

MERRICK PRICE,

Son of Nathaniel G. and Ann (Westfall) Price, was born Feb. 18, 1833, in Steamburg, Cattaraugus Co., N. Y.; he enlisted from that county Aug. 27, 1862, in Co. K, 154th Regt. N. Y. V. I., and served until Dec. 7, 1862, when, at Fairfax, Va., on account of physical disability, he was honorably discharged; he was mostly employed in scouting, skirmishing, and in general guard and garrison duty. Two half brothers of Mr. Price were in Indiana Regts. In Sept. 1862, before going to the front, Mr. Price was granted a week's furlough; he returned to Cattaraugus County, where, Sept. 7, 1862, at Leon, he married C. A. Cunningham, a native of Conewango, N. Y., born July 24, 1845. Six children have been born to this union: Emma E., Alson H., Minnie J., Marion J., Alta L., and Florence A. Mrs. Price's parents were Joseph and Cynthia (Russell) Cunningham; both of whom have long since passed away. The former was drafted into the British army in the war of 1812, and was three times wounded; but lived to the age of 75, and carried with him to the grave a bullet received in battle. Comrade Price was Constable of Conewango, N. Y. In 1891 he moved to Bear Lake, Warren County, Pa., where he is now engaged in farming, and draws a pension.

**MERRICK B. PRICE  
DIES AT FALCONER**

**Veteran of Civil War Passes  
Away at Age of Ninety-  
four Years.**

Merrick B. Price, Civil War veteran, one of the oldest men in Chautauqua County and a resident of Falconer for nearly 25 years, died at his home in South Work Street, Falconer, Saturday morning at 5 o'clock, aged 94 years, 5 months and 12 days. He is survived by two sons, Alson H. Price and Marion J. Price of Jamestown and four daughters, Mrs. Emma E. Harmon of South Dayton, Mrs. Minnie J. Terry of Pontiac, Mich., and Mrs. Alta L. Lockwood and Mrs. Florence A. Phelps of Panama.

Mr. Price was born at Steamburg, February 18, 1833 and spent his entire lifetime in Western New York and in Warren County, Pa. He enlisted in Company K, 154th New York Volunteer Infantry on August 27, 1862 and served until December 7th of that year, when he was honorably discharged by reason of physical disability. In September, 1862, before the 154th left for the front, he secured a furlough and was married at Leon, six children being born to this union. For several years he served as constable at Conewango and later was engaged in farming for several years at Bear Lake, Pa. He was a member of James M. Brown Post, Grand Army of the Republic of Jamestown.

The funeral will be held from the home this (Monday) afternoon at 2 o'clock. Burial will be in the Allen Cemetery.
