

Dangerously Kicked.

E. Parker, living 12 miles southwest went home from the city Saturday night and while unhitching his team one of the horses kicked him in the forehead and temple, and he has been in a critical condition since.

ANOTHER RESPECTED CITIZEN GONE.

Mr. E. Parker of 11 miles southwest, who we referred to as being dangerously kicked by a horse last Saturday, died Wednesday, at 5 o'clock in the evening, aged 65 years, two months. Undertaker Louis Miller took charge of the remains. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Todd at the Congregational church Thursday, after which the remains were laid in their last resting place in the A. O. U. W. cemetery. The heartfelt sympathies of friend of the family are extended to them in this their hour of sad loss.

A Sad Death.

Last Saturday, Mr. Parker who lives ten miles northwest of Alva purchased a mule and while taking it home it broke away from him. In trying to tie it to his horse the animal struck him in the head from the effects of which he died Tuesday night, Sept. 29. His body was buried in the A. O. U. W. cemetery west of Alva yesterday. Mr. Parker was one of our best citizens and respected by all who knew him. He leaves a wife and several children. He was a member of the Woodmen and his funeral was conducted under their auspices. Mrs. Jane F. Parker, aged seventy-seven years, passed away on November 27 at the home of a daughter, Mrs. John Fisher, of Nevada. Mrs. Parker was born September 4, 1841, in New York and was married to Mr. Parker on November 7, 1861. To that union nine children were born, five boys and four girls. The husband, two daughters and one son preceded her to the other world. She was a member of the Methodist church and is said to have been a good Christian woman. The following children survive: Bert Parker of Oklahoma, Mrs. John Fisher Nevada, Mrs. C. B. Todd of Kansas, Perl Parker of Arkansas, and Kenneth and Harry Parker of Oklahoma. The funeral service was held at 2:30 o'clock last Friday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Fisher. Rev. Edgar P. Reed, pastor of the First M. E. church, officiating.
