assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of incurrection or rebailion against the United States or any claim for the less or cannelpation of any slave; but all such dabts, obligations or claims shall be held illegal and void.

NEC. 5. The Congress shall have power to cuferce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.
