I hope this gets to you for the Fourth of July Celebration. I wanted to give you a complete package, but time ran out. I will follow up with the complete package later.

## Enclosed are the following:

- 1.) I didn't want Lafayette Lamb forgotten. He was a younger brother to Moses Boyden Lamb and he died from Typhoid Fever. They asked for volunteers to remain with the sick, no one seemed to remain with the sick comrade. Finally Lafayette volunteered and two others also stayed. Within three days the one who was ill died and immediately after Lafayette was stricken with the same fever and only survived five days, leaving a widow and three small boys without husband or father. He is buried at Brookfield, Missouri. Date of death is Sept. 05, 1861. He had enlisted at Decorah, Iowa, April 1861 in Co. D Third Iowa Vol. Inft.
- 2.) Roster of the 154<sup>th</sup> New York Inft. Along with Moses Boyden Lamb, there were other members related to our family. Calvin Wright, Landers Wright and several Covell family members.
- 3.) Monument at Gettysburg. I have many pictures of Gettysburg Battlefield especially those taken from the tower that was demolished. Have to get them together.
- 4.) The next two pictures are of Moses Boyden Lamb.
- 5.) I have enclosed copies of his discharge papers signed by his father the Hon. Rensselaer Lamb who was a Cattaraugus Co. Judge for twelve years. Rensselaer came to Machias, N.Y. sometime after 1830 when

his father moved from Town of Lenox, Madison Co., New York to Town of Scriba, Oswego Co., New York. Rensselaer later moved to Ellicottville, Cattaraugus Co., New York.

- 6.) This is a picture taken of his Co. G 154th Regt., N.Y. Vol. Inft.
- 7.) Picture of Moses Boyden Lamb residence in Machias, New York.
- 8.) Gravestone which has been replaced since I visited cemetery.

  Moses was on the association that formed the Maple Grove Cemetery.
- 9.) I have included copies of the family from the Sixth Generation, Silas Lamb down to my father, Charles Everett Lamb. I have much typing to do. The Lamb families are spread throughout the United States and there were 2049 Lamb's who fought in the Civil War from the North & South. Cousins fighting Cousins.







#### Sixth Generation

A Record of the family of Silas Lamb and his wife Lucena (Pratt) Lamb.

Silas <sup>6</sup> (Samuel <sup>5</sup>, Ebenezer <sup>4</sup>, Abiel <sup>3</sup>, Abiel <sup>2</sup>, Thomas <sup>1</sup>.)

Silas Lamb was born at Town of Charlton, Worchester Co., Massachusetts May 26, 1778. He married Lucena Pratt, Dau of Joseph and Ester (Blood) Pratt on January 12, 1804. Lucena was born April 29, 1782.

Silas and Lucena had one son born in Massachusetts and then removed to Town of Middlefield-Cherry Valley, Otsego Co., New York, from there to Town of Lenox, Madison Co., New York, where he resided until 1834. Silas then moved to the Town of Scriba, Oswego Co., N.Y., with his sons Charles, Morris, Jairus, Charles and Silas Jr. and his daughters Esther, Lauretta and Broocksania. He was a farmer in Scriba, Oswego Co., N.Y.

In Madison Co., N.Y. Silas was a Justice of the Peace in 1830 and he kept a record of the cases which came before him. The record is in an old ledger which has been preserved. After his removal to Oswego Co., N.Y., he kept the ledger as a journal. He wrote a great deal that is of interest. He was obviously a well –educated man and a very Religious man, but not in the narrowest sense. On his 60<sup>th</sup> birthday, he wrote several pages reflecting upon his "spiritual evolution" (my term for it, not his). He set forth his thinking in periods of twenty years—the first twenty he recalled as those in which he had been steeped in the strict Calvinist thinking ("hell and brimstone"), and during the next twenty years he became an atheist. During the last twenty years, he had taken a more mature approach and had arrived at the conviction that there is indeed a God, but that He is a kind and understanding God, rather than a God of wrath and punishment.

