



Dr. Jandoli had the degrees, the career and the heart to teach students who continually reflect his spirit. He exemplified passion and compassion ... for his vocation, his university and every member of the community in which he lived and worked.

With five St. Bonaventure graduates receiving journalism's top honor, the Pulitzer Prize, it is appropriate that the school that bears his name emphasizes the teaching of writing, grounding students for careers in any area of the mass media.

The Russell J. Jandoli School of Journalism and Mass Communication encompasses the study of print media (newspapers and magazines), broadcast (radio and television) media, public relations and advertising.

over the years and the membership changes in the Mark Hellinger Awards Committee, the annual Mark Hellinger Award luncheon became The Mark Hellinger Awards Ceremony. The early committee attracted well-known journalists as members and these ceremonies attracted well-known journalists as award recipients.

The awards ceremony has transferred leadership several times since its 1960 inception. In 1977, past Hellinger award recipients assumed many of the responsibilities in hosting the annual event. In the 1990s, however, the task was handed over to the St. Bonaventure University department of public relations, and three years ago to the Jandoli School, whose faculty choose the recipient.

Jandoli's leadership and legacy helped guide the annual event to its success for more than 40 years. The founder of St. Bonaventure's journalism program served with extraordinary resolve in his 44 years as a mentor to men and women of character and ambition. His life was that of the university. His every volley of energy was directed toward his students and his profession. But Jandoli's inspiring presence and memory lives on in the Mark Hellinger Awards Ceremony as it continues to honor those persons who carry on his legacy in the success and boundless potential of their journalism careers.





The marriage of Mark Hellinger to Franciscans at St. Bonaventure University occurred after the writer died. Inspiration for the establishment of the award came from Jim Bishop—author, columnist and protégé-biographer of Hellinger.

In 1923, Hellinger became the first columnist to write exclusively about Broadway and the people associated with the entertainment world. He wrote more than 6,000 short stories, plays, motion picture scripts, sports columns, jokes and novels. In 1930, he wrote the last Ziegfeld Follies, produced by Florenz Ziegfeld himself. The following year, he was one of the three authors of Ziegfeld's last production, "Hot-Cha," a musical. MGM bought his plays and he worked on films with Hollywood stars such as Humphrey Bogart and Ann Sheridan. In 1937, he left New York to become a Hollywood producer. Ten years later, he established his own unit, which immediately drew attention as the producer of "The Killers," its first picture.

Hellinger wrote a daily column for *The Mirror*. Among the subjects Hellinger discussed in his columns were his marriage, on July 11, 1929, to Gladys Glad, a "Ziegfeld girl" who won a contest as the most beautiful girl on stage; their divorce in 1932; and their remarriage on July 11, 1933.

Often called "the man nobody hates," Hellinger was known for whopping charitable donations and extravagant tipping.

Hellinger may be virtually unknown to today's generation, but in Depression years, he earned \$1,000 a week as a Broadway columnist and \$3,500 a week as a movie producer. He traveled around the world and lived in a sumptuous East Side apartment. He once leased a railroad car to go to a football game. Above all, he is remembered for keeping a pocketful of \$2 bills folded to stamp size for passing out to any down-and-outer who shook his hand and said, "Hello, Mark."

He acquired many real friends who revered the memory of the columnist who spoke with a Broadway voice and had, as a trademark, natty blue suits and white ties. He was loved by the extraordinary: Walter Winchell, Humphrey Bogart and Bing Crosby, among others.

A black-haired, handsome man with pale blue eyes, he died of a heart attack at the age of 44. His last words were: "I hope you doctors know what the hell you're doing." But they couldn't read God's mind, and Hellinger left for what he called "the great perhaps."

Except for a poor-selling biography of Hellinger, the Mark Hellinger Award is the only thing that remains to memorialize the man so many people knew. After his death, his wife quickly named a theater after him. Though it housed the 1970 Tony Awards ceremony and a successful run of the Broadway hit "My Fair Lady," it was abandoned in the early '80s. In 1989, it was turned into a church.

