Mr. Hogg has been a resident of this vicinity his entire life and has always been characterized as a man of high standing, sterling qualities, strong personal convictions, and possessing a high sense of honor and justice commanded the universal respect of all neighbors and acquaintances. He enlisted in the War of the Rebellion in Company D 154 N. Y. Volunteers, and served with distinction in the Union army until the battle of Gettysburg, where he was taken prisoner. He was placed in the RICHMOND PRISON, was afterwards transferred to BELLE ISLE, then to MILLEN and having spent seventeen months in the ANDERSONVILLE PRISON, was finally paroled and received an honorable discharge at the close of the war.

His brothers ADAM HOGG, GEORGE HOGG & BENJAMIN HOGG also served in the Civil War, BENJAMIN LOSING AN ARM AT GETTYSBURG. Mount Prospect.
