### Death of Addison Stone.

The community was saddened last  
Thursday by the news of the death of  
one of our oldest and most respected  
citizens, Addison Stone, at Green-  
wood, Neb., where he had gone for a  
visit with his son Will. While it was  
known that Mr. Stone was in very  
poor health, and that his death was  
expected, yet the news came as a shock  
to his many friends here. His demise  
removes one who has been a prominent  
business man of this city for the great-  
er part of three decades. The funeral  
was from St. Michael's Church, Father  
Delfosse officiating.

Addison Stone was born August 30,  
1841, at Olean, N. Y. When a young  
man he came as far west as Havana,  
Ill., where he resided until 1872, when  
he came to Merrick County, Nebraska.  
While living in Illinois he was united  
in marriage to Miss Catherine Joyce,  
who survives him. Four children  
were born to them, Will, who is in the  
mercantile business at Greenwood;  
John, who is now in the West; Clem-  
ent, practicing medicine at Doniphan;  
and Jamie, of this city. Up to a few  
months ago Mr. Stone was in the  
clothing business in this city, but fall-  
ing health made it necessary for him  
to retire from active business life.  
This decision came too late, however,  
and he gradually became worse, pass-  
ing away at his son's residence.

A model citizen, a quiet, unassum-  
ing Christian gentleman, a loyal friend  
—such a man was Addison Stone.  
Truly, it could be said of him, "The  
path of the just is as a shining light,  
that shineth ever and ever more fully  
unto the perfect day." The G. A. R.  
and W. R. C. assisted in the services  
and a large concourse of old friends  
paid their last tribute of respect to  
the dead by their presence. After the  
storms and trials of a pioneer life,  
peace from the world's jangling tumult  
has come to him. May he rest in  
peace until the New Day dawns.
