Thomas G. Morgan.

Thomas George Morgan died suddenly of rheumatism of the heart at the home of his son, John F. Morgan in South Lansing at 8 o'clock this morning. Mr. Morgan had been residing at 209 Cascadilla street in this city for some time. He has been ill for about one month but was thought to be improving.

Mr. Morgan was born October 20, 1837. He was married twice, his first wife being Miss Cynthia Collins, of which marriage one son was born. He was married again in 1876 to Miss Susan Ives, of South Lansing.

He was a member of Sydney Post, G. A. R., of this city, having served in the 167th Regiment New York State Volunteers during the Civil War, and of the First M. E. church.

The funeral will be held Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the home of his son, Rev. Wallace E. Brown officiating, assisted by Rev. F. J. Allington, of Asbury. Interment in Pleasant Grove Cemetery.

The surviving relatives are his son and widow and three brothers, H. E., and J. W. Morgan, of Clarkston, Mich., and W. B. Morgan, of Pontiac, Mich.

19 In Memoriam 11

Following an illness of one month's duration, which was not considered at any time alarming, Thomas George Morgan died suddenly on Monday Sept. 18th, at the farm owned by him at South Lansing and now occupied by his only son, John F. Morgan. Mr. and Mrs. Morgan had come to the farm from Ithaca as was their frequent custom, for a few days, when the illness developed that terminated fatally. Mr. Morgan was born Oct. 20th, 1837 in the town of Lansing, being the eldest son of Nelson and Sarah George Morgan. When six years of age he moved with his parents to Hinsdale, Cattaraugus county. He taught school in early life, until enlisting at Olean July 26th, 1862 in Company C., of the 154th regiment N. Y. S. V. with which he honorably served until discharged from the service at Louisville, Kentucky, June 3d, 1865. He was wounded in May 1864 at Marietta, Georgia, when on a march to Atlanta.

Following his army life he lived in Michigan for two years, after which he came back to Lansing and married Miss Cynthia Collins, after whose death he later married Miss E. S. Ives, daughter of the late Almon Ives, of South Lansing, who survives him. He purchased the large farm known as the Samuel Drake farm in 1877 where he continued to reside until going to Carleton Island as general manager of the large estate owned by his brother-in-law, the late captain, W. O. Wyckoff, where he remained until 1904. Immediately upon his return from the Thousand Island farm, he settled in Ithaca where with his wife they have since lived a retired and happy life.

Mr. Morgan was always a man of the highest character, of the type that could well be emulated for morality, uprightness and genuine worth. He was for fifty-four years an active member of the Methodist Episcopal church, being connected at the time of his demise with the First M. E. church in Ithaca. He was a leader in the working of the church

and never a follower. No prayer or class meeting during the week was neglected by him, for the pleasures of these gatherings were his enjoyment and happiness, and as a leader of each he had few superiors. The many words and messages that have come to his family since the passing, bear evidence of his worth as a Christian worker, faithful advocate of the cause that he loved.

Besides his wife and son, three brothers, H. E. and J. W. Morgan, of Clarkston Mich., and W. B. Morgan, of Pontiac Mich., survive him. The funeral obsequies were observed at his farm home in South Lansing at 2 P. M. on Wednesday, conducted by his pastor, Rev. W. E. Brown, of Ithaca. Rev. J. F. Allington, of the Asbury charge, of which Mr. Morgan was for many years a member, assisted. Mix Post, G. A. R. of Ithaca, of which he was a member sent beautiful flowers, besides there were many floral offerings from other sources. Interment was made in Lake View.

T. George Morgan, aged 73 years, after several weeks' sickness, died very suddenly Monday morning about 8 o'clock, at the home of his son, John Morgan. Mr. Morgan with his wife resided in Ithaca but spent a good portion of their time at the old home. He was a sincere Christian man and was highly respected. He was for many years class leader in the Asbury Church and one of its most earnest workers. After moving to Ithaca he joined the First M. E. Church and when able was always in attendance. There was no place he more loved to be than the prayer service. He served in the 167th Regiment New York State Volunteers of the Civil War and was wounded. He was at one time the merchant at the Harbor but later a prosperous farmer. Besides his widow he leaves one son, John Morgan, two grandchildren, Mary and Richard Morgan, also three brothers, H. E. and J. W. Morgan, of Clarkston, Mich., and W. B. Morgan, of Pontiac, Mich. The funeral was held at the home of his son Wednesday afternoon, Rev. Wallace E. Brown, assisted by Rev. F. J. Allington officiating; burial at Pleasant Grove cemetery.