SHANNON HOLFOTH

Holfoth lives in Lewiston, N.Y., and graduated in May with an honors degree in journalism and mass communication and political science. She served as news editor of the *The Bona Venture* and editor-in-chief of *The Communicator*.

After studying abroad through the Francis E. Kelley Oxford Program, she became the program's student assistant. She also worked as a public relations assistant for St. Bonaventure's Center for Community Engagement and held summer internships with *Buffalo Business First*, the U.S. Attorney's Office and *The Hamburg Sun*.

Holfoth has been inducted into Kappa Tau Alpha, the National Honor Society in Journalism and Mass Communication, and Pi Sigma Alpha, the National Political Science Honor Society. She is an account coordinator at Travers Collins in Buffalo.

Recognizes a journalism and mass communication graduate who has exemplified the highest professional standards and shared them unselfishly with The Russell J. Jandoli School of Journalism and Mass Communication and St. Bonaventure University in his/her educational mission.

The Alumnus/a of the Year Award was established in 1981 to honor a journalism graduate who has continued to represent the university through a consistent display of those qualities instilled in all students, be it through service to the university or success in the field of journalism. In 1982, an Alumni Service Award was established but never appeared to have any real direction. The absence of real purpose resulted in several name changes for the award, including the Professional Services Award and the Jim Bishop Award. In 1988, the award was removed from the awards luncheon. Three years later, the criteria for the Alumnus/a of the Year were changed to include both career success and service to the university community.

Dan Herbeck was born on October 31, 1954, in Mineral Wells, Texas, and raised in Buffalo and Amherst, N.Y., where he graduated in 1972 from Sweet Home High School.

He graduated from Erie Community College and St. Bonaventure University, where he fell in love with the art of journalism while working for *The Bona Venture* university newspaper. He worked his way through college by tending bar, working at a gas station and running a roller coaster at an amusement park.

He became a summer reporting intern at *The Buffalo News* — the daily newspaper he delivered as a boy —in 1977. *The News* hired him as a weekend police reporter during his senior year at St. Bonaventure and then hired him as a full-time reporter in 1978. He has been there ever since.

Herbeck has mostly worked on crime stories and covered the federal courts during his years at the News. He also has worked on investigative reporting teams with Lou Michael, Michael Beebe and other News colleagues. He has won more than a dozen national or state awards for investigations into telemarketing fraud, corrupt politicians, overcrowding in the New York prison system, bankruptcy fraud, gun trafficking, child pornography, poverty and wealth in the Seneca Indian Nation, criminal conduct by Buffalo Bills football fans and other topics.

In 2001, Herbeck and Michel co-wrote "American Terrorist," the biography of Oklahoma City terrorist bomber Timothy McVeigh. The book reached No. 2 on the New York Times non-fiction bestseller list. The two journalists appeared on more than 100 national and local television and radio news shows, ranging from the "Today Show" and "Meet the Press" to the Gordon Liddy radio talk show. They donated materials from their work, including hours of audio tapes with McVeigh, to the Jandoli School.

Herbeck and his wife, Joyce, live in Tonawanda, N.Y., where they raise two sons. He sings in his church choir and is a board member of the volunteer-run Brighton Place Library.

### **2005 Alumna of the Year Award Recipient**

Victoria Corderi joined NBC News in 1994 as a correspondent for Dateline NBC.

Corderi came to NBC News from WABC-TV in New York, where she was an anchor and reporter. Before that, she was with CBS News (1985-1992), where she served as a correspondent for the newsmagazines "48

Hours" and "Street Stories." During her first three years at the network, she covered Central America for the "CBS Evening News with Dan Rather," and during her last year, she served as a news anchor for the "CBS Morning News."

For her work at "48 Hours," Corderi won three national news Emmys and a George Foster Peabody Award for Excellence in Journalism. She also received the Las Primeras

Award for being one of the first Hispanic network anchors, and she has been named to the Who's Who Among Hispanic Americans. In 1997, she received an Edward R. Murrow Award for investigative journalism for a report on contaminated mattresses.

She began her television career

in 1982 as a reporter for WPLG-TV in Miami, where she covered politics and federal agencies. Before that, Corderi was a reporter with the Miami News, the city's afternoon daily newspaper.

