Volumes Prove Rare V. A. Broks

Geneseo Gets Books From Pavilion Dealers

PAVILION - About 18 months ago Joseph Aspinall bought the contents of a house in Franklinville, Cattaraugus County, and he and Mrs. Aspinall, antique deslers, hauled

Now, through purchase and gift, they are in the library of the State University College at Geneseo, whose officials comb the world for important volumes.

This time they found them only 13 miles from the university.

Grandchildren of Mai. Henry Van Aernam, a civil War surgeon attached to the General Staff in Washington, were disposing of the property when Mr. Aspinall, a former justice of the peace for the town of Pavilion, offered to buy the contents.

We hauled those books down three flights of stairs." Mrs. Aspinall recalled.

Maj. Van Aernam was in the Legislature in the late 1850s and early in the Civil War became a brigade surgeon in the XI Corps. In 1864 he was elected to the House of Representatives and it was apparently at that time that he acquired the volumes in Washington. He later went back to Washington as congressman in the 1880s.

President Grant appointed the major to a brief term as commissioner of pensions. But he practiced for years in Franklinville and his family had since resided in that area.

The volumes include 57 of the Congressional Globe, predecessor of the Congressional Record, from 1833 to 1868 and 17 volumes of the American State Papers, which include major documents and business of the federal government from 1789 to 1838.

The collection will be preserved in the Documents Sec tion of Milne Library.

Mrs. Aspinall has more than forty letters written by Maj. Van Aernam from Virginia battlefields, substantiating the "slaughter and disorganization" which author Bruce Catton has described. The major also mentioned being on the reviewing stand for a parade with the Lincolns when Mrs. Lincoln "flirted with the generals."

Mrs. Aspinall says she doesn't know what Mr. Aspinall will buy next. His latest agent, acquisitions include contents of a drug store and a piano studio.


The enthusiastic responses to school are one of the least unusual features of the Board of Co-operative Educational Services (BOCES) Summer school program at the John Kennedy School.

Attendance last week at the non-compulsory school was 98.7 per cent and Reyburn Campbell, assistant director of the program, said one student's mother told him that the children wish they could come on Saturday and Sunday.

The Summer School is designed to help the educationally disadvantaged child move ahead intellectually and socially.

Ninety-five children are enrolled. Most of their parents are or were migrant farm workers in the area.
