

In Memorium.

DORR PRICE, who died near Price's Corners in Coldspring, May 3, came of one of the oldest and most prominent families in the town. Mr. Price was born Sept. 21, 1842 on the farm where he has since lived and where he died. He grew to manhood amid the simple surroundings of a rural home, and here were laid the foundation of a pure and honest manhood. August 13, 1862, he, with his brother Joseph, enlisted in Co. A, N. Y. Vol. and for nineteen months he faithfully served his country, at the end of which time he was discharged on account of physical disability.

In September, 1877 he married Alice Lyons, who survives him. During the last eight years of his life he was afflicted with a dreadful malady, which necessitated the most careful attention on the part of his wife, who unselfishly devoted herself to his care.

Mr. Price was an honest man, fair-minded, a faithful friend, one who sought to know the best about men, and who despised the gossip and hypocrite. He was kind in his family, and neighborly to those about him. D.T. Wiggins Post, G.A.R. of Randolph, of which he was a member, attended his funeral. He was buried from his house May 5. Interment was in Steamburg cemetery.

Mrs. Alice Price, 92, Who Formerly Lived Near Randolph, Dies

Funeral services were held at Jamestown Saturday afternoon for Mrs. Alice M. Price, 92, widow of Dorr Price, and a former resident of the Price Corners neighborhood near here. Mrs. Price died at her home in Jamestown Thursday, July 3. She is survived by a sister, Miss Jennie Lyons of Mayville. Mrs. Price's husband was the youngest son of Samuel Price who acquired a large tract of land at what is now Price Corners from the Holland Land Company. It was Samuel Price who built the large house with tall, slender pillars on the Coldspring Road, overlooking Route 17 at Price Corners. James Moynihan bought the house in 1921 and removed a part of the building.

It was said that the house only cost about \$125 in cash but required a great amount of work for the hand-hewing of timbers and the construction of a huge fireplace once used for cooking.

Mrs. Price, who was a native of Dunkirk, was buried at Fredonia.
