Mr. Walrath was born in Herkinger Co. Aug. 28, 1826, and was in the seventy fourth year of his age at the time of his death. At twelve years of age he worked on the Eric canal and came to Cattarangus when seventeen. In 1850, he married Miss Mary Ann Rickards of Arcade. Just before the war Mr. and Mr. Walrath became charter members of the Free Baptist church at Sugartown. On the 11th day of August 1862, at the age of thirty-five, Captain Leonard B. Saxton enlisted Mr. Walrath into his company, A. 154th N. Y. Vols., at which time he kissed his babe, lying in the cradle-now Walter D. Walrath, the leading general merchant of Ellicottville, -and hastened away to the defense of his country and flag at one of the most critical periods of the War of the Great Rebellion. During his three years service he scarcely missed a day's service, was captured at the battle of Chancellorsville, parolled eleven days afterward and served until the end of the war. His friends are without number and an enemy is yet to be found.
