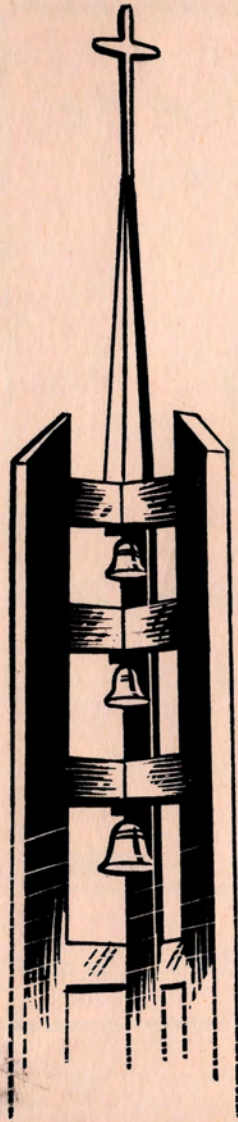

THE BONAVENTURE MAN

He cherishes self-respect. He is clean of thought, of word, of action, he prizes his honor as the gospel "pearl of great price," as a radiant heritage come down to him from generations of noble forebears.

He is considerate towards others. Putting them in his own place, transferring to them his own personality, he treats them as courteously as he should wish to be treated himself. He is prompt to assist them in their need, even anticipating their request.

He observes gentlemanly restraint. He is cheerful without being boisterous; companionable without being boresome; studious without being pedantic. He has the happy faculty of enjoying himself with moderation, and therefore without regret.

He has a keen sense of fair play. He carries no favor, no undue privileges. He knows how to take a just defeat without claiming some abstruse "moral victory." He recognizes courage and ability even though they work to the disadvantage of the home team.

He is loyal—to his teams, to his fellows, to his Alma Mater. His loyalty—no mere abstract ideal, however lucent—makes him active in the affairs of the school. He can always be depended upon to do his part.

He has a hundred admirable traits, all amounting to the one: he is always and everywhere a gentleman.

FOREWORD

This book is intended for the good of the student body in general. Its aim is to put before the students of St. Bonaventure a few general regulations which have been found necessary to carry out the University's ideal of educating and forming young men in the art of living happily and peaceably with God and man.

More or less instinctively we are inclined to dislike laws and regulations. We know, however, that a "law is a mandatory rule of action promulgated by a competent authority for the common good." It is this last element that we are likely to overlook and forget, namely all our personal advantages are included in "the common good." The observance of a law or regulation may in a particular case be irksome to an individual but it is only fair-minded to reflect and realize that ultimately the observance of law redounds to my general and particular advantage. If a rule restrains me from giving in to my own impulses I should remember that this same rule restrains others whose impulses would encroach upon my rights.

If we were all perfect there would be no need of rules and regulations; but in a university world where a community of over one thousand men live so closely together, rules and regulations are not merely expedient, but necessary to make life liveable.

The rules contained in this little book are the outgrowth of long established customs and university traditions. They are not arbitrary legislation. Their observance will guarantee a peaceful, enjoyable and successful school year to each individual and to the student body in general.

Any menial can violate a rule; it takes a man of character to observe it. The animal in us makes us violent but that part of us which makes us more than an animal, a human being, is that which makes us gentlemen. A gentleman has consideration of others at all times.

These rules and regulations governing your university life here depend for their observance upon your honesty, your spirit of co-operation with the authorities, and your loyalty to St. Bonaventure.

DINNING HALL REGULATIONS

(1) Only Resident Students of this University will eat in in the Dining Hall. Any other student attempting to take a meal in the Dining Hall will be dismissed from the University.

(2) The schedule for meals is as follows:

(3) Each meal will start at the scheduled time, and any student arriving late will be refused admission to the Dining Hall.

(4) No Student will be admitted to the evening meal who is not wearing proper attire, which includes suit coat, trousers (not dungarees), shirt and tie.

(5) a) In the Dining Hall the students are expected to conduct themselves at all times in gentlemanly fashion, and no loud or boisterous behavior will be tolerated.

b) No smoking will be permitted at meal times inside the Dining Hall.

c) Prayers will be said before and after each meal. During the prayers, the students are to stand at respectful attention.

d) Upon arriving in the Dining Hall, the students shall remain standing at the places assigned them until the prayers have been said. No one shall leave his place during the meal itself, but after the prayers at the close of the meal, all shall leave immediately.

e) Any student found damaging the Dining Hall table—Silver and China Ware will be billed for the damages.

N.B. Any student violating these regulations is liable to receive from two to five demerits and to be dismissed from the Dining Hall.