During his stay in Otsego Co., Silas had become close friends with two of his neighbors whom he did not see again for many years.

He wrote in his journal that it had been his deepest wish to have a reunion with these two old friends. The last entry in the journal (just before his death) is the account of that reunion which took place at his farm in Scriba. It was a happy note to end on.

Silas and Lucena died the same day, October 09, 1857. There is an old tradition in the family that one died at 12 noon and the other at 12 midnight, and that the last one to die did not know that the other one was gone. They are buried in an abandoned cemetery know locally as The Kingdom Cemetery, since the section of Scriba in which they lived is called The Kingdom. It is near the intersection of the Kingdom Road with the Dutch Ridge Road. Both gravestones are well-marked and perfectly legible. The cemetery actually sits on the boundary of a pasture. It sits up about 3-4 feet and is fenced with barbed wire. The graves are protected by large trees that probably have been there for the last one hundred years. There is an entrance in the back which I found by talking with the present owner of the land.

One cannot read Silas Lamb's Journal without being impressed with his character and personality. He was, indeed, a most worthy old gentleman.

I have enclosed several pages of his ledger and a partial account of Joel Baker by Elizabeth M. Edmunds who is a cousin. She did considerable research on the Lamb Family which she has sent to me.

I have more on this family, but I have to put it together. Richard.

I am enclosing a Map of Scriba, Oswego Co., New York showing where the Lamb's lived and where the cemetery is located.

Rensselaer Lamb <sup>7</sup> was born at Town of Charlton, Worcester, Massachusetts Oct. 18, 1805. His family moved to the Town of Middlefield, Cherry Valley, Otsego Co., N.Y. and from there to Town of Lenox, Madison Co., N.Y. He married Mary Ann Howard at Stockbridge, Oneida Co., New York, July 09, 1824. She was born at Town of Brookfield, Fairfield Co., Connecticut, July 02, 1807. After 1830 Rensselaer and family traveled to Machias, Cattaraugus Co., New York.

Susan Peck (Vaughan) Lamb, Her parents Charles & Emily Vaughan are buried at Brewer Cemetery. Charles died 1860, age 52, Emily died March 10, 1900, age 92y, 10m, 4d.

Mary Lucy Lamb married Edward A. Rasey at Machias, N.Y. on December 13, 1846. They lived in Mansfield township, Cattaraugus Co., N.Y. on a one hundred acre farm. After that they moved several times until she died at her daughters home in Halstead, Kansas, October 22, 1894. Her first husband died in 1877. More Later.

Moses Boyden Lamb <sup>8</sup> married Susan Peck Vaughan, September 24, 1859 at Portage, New York. She was born August 16, 1834. They began their married life on a dairy farm near Cadiz, Cattaraugus Co., N.Y. where they resided until the spring of 1861 when they moved to Great Valley township, Cattaraugus Co., N.Y onto another dairy farm where they remained until the fall of 1862. He enlisted in the army of the Civil War serving in Co. G 154<sup>th</sup> Regt., N.Y. Vol. Inft. He served during the remainder of the war, participating in the battle of Vicksburg, Corinth, Miss., Missionary Ridge, Gettsburg and several lesser battles. He was with Sherman in his march to the sea. He was honorably discharged at Washington, D.C. in June 1865. (I have enclosed a copy of his discharge papers signed by his father the Hon. Rensselaer Lamb who was a county judge at that time.)

After the war he returned to Machias, N.Y., where he purchased a farm and resumed his occupation of a farmer, which he followed until the death of his wife Susan, November 08, 1880 at Machias Junction, N.Y. In 1884 he married Margaret Patterson. He then continued to reside at Machias Junction until the death of his second wife, after which he resided with his sons Orlando and William. At the home of the latter he passed quietly away no illness, simply fell asleep at the ripe old age of 88 years and

quietly away no illness, simply fell asleep at the ripe old age of 88 years and six months at Caneadea, Allegany Co., N.Y., September 10, 1918, buried at Maple Grove Cemetery, Machias, N.Y. in the town where the greater part of his life had been spent.
