DEATH TAKES C. P. VEDDER

Former Senator Succumbed to sudden Heart Attack

LONG PUBLIC CAREER

Gallant Record as Soldier in Civil War was followed by activity in Politics, with Four Years as Assemblyman and Ten as Senator. A Native of Ellicottville and once One of the most Influential Men in Southwestern New York.

Commodore Perry Vedder, at one time one of the most prominent and influential men of Cattaraugus county, former senator from this district and author of the inheritance tax law, died suddenly in New York city Saturday afternoon. He was taken ill with a heart attack Friday night at his apartments in the Hotel Majestic, where he had for some time lived, and failed steadily until the end came. Funeral services were held at the Hotel Majestic Monday morning, Rev. Dr. G.C. Houghton of the Little Church around the Corner officiating. Interment will be made at Ellicottville, for many years Senator Vedder's home.

Mr. Vedder was born at Ellicottville, Feb. 23, 1838, and spent his boyhood on a farm in that town. In early manhood he worked on the Erie canal, finally shipped as a sailor before the mast and rose to the position of captain at the early age of 19. All this time he was saving money to pay for an education, and the outbreak of the war found him a student at Springville Academy. He also had taught school for a short time.

Deciding that his duty lay in responding to the call of his country, he enlisted as a private in the 154th (break in clipping)

the campaign at Atlanta."

Returning to his native state, Col. Vedder studied law and was admitted to the bar. He had been a Democrat before the war, but actively interested himself in Republican politics thereafter and held numerous important state and federal offices, besides being a frequent delegate to state and local conventions. He was register in bankruptcy from 1867 to 1875, when he resigned, assessor of internal revenue from 1869 to 1871 and state assessor from 1880 to 1883 between his two periods of service in the senate. It is said that Senator Platt urged him to be a candidate for governor.

Mr. Vedder's long legislative career began with his election to the assembly, where he served continuously for four years. He was on the judiciary committee throughout his term of service in the assembly and also on other important committees, including canals and Indian affairs. During the first year of his service he was made chairman of the committee to draft articles of impeachment against Justice Barnard of Tweed Ring notoriety and was one of the managers at the trial of that official, evincing legal ability of a high order and a wide

knowledge of parliamentary proceedings.

He was first elected to the senate in 1875 and took a prominent part in the debates of that body, serving as chairman of Indian affairs and internal affairs. After his service as state assessor, he returned to the state senate and represented the Cattaraugus-Chautauqua District continuously for eight years from 1884 to 1891. During nearly all this time he was chairman of the committee on taxation and retrenchments and also chairman of Indian affairs. He had thoroughly

familiarized himself with the taxation question and was the author of the laws taxing inheritances and requiring corporations to pay a tax for organization.

As a result of these measures millions of dollars have been paid into the treasury and a permanent source of revenue provided which aided materially in the abolition of the direct property tax. He was also the author of the Vedder liquor bill, which was a high license measure and was supported by the Republican party in (break in clip-

ping)

In the business world Mr. Vedder was a conspicuous factor. He was president of many corporations, including the State Bank of Norwood, the New York & New Jersey Ice Lines, the Elko Mining & Manufacturing Company and the Falls Electric Power & Land Company. He was a member of the Presbyterian church, of the Grand Army of the Republic, and of the Masonic fraternity. He was also a member of the Holland Society, the Republican Club, and the Lawyers' Club, all of New York city.

Mr. Vedder was married to Bettie E. Squires of Springville on Septmeber 21, 1862, and to Mrs. Genevieve A. Wheeler of Chicago,

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