GENERAL INFORMATION

1. An announcement is considered promulgated if it is published on the Bulletin Board of the Dean of Discipline or the Dean of Studies, in the Dining Hall, or on the Bulletin Boards of the various residence halls.

It takes effect 24 hours after promulgation unless otherwise stipulated.

IGNORANCE DOES NOT EXCUSE

2. Any student who willfully or carelessly defaces or destroys University property must pay for its replacement or repair.

3. For the benefit of the students, the Cafeteria will open after the evening study period and remain open until 10:50 P.M.

4. The LOST and FOUND department is located in the Office of Discipline.

5. All students are to carry their I D cards at all times.

6. When attending Holy Mass on Sunday or a Holy Day of Obligation, students are to be in proper attire (i.e. dress trousers, shirt, tie, suit coat) and to have a clean shave.

DISCIPLINE

In order that a student's conduct may be evaluated in definite terms, the demerit system shall be in effect.

Violations of rules shall be accompanied by various demerits according to the seriousness of the offenses. Certain serious offenses may entail additional penalties according to the discretion of the Board of Discipline.

Sanction

FIVE (5) Demerits:
Loss of weekend privilege or one week's campus.

THIRTY (30) Demerits:
Campus, i.e. the privation of all out-permissions and privileges for thirty (30) days. Placement on Strict Disciplinary Probation for the remainder of the semester. Letter to be sent to the parents or guardian to advise them of the student's standing.

FIFTY (50) Demerits:
Suspension from the University for the period of one semester with resultant loss of academic credit for the semester.

SIXTY (60) Demerits:
Forced withdrawal from the University.

Disciplinary Probation

A. Simple Disciplinary Probation

1. Any student accumulating 15 demerits shall be referred by his Prefect to the Dean of Discipline.
2. The Dean of Discipline shall take such action as he feels is warranted relative to the student. In addition, he will place the student on Simple Disciplinary Probation for the remainder of the semester (if this happens within the last month of the semester, it will include the following semester also).

This rating merely constitutes a warning to the student that his conduct is unsatisfactory.

B. Strict Disciplinary Probation

1. Any student who has accumulated 30 demerits shall be referred by his Prefect to the Dean of Discipline.
2. The Dean of Discipline will take the action stated in the sanctions above for 30 demerits. If this occurs within the last month of the semester, it will include the following semester also. This rating carries with it the penalty that on the next violation of the rules, the student will automatically be brought before the Board of Discipline for their decision as to the action to be taken.

Punishments

A. Most Grave Penalty:

1. Gross disrespect for authority
2. Immorality in any form whatsoever
3. Drunkenness
4. Introduction of intoxicating liquors into, or the use of them on University premises. PLEA OF FIRST OFFENSE SHALL NOT BE CONSIDERED

5. Serious theft
6. Notable and vicious destruction of property.
7. Gambling of a serious nature
8. ANY unauthorized absence at night. PLEA OF FIRST OFFENSE SHALL NOT BE CONSIDERED
9. Possession in ones room or use on the University premises of lethal weapons (firearms, bow and arrows, etc.) (Suspension for one semester).
10. Deliberate failure to register one's motor vehicle as required. (Suspension for one semester).

B. Grave Penalty:

1. Possession or use of Master Keys
2. Breaking a restriction to campus
3. Gambling

C. Less Grave Penalty:

1. Failure to remain in his own room during the evening study period (7:45-10:00 P.M.) in quiet and industry—2 Demerits
2. Use of radio and musical instruments during study periods is absolutely forbidden. Violation of this rule: 2 Demerits for first two times; thereafter, confiscation of instrument or radio.
3. Each student must have permission of his respective Prefect to be in Library or other Halls during Study Sessions. Violation: 2 Demerits
4. Boisterous conduct or rowdiness in rooms, lavatories or corridors forbidden at all times. Violation: 2 Demerits
5. Ball playing in rooms or corridors is strictly forbidden Violation: 5 Demerits
6. All loud talk, loud playing of radios or other disturbances forbidden after 11:00 P.M. Showers are forbidden after 11:00 P.M. Every student must be in his quarters. Violation: 2 Demerits.
7. Disturbances of any sort after 12:00 Midnight, strictly forbidden. Violation: 5 Demerits
8. All lights in rooms, etc. must be out by 12:00 Midnight. Violation: 2 Demerits

9. Late return from out-permissions: 1 Demerit for every five minutes or fraction thereof
10. Failure to follow the procedure set down for obtaining and using week-end out-permissions, and for signing out in the Office of Discipline will be punished by 5 Demerits
11. For any other disturbances, violations of order or discipline, Prefects may give demerits at their discretion up to 5 Demerits.

