March 9 1863 Stafford Court House

Dear wife

you will pardon me for not writing to you sooner when I tel you that I have ben very sick for the last two weeks. It has went pretty hard with me this pull but I am better now my complaint is the durty hurey or in other words the virginia quick step the doctor would not let me write before. I have not sufferd for the want of suitable food for a good menney of the boys have got boxses lately and they have ben very kind to me. Harris Lamb has ben home on a furlow since you left home he was gon ten days thare is more going in the morning but none to Portville I believe. How the days and hours have pased with me since I have ben sick you may judge. It has ben very loneley here without you but thare is no use of talking about it, let us hope for the best.

I am looking for another letter from you I think I shal get it to night I hope so I am in hopes that we shal get some pay before long so that I can send you some but I cannot tel how that will be
