Only One Civil War Vet Remains in Villenova Township

SOUTH DAYTON—Franklin D. Weaver, 92 years old last January 14, is the only remaining veteran of the Civil War in the town of Villenova, four miles from here. Mr. Weaver has been in excellent health until a month ago, when he was confined to his bed for a large portion of the time.

Born in Michigan, he has spent most of his life in New York state, around Perrysburg and for the past 12 years near Hamlet.

He joined the Co. F 154 N. Y. Volunteers and saw service in 1862 and until the latter part of 1863, appearing in many of the decisive engagements of the Civil War.

His wife, Jennie Weaver, died in 1914. There are two children, Elton Weaver and Ida W. Marvin, both of whom reside in the town of Villenova.

Chadwick Is Candidate For Sheriff Nomination; Four Aspirants in Field

Under Sheriff Roy L. Chadwick of this city yesterday announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for Sheriff of Chautauqua County in the primary to be held on Tuesday, September 15th.

With the announcement by Mr. Chadwick there are now four aspirants for the nomination, the others being Ernest L. Danielson of Frewsburg, Walter S. Christopherson of Jamestown and Axel Levin of Busti, a former Sheriff.

Mr. Chadwick has had a long experience in the Sheriff's Department, his service as a deputy and later as Under Sheriff covering a period of 21 years. He was first appointed a deputy by Sheriff William H. Marvin and was reappointed by Sheriffs James S. McCallum, Charles E. Brown, Axel Levin and Earl J. Sardeson. When Major Samuel A. Brown of Jamestown took office as Sheriff nearly six years ago, he appointed Mr. Chadwick as Under Sheriff, an office he has continued to hold under Sheriff Harry D. Montgomery.

Mr. Chadwick was born in Jamestown 49 years ago and has always lived here. He was educated in the public schools and early in life went to work for the American Express Company which later became the American Railway Express. He continued with the express company for a quarter century, resigning upon his appointment as Under Sheriff.

Active on Committee.

He has been active in the affairs of the Republican party since he became a voter. Elected to the Republican City and County Committees about 25 years ago, Mr. Chadwick has remained a member of those committees ever since, with the exception of one year when he retired because of redistricting. He was chairman of the City Committee at two different periods, his combined service having covered more than a dozen years when he resigned last Summer but continued as a member of the Committee.

Mr. Chadwick is a member of the Lions' Club, the Elks and the Ariel Athletic Club. He is married and has one daughter, Mrs. Marlon Peterson of this city, and a nephew and ward, Allison P. Olson, a graduate of the University of

Alabama and the Albany Law School.

The only other primary contest that has developed up to the present is for Representative in Congress. Representative Daniel A. Reed of Dunkirk, who has represented the 43d District since 1919, will be opposed by Clare Barnes, who announced his candidacy several months ago. No candidates have been announced in opposition to the renomination of State Senator Leigh G. Kirkland, Fredonia; Assemblyman Lloyd J. Babcock, First District, Assemblyman Carl E. Darling, Second District; County Judge Lee L. Ottaway, Jamestown; County Clerk Ellen Yates Miller, Mayville; Coroner, David Lincoln, Driftwood.

A meeting of the Republican County Committee has been called for next Saturday afternoon at Mayville, at which the matter of endorsing primary candidates will be presented for consideration.

MRS. SWETLAND DIES AT HOME

Wife of Brocton Physician
Had Recently Observed
Wedding Anniversary.

BROCTON, July 6.—The funeral of Mrs. Evangeline Sweetland, wife of Dr. Benjamin S. Sweetland, will be held at the home on Highland Avenue tomorrow (Tuesday) at 2:30 P. M. (DST). Burial is to be made in the Evergreen Cemetery at Portland.

Mrs. Sweetland died on July 4th after a short illness. Mrs. Sweetland became the bride of Dr. Benjamin S. Sweetland, in young womanhood and for sixty years had experienced the pleasures and satisfactions of the wife of a doctor with a country practice.

She was born in the town of Portland in 1857, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Milton Munson, who were of the pioneer Munsons, early settlers in the community and prominent in the affairs of the town nearly a century ago.

Since her marriage to Dr. Sweetland she had lived practically all of her married life in Brocton. On May 13th she and her husband celebrated quietly their sixtieth wedding anniversary.

Surviving is the husband, Dr. Sweetland, Brocton, one daughter, Mrs. Mable Lynch, also of this place, two sons, Herbert Sweetland of Buffalo and Arthur Sweetland, Erie; a brother, Samuel Munson, Cherry Creek and a sister, Mrs. Ada Taylor, Westfield. Grandchildren are: Miss Mable Lynch, Jay and Edwin Lynch, Mrs. Evelyn Christy, Brocton, Mrs. Marian Lewis, Buffalo, Arthur Sweetland, Jr., Erie, besides several great-grandchildren.

VETERAN OF CIVIL WAR DIES AT HOME

Franklin D. Weaver of
Hamlet Had Been Ill for
Three Months.

HAMLET, July 10.—Franklin D. Weaver, 92 years old, one of the last veterans of the Civil War in Northern Chautauqua is dead in his home in Hamlet following an illness of three months. There are now only nine Civil War veterans remaining in the county.

Mr. Weaver enlisted as a Corporal in Co. F, 154th New York Infantry at the outbreak of the war, and served with the Army of the Potomac. He is survived by two children, Mrs. Claire Marvin and Elton D. Weaver and several grandchildren and great grandchildren of Hamlet.

The funeral will be held at the family home Saturday at 1:30 P. M. (EST). Rev. C. C. Ross officiating, with interment in the Perrysburg Cemetery.