OUT-PERMISSIONS

1. After 7:45 P.M. no student is allowed to leave the campus without specific permission of his respective Prefect
2. Out-permission on Saturday night shall be granted only to the students entitled to such
3. Freshmen are allowed out only one night a week—Saturday night. They must be in their dorms by 12:00 Midnight.

Upperclassmen are permitted out on Saturday night until 1:00 A.M. Prefects, at their discretion, are permitted to grant one other night during the week. OFF CAMPUS MEETINGS ARE CONSIDERED NIGHTS OUT

4. On nights, when general out-permission is granted by the Dean of Discipline, EVERY STUDENT, whether he used the out-permission or not, must check in to his respective Prefect in person, by 12:00 Midnight.
5. When an out-permission is granted to a student, he must check in to his respective Prefect by 12:00 Midnight.
6. Extension of the 12:00 Midnight, or the 1:00 A.M. out-permission may be given only by the Dean of Discipline.

WEEK-END PERMISSIONS

1. Permission to spend the week-end off campus will be granted to students in good standing. Procedure: Obtain from the Prefect a "Request for Week-End Out-Permission" slip, filled in and signed by him,

Then sign out on the forms provided in the Office of Discipline. Turn the slip into the Office of Discipline.

2. A student returning from a week-end permission before the stipulated time, must report to his Prefect immediately, and then follow the regular routine of the University.
3. A week-end permission ends at 12:00 Midnight, Sunday, unless otherwise specified.
4. Should a student receive a week-end out permission (or even an ordinary out-permission) and then decide not to use it, he must report this fact to his Prefect immediately; otherwise it will be credited against him. He must conform to the regular routine of the University.

UNIVERSITY LIBRARY RULES

1. Books are loaned for two weeks, with one renewal allowed. Summer School: One week, no renewal.
2. Books must be brought to the library to be renewed.
3. Reserve books must be used in the library only.
4. Reference books and periodicals may not be taken from the library.
5. All books must be returned before exams begin in each semester.
6. Before leaving the library, each student must show the librarian on duty that his books have been properly checked out.
7. Fines are 5 cents for the first day and 2 cents per day for each overdue book, plus 5 cents for each overdue notice sent. At the end of the third week, the fines cease, but students are automatically charged the price of the book. Accounts must be cleared before exams begin in each semester.
8. Religious students must include their family name and Order initials when signing out a book.
9. The taking of books or magazines from the library without charging them out will be treated as theft.
10. Library privileges will be withdrawn from those who deliberately violate the library regulations.
11. The library is not to be used as a study hall.

RESIDENCE HALLS AND CLASSROOM BUILDINGS

The following practices are forbidden in the Residence Halls and Classroom Buildings.

1. Removing or adding to the issued furniture.
2. Defacing of rooms, corridors or furniture.
3. Tampering with the utilities.
4. Hanging of pictures, posters or other items on the walls or from any painted surface.
5. Disposing of cigarette butts, gum and other refuse in any but the proper receptacle.

USE OF MOTOR VEHICLES

A. Use On Grounds a Privilege

1. The University grants to the students the privilege to make use of a motor vehicle while attending school, on condition that they observe the regulations governing such privilege.
2. This privilege is not granted to Freshmen who reside on the Campus.
3. This privilege is not granted to students on strict scholastic probation who reside on the Campus.

B. Motor Vehicle Regulations

1. Those students making use of this privilege when it is not granted to them shall be suspended for the period of one semester.
2. All students who are granted the privilege to have the use of a motor vehicle on Campus must immediately register the vehicle with the Office of Discipline. A five dollar (\$5.00) registration fee is charged for each semester. The penalty for deliberately failing to register the vehicle as required shall be suspension from the University for the period of one semester.
3. The student motor vehicles must bear a sticker to be provided by the University. Failure to have said sticker on the vehicle will constitute a violation of the regulations.
4. The Campus speed limit is 15 MILES PER HOUR.

5. Cars are to be parked in the designated areas. They are not to be parked on the roads or the areas off the roads whether these be on or adjacent to the campus.
6. Relative to violations of regulations governing the use of motor vehicles, the following action is to be taken:
 - a. FIRST violation—recorded in the Office of Discipline and a fine of one dollar (\$1.00) will be imposed.
 - b. SECOND violation—recorded in the Office of Discipline and a fine of three dollars (\$3.00) will be levied.
 - c. THIRD violation—recorded in the Office of Discipline and a fine of ten dollars (\$10.00) will be levied.
 - d. FOURTH violation—student shall lose the privilege of using the motor vehicle while attending the University for the school year. In addition he will be assigned 30 demerits and placed on strict disciplinary probation for the remainder of the academic year.
 - e. In the event that a student with four violations makes use of the privilege he has lost, and is thereby credited with a FIFTH violation, he may be dismissed from the University.
 - f. The record of violations kept in the Office of Discipline will carry through the complete academic year.

