Under such circumstances we felt bound to defend them to the best of our peer ability, and if we have, as we are free to admit, gone into the slums and "fish markets" in our previous communications, (and for which we apologize to the public," it is because we were forced to sink to the level of our subject, and the gentleman should have known before he placed himself in a position to receive such a chastisement, whether a reiteration of his own reputation would become so offensive te himself as to lead him to cry out, in the pain of his castigation, SKUNK\$ SKUNK\$

The fact that so much of what he terms scandal could be learned in one short year, as he has put it, is but an evidence of the opinion in which he is held by the community in which he lives, and we congratulate ourselves not only with respect to what we have achieved in reference to the Home, but also that we have been enabled to teach even the Hon.
