

CONEWANGO VALLEY HOTEL MAN IS DEAD

W. F. ROSS DIED ON SUNDAY AT HIS HOME

WAS A CIVIL WAR VETERAN

Popular and Well Known Landlord is Survived by Four Daughters and Eight Grandchildren—The Funeral was Largely Attended.

Conewango Valley, Nov. 11. — Welcome F. Ross died at his home Sunday evening, aged 77 years and 6 months. He had resided here 42 years and had been continuously engaged in the hotel business during that time. He was a highly respected citizen and a Civil War veteran, having served in the 154th New York Volunteer Infantry. He leaves four daughters, Mrs. Jessie Hermance of Otto, Mrs. Maude Schrott of Dunkirk, Mrs. Alva Parker of Binghamton and Mrs. Helen Barhite of Conewango Valley; also eight grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren. The funeral was held Wednesday at 2 p. m. from the home.
