

WALKA IN BROTHERS

Joshua R. Pettit.

Joshua R. Pettit died at his home in this village Monday night after a long illness. Services will be held at the house Thursday at 2 p.m.

Mr. Pettit was the son of Amos and Rebecca (Baker) Pettit, and was born at Tonawanda Dec. 31, 1839. When a young man he came to Ellicottville and engaged in business. Aug. 12, 1862, he enlisted as a private Co. A. 134th N. Y. V. and served until the close of the war, sharing the glories of his regiment at Chancellorsville, Gettysburg, Wachatchie, Lookout Mountain, Mission Ridge, Rocky Face Ridge, Reseca, Dalton, Pumpkinville Creek, New Hope Church, Peach Tree Creek, before Atlanta, March to the Sea, campaign in the Carolinas, and the review at Washington, being honorably discharged June 11, 1865, at Bladensburg, Md.

He married Miss Sabra Simonds of Franklinville in August, 1862, just previous to his enlistment. His wife and three children, Guy M., with whom he was in partnership for several years in the hardware business here until his retirement; Laura (Mrs. C. M. Walrath) and Justin, both of this village; his brother George, also a civil war veteran, resides here.

Mr. Pettit was one of the older business men of the village of whom few are left. He was a man of strong upright character, his life one of honor and honesty, a man of kindly heart, a good friend and neighbor, and in his death the whole community has sustained a great loss.
