FIVE MEET AN AWFUL DEATH

Sugartown Family Burned out and Several Members Lose Lives

A terrible casualty by which five persons came to their death resulted over in Sugartown last Friday night. The Franklinville correspondent of the Buffalo Evening Times had the following particular which are correct:

Robert Woodard, aged 74 years, a well known farmer, living four miles west of Franklinville, together with four members of his family were burned to death early Friday morning in a fire which destroyed the Woodard home.

The others to meet death were Mrs. Alfredine Holmes, 61 years old; Berger Robbins, 12 years old; Marie Robbins, 8 years old, and Mabel Woodard, two years old.

Floyd Woodard, his wife and their 16 year-old son, Louis, escaped from the burning building, as did also Mr. Holmes, husband of the woman who met death. Robert Woodard was father of Floyd Woodard; Mr. and Mrs. Holmes were parents of Mrs. Floyd Woodard, the Robbins children were the offspring of Mrs. Woodard by a former marriage, while Mabel Woodard was the daughter of Floyd Woodard and wife.

The three families were living together for the winter in Robert Woodard's home.

A number of blankets had been stretched near a stove which was piled full of wood Thursday night before the family retired. These caught fire and stated the flames which destroyed the home and its contents.

The roaring fire shut off the escape of those upstairs. Louis Robbins, 16 year old, jumped from a second story window, his step-father, Floyd Woodard followed his example, and Mrs. Woodard fought her way down the stairs through the smoke and fire and out into safety. She was badly burned about the face and head.

The aged man and woman failed to get out of the building. Whether they perished in their beds or got out into some portion of the building burning house and were overcome by smoke is not certain.

The funeral was held at the Baptist church at Sugartown and was largely attended. Rev. Hermon of the Presbyterian church at Ellicottville officiating. Mrs. Holmes was buried at Kennedy and the others at the Sugartown cemetery.
