Mrs. Eddy was born in Cottage, N. Y., and had lived in Salamanca about fifty years.



Family Century Farms

Traces of pioneer living re-Traces of ploneer living re-main today in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Casten, Cottage, who farm today the land purchased in 1833 by Wil-liam Howlett, Mrs. Casten's grandfather.

Among her prized possessions are the cradle made for her father, Horace Howlett, and an antique rocking chair on which the rockers are worn nearly flat. Her father, his brother and sister used it as a sled when they were children.

She also has a book case and some stands made by her grandfather.

The home itself was built in

The home itself was built in 1875, and though it has been modernized, the living room and parlor appear today much as they did then.

The farm has always been a dairy, and the Castens have nine cows and keep 100 layers. The farm has a large sugar bush, and until six or seven years ago, they tapped as many as 1,000 trees each year. Her father, Mrs. Casten recalls, sold syrup for \$1 per gallon, maple sugar for five cents a pound, and traded maple for cane sugar.

William Howlett, the farm's founder, was born July 11, 1806, at Rupert, Vt., and was married Oct. 6, 1829, to Betsey Phelps, Rutland, Vt. They resided first at Castleton, Vt., then moved west and bought the present farm in 1833 from the Holland Land Company. The farm now includes 134 acres.

19th Century Living Howlett was a cooper. He made barrels and "brackets", or what-nots. He kept sheep, and Betsey spun the yarn to now make coverlets, now bed-spreads; clothes, mittens and socks for the family.

The first home for the fam-

ily was a frame house, which

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was located north of the present home. It featured a spring, the water from which ran into a kettle in the woodshed, the ultimate in convenience for that day. The spring still runs today.

They had four children, Sar-

They had four children. Sarah married George Hubbard, and one of their grandchildren resides in the Cottage area. Hubbard died, and Sarah married Luther Landon, remaining at Cottage.

Francis died at the age of 7. Moses married DeEtta Neare, and two of his grandchildren are living now: Glenn Howlett, Cottage, and Hattie Synder, Dunkirk.

Civil Was Soffler

Horace W. Howlett was born Jan. 26, 1836, in the first house. He married Mary Nash, a member of one of the Town of Dayton's pioneer families. They had two children: Arus, born Dec. 2, 1855, who died at the age of 19, and Elmer, born Nov. 3, 1862, who later moved to California and died there in September, 1897.

Horace joined the Union Army in the Civil War, and lost an eye and sustained a broken leg in service. On his return, having separated from his first wife, he married Mary Bebee.

Their children included Elsie A. Howlett, who married Charles Eddy, and lived until Feb. 20, 1950. One of her three children, Leslie Eddy, children,

Salamanca, survives.

William, the only son, never married. He stayed on the farm, helping his father, then

drove a milk route. He died

May 20, 1927.

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The present house was built by a carpenter for Horace in 1875, and the original house was moved and used as a shop. It was taken down about 40

It was taken down about 40 years ago.

William Howlett, the pioneer, died June 25, 1879, and his wife, Betsey, lived until March 12, 1887. Horace died Jan. 12, 1903, and his wife, Betsey, died May 1, 1922.

The Castens have two chilter Bethalt, born Oct. 6, 1906, married Walter Johnson July 29, 1933, and they live at Perrysburg. Mrs. Johnson, a registered nurse, is director of nurses at Tri-County Memorial Hospital, Gowanda. They have two children, Eugene, 9, and

two children, Eugene, 9, and Douglas, 6.

Horace Casten, born July 20, 1909, was married March 16, 1934, to Louise Madsen. They lived for six years in Jamestown, then moved to Bath. They have three children: Mary Anne, 14: Betty Lou, 11, and Kay Louise, 7. A son, Richard, died in Jamestown at 2 years of age. Horace is a school bus mechanic, and repairs buses in several counties, including Chautauqua, Cattaraugus and Erie. raugus and Erie.

The Castens have remodelled some rooms in the family homestead, including addition of a bathroom and building a kitchen into the woodshed.
