March to Chancellorsville, etc. Battle of Chancellorsville and his Col. wounded, Adjt. killed, etc. 154th NY activities are cited throughout the diary. About 3 pages cover the Chancellorsville fight. Diary measures 3x5". June 12 marches for Gettysburg fight. So Ogden writes as if looking back on the campaigns. Sept 26th, they head west through Ohio. It appears that his corps went west. Next battles are around Chattanooga, Tenn. Ogden now writes almost in letter form. The activities of the Atlanta Campaing are covered. He gives names of wounded, places where wounded, etc. Some pencil entries are light but all readable. A good portion of this diary covers the Atlanta battles and in places Ogden goes back to recall and verify certain details. Some of the march through the Carolinas appears next.