In 1979, she graduated magna cum laude from St. Bonaventure University with a bachelor of arts in journalism. She and her husband live with their four children in Maryland.

### **2005 Douglas Edwards Award Recipient**

Born in Wichita, Kan., in 1934, Jim Lehrer received an A.A. degree from Victoria College and a bachelor's in journalism in 1956 from the University of Missouri before joining the Marine Corps. From 1959 to 1966, he was a reporter for the Dallas Morning News and then the Dallas Times-Herald.

Lehrer's newspaper career led him to public television. He subsequently moved to Washington, D.C., to serve as the public affairs coordinator for PBS, and was also a member of PBS's Journalism Advisory Board and a fellow at the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. Lehrer went on to join the National Public Affairs Center for Television (NPACT) as a correspondent.

In October 1975, the half-hour Robert MacNeil Report, with Jim Lehrer as the Washington correspondent, premiered on Thirteen/WNET New York. Over the next seven years, The MacNeil/Lehrer Report won more than 30 awards for journalistic excellence. In September 1983, Lehrer and MacNeil launched The MacNeil/Lehrer NewsHour.

The 1995-96 season marked the 20th year of their journalistic odyssey, as well as MacNeil's departure and Lehrer's stewardship of the program in its current incarnation, The NewsHour

with Jim Lehrer.

He has been honored with numerous awards for journalism, including the 1999 National Humanities Medal, presented by President Bill Clinton and First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton. Jim Lehrer and his wife, Kate, have been married since 1960. They have three daughters, Amanda, Lucy and Jamie, and five grandchildren.

### MARK HELLINGER'S LIVING LEGACY

Comfortably crowded into an upper floor dining room of Danny's Hide-a-Way restaurant on a rainy day in mid-Manhattan last May, 40 prominent men and women from as far away as Florida gathered for their annual luncheon. Among those seated around the horseshoe-shaped table were several renowned personalities in journalism — Jim Bishop, John Charles Daly, Bob Considine, Doug Edwards — and friends of the breed like Milt Caniff, the adventure strip artist, and Evan Thomas, editor of the controversial book on President Kennedy's assassination.

There were also business executives, editors, publishers, restaurateurs, a broker, a former showgirl, a college president and even a millionaire or two. This somewhat elite assortment was meeting, as it has almost every year since 1960, to honor Mark Hellinger, the Broadway columnist and Hollywood producer who died 20 years ago.

They are dedicated to perpetuating Hellinger's addiction for doing good turns for his fellow man, in particular his penchant for helping others in the journalism profession as well as prospective newsmen and women.

Their active leader is Jim Bishop, syndicated columnist, author and television personality who was Hellinger's protege at the old New York *Mirror* in the 1930's. Hellinger's widow, the former Gladys Glad whom Florenz Ziegfeld once billed as "The Most Beautiful Girl In the World," is the spiritual leader. Adding to the heterogeneity of the set is St. Bonaventure University's Department of Journalism.

In 1958, after receiving the honorary Doctor of Letters degree from St. Bonaventure, Bishop adopted the upstate New York institution as his own — since he never attended college. His first question to journalism people there was, "What can I do to help?" Later, across a dining room table in Bishop's former home at Sea Bright, N.J., and cruising aboard his boat on the

Dr. Russell J. Jandoli, chairman of the Department of Journalism at St. Bonaventure University, has written and talked extensively on scholastic journalism and on education for journalism. He is chairman of the editorial board of Journalism Educator. A graduate of Notre Dame, Columbia Graduate School of Journalism and New York University, he served as a reporter and editor in New York, New Jersey and the West Indies before joining the St. Bonaventure faculty in 1947. During World War II, he was wire editor of Pacific Stars & Stripes.





MARK HELLINGER in 1944 with his wife, the former Gladys Glad, after arrival in New York from India. Hellinger was serving as war correspondent then for International News Service in the Pacific.

Shrewsbury River, St. Bonaventure officials helped him shape the Mark Hellinger Committee and the Mark Hellinger Award.