RELIGIOUS PROGRAM

Fully conscious of a grave obligation concerning the spiritual welfare of her students St. Bonaventure University has a religious program. It aims at developing the spiritual character of the individual student so that she may "advance in age and wisdom and grace before God and man."

Chapel:

The Chapel of the Immaculate Conception in Devereux Hall is the University chapel. By faith we believe that God is present on our altars and that His Sacrifice is renewed in Holy Mass. University men and women should be aware of this while in chapel and at all times be reverent in manner, neat in attire and appearance.

Holy Mass:

The regular University Mass will be offered at 6:55 each class day. Attendance at Holy Mass has ever been a part of the Bonaventure spirit, and tradition. Daily Mass is urged upon all students that they may reap the great blessings of the Lord. The women students residing at St. Elizabeth's may attend Mass there in the morning at 6:30 a.m. on every school day. Mass will be offered at a later time on Sunday.

OBLIGATORY MASS:

On Tuesday morning Freshmen students residing on the 2nd, 3rd and 5th floors of Devereux.

On Wednesday morning students residing on the 1st and 2nd floors of Robinson.

On Thursday morning students residing on the 1st, 2nd and 3rd floors of Falconio.

On Friday morning all Seniors.

On Saturday morning Freshmen students residing on the 4th floor of Devereux and the 3rd floor of Robinson.

OBLIGATORY NIGHT PRAYERS:

On Monday night Freshmen students residing on the 2nd, 3rd and 5th floors of Devereux.

On Tuesday night students residing on the 1st and 2nd floors of Robinson.

On Wednesday night students residing on the 1st, 2nd and 3rd floor of Falconio.

On Thursday night all Seniors.

On Friday night Freshmen students residing on the 4th floor of Devereux and the 3rd floor of Robinson.

CONFESSIONS:—

Confessions are heard each evening in the chapel from 6:00. At other times students are free to ask any priest to hear their confessions.

ANNUAL RETREAT:

The annual retreat is an integral and necessary part of the University schedule. Hence all exercises at the retreat are obligatory.

TRADITIONAL FRESHMAN REGULATIONS

1. Freshmen must greet priests, Professors, and all upperclassmen politely and by the title, such as Father, Sir, Mister, Miss, etc.

2. Freshmen must wear at all times a shirt with a collar plus the regulation "Dink and Tie." The "Dink and Tie" will be obtained from the Student Senate. He will also wear neat and legible signs (of white cardboard, 6 in. x 6 in.) There shall be no more than four worn, two of which shall contain at least the Freshman's name and home town printed thereon in letters 2 inches high. These shall be worn at all times and in plain view, except in Chapel.

3. Freshmen must obtain and carry at all times a copy of the Student's Handbook, a schedule card, and no less than 10 lumberjack matches.

4. Freshmen must maintain a haircut not exceeding an inch.

5. Freshmen must not use:

- a. Archway and main entrance of Devereux
- b. Center path across the campus
- c. The main and right hand entrance to De La Roche Hall
- d. The main and right hand entrance to Plassmann Hall
- e. The main and left hand entrance of the Dining Hall
- f. The main and left hand entrance to the Dining Hall

6. The retirement from all University activities is in order of seniority. Freshmen remain seated until all others have left.

7. Freshmen may not smoke, except in their own quarters and lounge.

8. Freshmen must not report to any upperclassman's room or perform any tasks before 6:15 a.m., during study period or after 11 p.m. *The same applies for Sundays between the hours of 1 and 5 p.m. — which shall be utilized for studies.* Freshmen must be in their own room at 11 p.m. (excluding Saturday evenings).

9. Freshmen must know and memorize.

- a. Objectives of St. Bonaventure University (catalog)
- b. A concise history of St. Bonaventure University
- c. The basic principles upon which St. Francis founded the Order of Friars Minor
- d. The Blessing of St. Francis
- e. St. Francis' Prayer for Peace.
- f. All University songs and cheers
- g. The names and positions of all Student Senators
- h. These 15 regulations.

10. Freshmen must be at the immediate disposal of the Student Senate at all times for the performance of all detailed work in connection with any University activities.

11. Freshmen must pay an initiation fee of \$6.00 immediately to the treasurer of the Student Senate at registration. One-sixth of the amount will be returned to the treasurer of the Freshman Class after his election.

