CIVIL WAR VETERAN DIED AT STEAMBURG

HIRAM KEITH EXPIRED AT HIS RESIDENCE WEDNESDAY
MEMBER OF THE 154TH REGT.

Was Respected Member of the Grand Army Post in Randolph, which will
Furnish Escort of Honor to the Burying Place this Afternoon.

Hiram Keith, aged more than 78 years, a Civil War veteran and a
man known through this section, died at his home in Steamburg
Wednesday, after a sickness of some duration.

Mr. Keith was a member of Company H, 154th New York Volunteer
Infantry; he saw long service with his regiment. He was a member of
D. T. Wiggins Post, G. A. R. of Randolph, whose members will attend
the funeral at Steamburg today.

Mr. Keith was born at Ashtabula, Ohio, December 12, 1844. He
married Eunice Graves July 5, 1865, and she with two sons, George
and Fred Keith, survive. There are also eight grandchildren and four
great-grandchildren.

Deceased has lived in Steamburg and near Randolph for many years,
where he has become to be known as a man to be respected. His com-
rades in the Grand Army speak of his service to the country as being
of the highest type.
