

#### OBITUARY

Following is the obituary of A. L. Scutt as it was published in last week's News-Journal; it having failed to reach this office in time for publication last week:

Addison L. Scutt was born in Dryden, Tompkins county, N. Y., October 15, 1833. He attended school at Alfred Center, N. Y., and afterward engaged in the lumber business at Weston's Mills, N. Y. He enlisted in Company C, 154th Regiment N. Y. Volunteers, in August, 1862, and served until the close of the war.

After the war he returned to Portville, N. Y., and went to farming. In 1878 while clearing his farm, he was caught by a root of a tree and his left knee was so badly crushed that it was necessary to amputate the limb. In 1894 he came to Nebraska and engaged in the dry goods business. In 1905 he went to South Dakota and lived on a claim near Pierre. After proving up on it he returned to Nebraska, but did not feel that he had seen enough of the world, and in the spring of 1908 he went to Colorado, where, near Florence, he began to make a new home. Here in June he was taken sick and has ever since been an invalid.

He peacefully passed away Friday, May 28, 1910.

He was married in June 1859 to Juliette Withersee, who survives him. Five children were born to this union, four of whom are still living: Addison W. and Leonard Scutt at Portville, N. Y., Arthur L. Scutt at Leigh, Nebraska, and Mrs. Lulu T. Storch, at Fullerton.