12. All Day-Hop Freshmen must observe all Frosh regulations.

13. Freshmen must support all University activities.

14. All Freshmen granted weekend permission by the Dean of Discipline must also sign out with the Student Senate.

These rules shall be in effect and enforced to the letter within a 50 mile radius of the University. Infractions of them will result in a trial before a Senate Court. These Senate Courts have at their disposal several penalties varying with the magnitude of the infractions. These penalties are approved and sanctioned by the University.

ST. BONAVENTURE UNIVERSITY

Campus Organizations

Below is a list of campus organizations students may join, or be elected to, at St. Bonaventure University. Participation contributes to the University atmosphere, increases the student's knowledge of the University and promotes understanding and friendship with his fellow students.

STUDENT ELECTIONS

Student elections play an important and vital part in the administrative participation of the various campus organizations. General elections are held annually in the spring of the year thereby giving the newly elected officer ample time to become adjusted to his position before coping with the responsibilities of the following year.

The major campus election, that of the Student Senate, is conducted through the use of professional voting machines. Eligibility to be a candidate for this election is entitled to those members of the student body who are not on Strict or Simple Academic or Disciplinary Probation. Accompanying the Candidate's name is a written petition signed by not less than thirty-five of his respective classmates. The student's name is then processed by the Dean of the University, the Dean of Discipline and the Director of Student Activities.

Eligibility for the Presidency, Vice-Presidency, Secretary and Treasurer of the various class Offices is also determined by the fulfillment of the above mentioned qualifications.

Student Senate

The Student Senate of St. Bonaventure University is the connecting link between the student body and the administration. Composed of twelve (12) members elected annually, this student governing body supervises and coordinates all student activities. Working through various committees, the Senate directs its attention primarily to fostering the intellectual, moral, social, and physical character of the student.

Board of Managers

The Board of Managers will be a permanent committee of the Student Senate at St. Bonaventure University, appointed by it and subordinate to it. This Board of Managers is to have its duties, authorities, and the number of its regular meetings defined by said parent body.

The purpose of the Board of Managers shall be as follows:

1. To co-ordinate all the social activities of the different clubs and organizations at St. Bonaventure University and, by so doing, to insure maximum success for the aforementioned clubs and organizations.
2. To serve the Student Body by making public upon request any date that has been received and recorded in its files.
3. To make a monthly check of the finances of each campus organization.
4. To act as a service committee to the Student Senate insofar as specific duties are assigned.

The Board of Managers has the power to fine individuals or organizations for failure to comply with established procedures. Accordingly, fines will be imposed for the following:

1. Late Requests: Any organization submitting a request after the prescribed time limit will be liable to a fine of not less than \$5.00 if the request be granted. The Board will decide each case after considering the reasons for the lateness of the request, the previous record of the Organization, and the need for the particular affair or function.
2. Unauthorized Concessions or Raffles: When an unauthorized concession or raffle is detected, all profits derived from the operation of the concession or raffle will be confiscated, if such profits can be estimated. In the event that the amount of profit cannot be determined, a fine of not less than \$25.00 will be imposed. If fines are not paid within two weeks they will be turned over to the Bursar and an additional fee will be imposed.

3. Failure to make a Monthly Financial Report: Each campus Organization will submit a monthly financial report to the Board of Managers. Unless circumstances warrant otherwise, as will be decided by the Board, failure to submit this report will be punishable by a fine of not less than five dollars.

Women's Council

The Women's Association is composed of all regular women students of the University. It seeks to promote the participation of the co-eds in the spiritual and social life of the University. A distinctive part of St. Bonaventure, *the Women's Association* sponsors social activities, religious functions and recreational facilities for its members, co-operating with other campus organizations in various campus events. *The governing body of this association is the Women's Council which includes five officers: president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, and freshman advisor.*

Catholic Students Activity Council

The C.S.A.C. is an organization designed primarily to co-ordinate the various religious and social activities of its affiliated groups. Among these are:

Third Order of St. Francis
Confraternity of Christian Doctrine (C.C.D.)
Catholic Students Mission Crusade (C.S.M.C.)
Mariology
Young Christian Students (Catholic Action)

Third Order of St. Francis

The Third Order is a religious organization of lay people devoted to the ideals of St. Francis. It follows its own Papal approved rule of life. The monthly meetings are religious, business, and social. Membership is open to both men and women.

Radio Station W O F M

W O F M The Campus radio station broadcasting on a frequency of 65 K.C. is limited to the immediate environs of the campus. The station, with its programs of music, news and sports, is operated and managed by the students with a faculty advisor. One academic credit hour per semester is granted for active participation.

Glee Club

The Glee Club, having proved its quality in past performances, will continue to expand its activity with tours tentatively planned. The Glee Club rehearses twice a week with academic credit of one semester hour being granted for active participation.