The Hellinger Award might well serve as the prototype for honoring other newspaper immortals, for it involves both a purse and "a helping hand." The compact between a Catholic university and the late Jewish columnist, Bishop once said, "sounds like an elegant version of the old Jew-and-the-Irishman joke."

Hellinger may be virtually unknown to the younger generation of newsmen. In the depression years, he earned \$1,000 a week as a Broadway columnist and \$3,500 a week as a movie producer. He traveled around the world and lived in a sumptuous East Side apartment. Once he leased a railroad car to go to a football game. But, above all, he is remembered for keeping a pocketful of \$2 bills folded to stamp-size for passing out to any down-and-outer who shook his hand and said, "Hello, Mark."

He acquired many real friends who still revere the memory of the columnist with the slick jet hair and pale blue eyes, who spoke with a hoarse Broadway voice and had as a trademark natty blue suits and white ties. He was beloved by the extraordinary, too — Toots Shor, Jimmy Cannon, Walter Winchell, Burt Lancaster, Humphrey Bogart, Edmund O'Brien and Bing Crosby. When Hellinger died in 1947 at age 44, he left all his friends a warm legacy.

Bishop, perhaps, was most indebted to him. He had helped the young reporter find his own writing style. And Bishop insisted that any award that St. Bonaventure sponsored must be named after Mark Hellinger. The benevolent spirit was something the Franciscans,


He has also served on the public relations committee of the American Advertising Federation, the American Society of Association Executives and the President's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped.





Bloom had served as co-anchor of the "Today" show's weekend editions since March 2000. During his 20 years in journalism, he had covered stories including escalating violence in the Middle East, recovery efforts at Ground Zero after Sept. 11, 2001, and the subsequent increase in security within the U.S.

Bob Wright, NBC's chair and chief executive, said in a note to his staff: "In times like these, a journalist's contribution to his country is meas-

ured in terms of illustrious commitment and sacrifice. ... There was no one more devoted to his calling than David Bloom, and for that we are both grateful and humbled."

In his assignment in Iraq, Bloom scored what many believe to be a first: broadcasting live reports as the American armored column he

was traveling with fought its way north through the Iraqi desert.

Bloom, who had no apparent health problems, may have developed a blood clot because of his assignment.

Questioned in the field, he told *The*Washington Post, "You try to pace yourself and get a little sleep. You're sleeping with your knees propped up around you."

The 39-year-old broadcaster left a widow, Melanie, and three young children.

### **2003 Thomas Mosser Award Recipient**

From the Pentagon to the private sector, Victoria Clarke has been at the center of some of the most historic events in the United States in recent years.

Serving most recently as
Assistant Secretary of Defense for
Public Affairs, Clarke was at her
desk in the Pentagon's outer ring

when the World Trade Center was attacked on September 11, 2001. By the time the Pentagon was hit, Clarke had already moved to the Command Center, where she was one of a small handful of top aides to stay with Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld throughout the day — leaving the building only to see the crash site and brief the media. From those first moments on 9/11, to embedding correspondents with military units in Operation Iraqi Freedom — a program she conceived, designed and ran — Clarke has played a leading role in shaping the public's understanding of the war on terrorism.

As press secretary for President George H.W.

Bush's 1992 re-election campaign, Clarke was broadly praised for her poise and professionalism during the campaign's most difficult days.

Widely respected as one of the nation's most innovative communications strategists, Clarke has advised some of the nation's best-

known executives. She has been president of Bozell Eskew advertising, head of the Washington office of the internationally known public relations firm of Hill and Knowlton, and vice president of the National Cable Telecommunications Association, where she helped to develop the first television ratings system and the cable industry's first on-time guarantee.

A former photographer for the *Washington*Star, Clarke is a graduate of George Washington
University. She lives in suburban Washington
with her husband, Brian Graham, and her three



Bob Edwards, longtime host of NPR's newsmagazine "Morning Edition," is the recipient of this year's Douglas Edwards Award.

