He was transferred from this city to Wahpeton and later to Staples, where he has since made his home. He appeared to have been in his usual good health and had just returned from New York Mills where he had taken a Finnish bath. He walked into a drug store at Staples, greeting some friends in his usual cheery manner, sat down and fell back dead. This was about 1:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon, August 25th. He was a prominent citizen of this city, and will be remembered by a host of friends here. He was a candidate for Sheriff of this county on the Republican ticket in 1898, and was Captain of Company F, the Fergus Falls militia company for two or three years. His wife died about two years ago and he is survived by four daughters. They are, Grace, now Mrs Ridgeway, Blanche, now Mrs E. E. Dampier, Georgia, whose husband died a few years ago and Mildred McKay. He was a veteran of the Civil War and was 65 years of age at the time of his death. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge here.