Delta Epsilon Sigma

Juniors who have maintained a cumulative numerical index of 2.20 and Seniors who have maintained a cumulative numerical index of 2.00 and graduate students are eligible for election to the Gamma Kappa Chapter of the Delta Epsilon Sigma Society, the National Scholastic Honor Society for students in Catholic Colleges and Universities. These students must have good character and show promise of leadership.

Professional Fraternities

The three professional fraternities at St. Bonaventure offer the male students a social outlet and afford an opportunity for intellectual exchange. The School of Business Administration sponsors Delta Sigma Pi for men enrolled in any Business major; the Liberal Arts School has established a Chapter of Iota Delta Alpha; and the Science School sponsors Alpha Kappa Mu.

Dramatics Club

The Dramatics Club is composed of men and women interested in acting, make-up, wardrobe, scenery, props, and other related branches of play production. At least one large production a year is presented. Academic credit is available for participants.

105 Club

The 105 Club is open to all members of the Advanced ROTC Corps. It holds regular business and social meetings throughout the school year. The annual Military Ball, sponsored by this group is a Bonaventure social highlight.

Drill Team

The Drill Team has become famous in Western New York for its intricate foot and rifle drills and its snappy uniforms.

University Band

The Band should have a successful year. Plans are made for a more elaborate program of concerts and activity. Scholarships are regularly awarded to deserving students for work in the Band.

Rifle Team

The Rifle Team is open to anyone who desires to take part in shooting competition. One need not be in ROTC to take part in this activity.

Area and City Clubs

The Area and City Clubs provide the students with an opportunity to meet frequently with people from their own locales and to plan events for campus and home entertainment. Membership is based on the area in which the student lives—open to male and female students.

The Laurel

The Laurel of St. Bonaventure University, the oldest campus publication, is a literary quarterly written and edited by the students. Positions as staff members or contributing writers, typists, artists, copy and proof readers are open to interested men and women. Both prose and verse are published.

Bonadieu

The Bonadieu is St. Bonaventure's yearbook—an annual recording of memorable events. It is published by a staff of seniors, chosen by the class.

Bona Venture

The Bona Venture is a weekly newspaper devoted almost entirely to campus news. One credit hour per semester is given to each member of the staff. Reporters, columnists, cartoonists, and typists, whether experienced or not, are invited to participate.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STUDENT SENATE As Amended February 19, 1960

PREAMBLE

We, the undergraduates of St. Bonaventure University, desiring to further promote the ideals and objectives of the University, to encourage, coordinate and supervise undergraduate interests and activities, to the end that these same may be directed effectively in the intellectual, moral, physical and social development of the student, do ordain and establish this Student Senate with this Constitution.

ARTICLE 1—Name

Section 1. The organization shall be known as the Student Senate of St. Bonaventure University.

ARTICLE 2—Membership

Section 1. The Student Senate of St. Bonaventure University shall consist of twelve (12) members, including five (5) seniors, four (4) juniors and three (3) sophomores.

Section 2. One Non-Boarding Student representative must be included in the membership of the senior class, and may be included in the membership of the sophomore and/or junior classes.

ARTICLE 3—Election

Section 1. At least eight (8) seniors, eight (8) juniors and six (6) sophomores shall be nominated by the members of their respective classes.

Section 2. All nominees must be approved by the Dean of the University, the Dean of Discipline and the Director of Student Activities.

Section 3. All nominees must have at least one year's attendance at St. Bonaventure University.

Section 4. From those nominated five (5) Seniors, four (4) Juniors and three (3) Sophomores shall then be elected by their respective classes in ballot.

Section 5. No members of the Student Senate will hold any other office in the University.

ARTICLE 4—Officers

Section 1. The Student Senate of St. Bonaventure University shall be subjected to the Director of Student Activities.

Section 2. The officers of the Student Senate shall be a president, a vice-president, a recording secretary, a corresponding secretary, a treasurer, a chairman of the board of managers, the representative to the Catholic students activity council, the off campus representative, the public relations chairman, the special events chairman and other senatorial positions as assigned by the president.

ARTICLE 5—Election and Appointment of Officers

Section 1. The offices of the president and vice-president shall be occupied by the senior class members of the Student Senate

Section 2. The offices of the president and vice-president shall be filled by election from the student body.

ARTICLE 6—Duties of the Officers

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the president to preside at all meetings of the Senate, and to appoint the recording secretary, correspondence secretary, treasurer, chairman of the board of managers, representative to the Catholic students activity council, public relations chairman, special events chairman; to enforce strict observance of the constitution; and to appoint special committees when occasion demands. He shall be ex-officio member of all committees.

