood had been greatly depressed

him. Mr. H. was also a soldier in the late  
war, a member of company "E" 154th  
regiment, N. Y. volunteers, captain, J. B.  
Fay, enlisting Aug. 22d, 1862. He fol-  
lowed the fortunes of his regiment until  
the battle of Chancellorsville, Va., May  
2d, 1863, when he was taken prisoner, but  
paroled and exchanged on the 15th of the  
same month and again joined his company  
and was with his regiment on that memo-  
rable march of Gen. Sherman's through  
Georgia to the sea. He was wounded at  
Resaca, June 15th, 1864, was sent to hos-  
pital at Cleveland, Ohio, and after his re-  
covery rejoined his company and regiment  
at Atlanta, and continued with the army to  
June 23d, 1865 when he was discharged.  
He was an excellent man and a good citizen  
and will long be missed.
