Taps Are Sounded for Ripley Veteran of the Civil War

William Lull Passed Away at Maple Street Home only Ten Days After Wife; Born in French Creek but Had Lived Here for Thirty Years; Was With Sherman in March to the Sea and Participated in the Battle of Gettysburg.

William Lull, Civil War Veteran and long time resident of Ripley, passed away at his home on Maple avenue, this village on Monday night January 30, 1933, just ten days after his wife had died, aged, 89 years.

Deceased was born at French Creek this county, January 4, 1844, and following his marriage on May 4, 1868 to Miss Ella Farnham, the couple resided for a number of years at Sherman, N. Y. where Mr. Lull followed the occupation of farming. He came to Ripley about 30 years ago, and this had since been the home of the couple, where they had a wide circle of friends who sincerely mourn their demise.

At the outbreak of the Civil War, Mr. Lull joined Company F of the 154th Regement Volunteer Infantry and served throughout the war, being in some the big engagements of that conflict, notably the Battle of Gettysburg and he was with Sherman in his march to the sea.

Mr. Luil is survived by one son, Eugene Lull, at home, and one daughter, Mrs. Harold W. Barden of the East Main road. Two grandchildren also survive.

The funeral will be held this (Thursday) afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from the late home, in charge of Rev. B. L. Middaugh, and interment will be in East Ripley cemetery.