Section 2. The Vice-President shall preside at all meetings in the absence of the president.

Section 3. A. It shall be the duty of the recording secretary to keep an accurate record of the proceedings of each meeting of the Senate.

B. It will be the duty of the correspondence secretary to write such letters and documents as may be directed by the Senate or the president of the Senate and to keep complete files of the correspondence and reports of the Senate.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the treasurer to keep an accurate account of receipts and expenditures of the Senate. These accounts must be audited by the Director of Student Activities. All monies shall be deposited in the Student Senate account. No money shall be withdrawn from the account without the same being properly requisitioned and approved by the Student Senate.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the off-campus representative to further the interests of the off-campus students in all University activities and to carry out any assigned senatorial duties.

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the public relations chairman to obtain and to circulate information which will further the interests of the Student Senate and the University.

Section 7. It shall be the duty of the chairman of the board of managers to supervise this permanent committee of the Student Senate and to report all activities of all campus organizations to the Student Senate. He shall, with the approval of the Senate, appoint the members of the Board of Managers to serve for the duration of his chairmanship.

Section 8. It shall be the duty of the special events chairman to be chairman of all those activities run by the Student Senate, and to carry out all assigned senatorial duties as directed by the president of the Senate.

ARTICLE 7—Duties of the Senate

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Student Senate to:

A. To develop the relationship between the faculty and the student body.

B. Assume responsibility of the initiation of the members of the freshman class, such initiation to be conducted by the members of the sophomore class, according to the rules approved by the Director of Student Activities.

C. The members of the Student Senate will be guests at all student functions on and off campus.

D. Supervise the student bulletin board.

E. To promote order and cleanliness on the grounds and in the buildings of the University.

F. To conduct convocations of the student body with the approval of the Board of Instruction and the Director of Student Activities.

ARTICLE 8—*Meetings*

Section 1. The Student Senate will meet weekly at the time and place to be determined by the Senate.

Section 2. A quorum will consist of eight (8) members of the Senate.

Section 3. One meeting each month will be held open to all students.

Section 4. The Student Senate shall have the right to call an executive meeting at any time it deems necessary.

ARTICLE 9—*Impeachment*

Section 1. Senators are liable to removal from office by the proper authorities for reasons of scholastic deficiency, disciplinary reasons, or lack of cooperation. Removal of any senator may also be effected by a written petition, signed by a two-thirds majority of the members of respective class.

Section 2. The Student Senate shall have the power to impeach any class officer. The impeachment to take place upon the consent of two-thirds of the entire Senate. The class officer shall be foretold of his indictment and given the right to vindicate himself.

ARTICLE 10—*Vacancies*

When vacancies occur in the Senate, they shall be filled by election from the class in which the vacancy occurs, with the approval as indicated in Article 3. There shall be at least two nominees for each vacancy.

ARTICLE 11—*Finance*

All freshmen will pay an initiation fee of \$6.00 to the treasurer of the Student Senate at the time of registration. One-sixth of this money is to go to the freshman class upon election of officers.

ARTICLE 12—*Amendments*

In order to amend this constitution it is necessary that ten (10) members of the organization vote "Aye". All balloting will be in writing subject to the approval of the Dean of the University, the Dean of Discipline, and the Director of Student Activities.

ARTICLE 13—*Standing Committees*

Section 1. Board of Managers.

A. Board of managers will be a permanent committee of the Student Senate, appointed and subordinate to the Senate. Acting with the authority delegated by the Student Senate, it will have the following purposes:

a. To coordinate all the social activities of the different clubs and organizations at St. Bonaventure, and by doing so, to insure the maximum possible success of these activities.

b. To serve the student body by making public upon request any date received and recorded in the Senate files.

c. To make a monthly check of the finances of the organizations under its control.

d. To publish annually the student Directory.

e. To act as a service committee as requested by the Senate.

f. Purely academic societies, established and recognized as such by the Board of Instruction of the University will not be subject to the Board of Managers except as regards the scheduling of meetings and activities.

B. The Board of Managers will have the power to levy fines for violations of the prescribed regulations and procedures, and to make recommendations to the Student Senate as regards the approval or suspension of campus organizations.

ARTICLE 14

The Parliamentary authority for all meetings of the Student Senate shall be "Roberts Rules of Order Revised."

