DEATH OF B. NORTHUP

Passed Away at His Home in Toledo Wednesday Morning—Funeral Friday Afternoon

Relatives in this city have received word of the death of B. Northup who passed away at his home in Toledo at 1 o'clock Wednesday morning, aged 30 years, 2 months and 18 days. The deceased had been in failing health for the past four years suffering from lung trouble. Later brain trouble developed and for the past three months he had been confined to the bed.

Hiram Bannister Northup was the oldest son of Hiram and Louise Northup and was born and grew to manhood in this city and was educated at the public schools. The father died a year ago last November. Bannister was employed at the Cultivator plant where he learned the trade of molder. About ten years ago he went to Toledo and for a number of years was employed as brass molder at the Overland automobile plant, but was obliged to relinquish his position on account of failing health. Five years ago he was married to Miss Hazel Glass of Toledo. They located first in Detroit, later returning to Toledo, which city has since been their home. He is survived by a widow, one son Edward, 3 years old, mother and one brother Amos, of Painesville.

The mother and brother and uncle James Jones of this city were with Bannister when he passed away and will remain until after the funeral which takes place from the home 516 East Bancroft street Friday afternoon. The interment will take place in Toledo.
