PROMINENT JAMESTOWN MAN  
DIED TUESDAY MORNING

Dec 28 1915  
S. Winsor Baker, Son-in-law of Mrs. James T. Edwards, Succumbed to Disease.

S. Winsor Baker died Tuesday morning at his home at the corner of Church and East Second streets, in Jamestown. He was 51 years of age. Mr. Baker was taken seriously ill in the summer of 1914 and with his wife spent some time in the Bermudas. He returned home in very much better health. Last fall he was again taken ill and had planned as soon as his health had sufficiently improved, to go to a southern climate.

Mr. Baker is survived by his aged mother, Mrs. Richard H. Baker, his wife, Mrs. Grace Edwards Baker, a daughter, Miss Dorothea E. Baker, and a son, James Winsor Baker, all of Jamestown; two brothers, Lewis H. Baker of Jamestown and Frederick J. Baker of Pittsburgh. His eldest son, Richard E. Baker, died in young manhood in August, 1914. His daughter, Miss Dorothea Baker, left Monday to resume her studies at a Boston school. At her father's request she did not remain after the close of the holiday vacation. She was enroute to Boston when a telegram announcing her father's death reached her and she returned immediately to Jamestown.

Mr. Baker was the general manager of the Gurney Ball Bearing company. He had been connected with that company for the past three years and his loss will be keenly felt by his business associates. Mr. Baker was a member of the First Presbyterian church of Jamestown and was an elder of that church. He was a member of the Young Men's Christian association and of the Board of Directors of that institution. He was a member of the Board of Commerce and had taken a great interest in the work of that body. He was also a member of the Jamestown club, a member of the governing body of that organization and of the treasurer of the club. As a member of the Masonic fraternity of Jamestown he took an active interest in lodge affairs. He was for many years a member of the Jamestown Volunteer Fire department and for five years was a member of the 13th Separate Company of the National Guard, now Company E., 65th Regiment.

EXPIRED AT PASADENA THIS  
MORNING

WAS AN EAST RANDOLPH BOY

Went to California Several Years Ago where he Enjoyed Some Relief from Attacks of Asthma—Mother and Sister Reside Here.

Clayton Crawford, well known in this section, died this morning at his home in Pasadena, California, according to advices received by his sister, Mrs. William Gallagher of this village.

Mr. Crawford had been an acute sufferer from asthma, and it is supposed that his heart failed in one of the severe attacks which he suffered.

Clayton Crawford was son of the late Daniel Crawford of East Randolph and is survived by his mother and two sisters. Mrs. Crawford lives at East Randolph, Mrs. Gallagher in Randolph, and Mrs. Bates, another sister at Pasadena. Deceased was about 51 years of age; he has been in California more than twenty years, where he has been connected with business interests. Beside his relatives here he is survived by his wife and one daughter.

January 4, 1883

Edgar Shannon died at Leon; more than 2,000 persons attended the funeral. He was a survivor of the 54th N. Y. regiment; twice a member of the state assembly and five times a supervisor of his township.

The funeral was largely attended from his late home Monday at 1 o'clock. Rev. Mr. McIntyre of Steam Springs officiated and burial was made in the Conango cemetery.