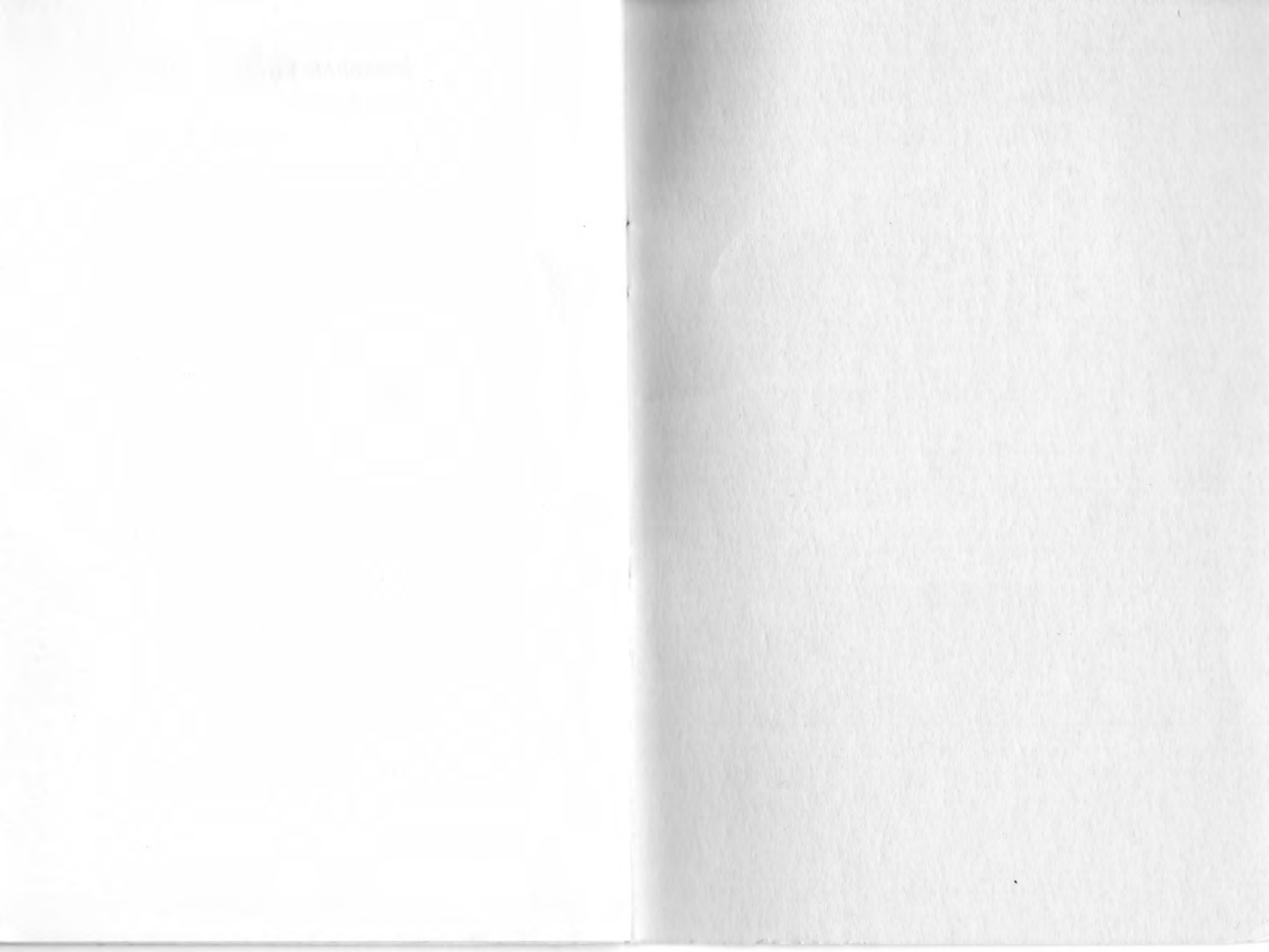

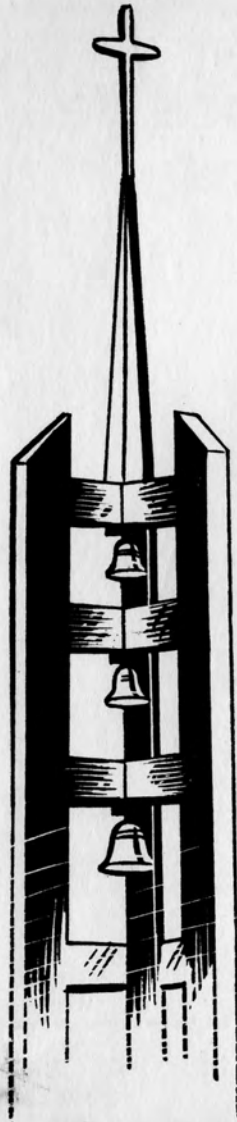
O'er hill, o'er dale, as we hit the dusty trail