Bob Edwards has hosted public radio's most-listened-to program, which boasts 13 million listeners each week, since its premiere in 1979. He began his career at a

small radio station in New Albany, Ind., and while serving in the U.S. Army, produced and anchored TV and radio news programs for the American Forces Korea Network in Seoul. After his Army stint, he moved to Washington, D.C., where he worked as a weekend and evening anchorman for WTOP-AM, an all-news CBS affiliate, while earning a master's degree in broadcast journalism from The American University.

Over its long history, "Morning Edition" has earned accolades of all kinds, most recently a 1999 George Foster Peabody Award. The Peabody committee described the program as "two hours of daily in-depth news and entertainment expertly helmed by a man who

embodies the essence of excellence in radio."

Mr. Edwards joined NPR in 1974 when the organization was in its third year of operation. Prior to becoming host of "Morning Edition," he was co-host of NPR's "All Things Considered."

Mr. Edwards' 1993 book,

"Fridays with Red," chronicles his radio friendship with sports broadcasting legend Red Barber, with whom he talked about sports, camellias, and the nature of man every Friday morning for nearly 12 years.

Mr. Edwards won the 1984 Edward R.

Murrow Award from the Corporation for

Public Broadcasting for "outstanding contributions to public radio."

Mr. Edwards has won two Gabriel Awards from the National Catholic Association of Broadcasters and the 1995 Alfred I. duPont-Columbia University Award for excellence in radio journalism. Mr. Edwards is a national vice president of the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists.



Christiane Amanpour, chief international correspondent for CNN, is the 2000 recipient of the Douglas Edwards Award.

Ms. Amanpour has worked in most of the world's hot spots, with her most recent assignments sending her to Iran, Yugoslavia,

Afghanistan, BosniaHerzegovina, Haiti, Algeria and

Rwanda.

She exclusively interviewed Mikhail Gorbachev in November 1999 for the 10th anniversary of the fall of communism. She also interviewed Jordan's new monarch, King Abdullah, in May 1999 and was the last journalist

to interview the King's father, the long-reigning King Hussein, days before his death.

Having spent years on one of the most dangerous assignments journalists have faced in recent history, Ms. Amanpour has brought the Bosnian tragedy into context and to the world's attention. For her reporting from the former Yugoslavia, she has won a News and Documentary Emmy, two George Foster Peabody Awards, a

George Polk Award, and a Courage in Journalism Award, among others.

Ms. Amanpour's reputation as a world-class

correspondent began with her reporting on the dramatic changes occurring in central Europe in 1989 and 1990. She covered the Gulf War from Iraq's invasion of Kuwait in 1990 to the U.S. bombing of Baghdad and the Kurdish refugee crisis that persisted after the cease-fire. She also covered the break-up of the Soviet Union in 1991.

Ms. Amanpour began her CNN career in 1983 as an

assistant on the network's international assignment desk in Atlanta, and has also worked in CNN's New York and Frankfurt bureaus. She is a contributor to CBS News' 60 Minutes—the first reporter ever to broker such a dual assignment.

Recently, Ms. Amanpour was named a Fellow of the Society of Professional Journalists in recognition of her significant contributions to journalism.


Newsradio in Atlanta, WDVH-AM in Gainesville and WVBF-FM in Boston.



A Memphis, Tenn., native, Burson supervises 1,750 employees in 63 different offices in 31 countries worldwide.

Burson, 75, started his career in public relations in 1941 when he served as assistant to the president and public relations director at The H.K. Ferguson Company. From there, Burson operated his own public relations firm for six years prior to founding Burson-Marsteller in 1953.

Among his many awards, Burson counts the Gold Anvil Award from the Public Relations Society of America in 1980. He is also a member of the Arthur W. Page Society Hall of Fame and recipient of

the Public Relations Professional-of-the-Year Award in 1977 and 1989 from *Public Relations News*.


Burson and his wife, Bette (Foster) Burson, have two sons, Scott and Mark.



This year's Douglas Edwards Award recipient for excellence in broadcast journalism, in addition to her work for ABC, serves as a news analyst for National Public Radio, where she was the Congressional correspondent for more than 10 years.

Along with her husband, Steven V. Roberts, senior writer at U.S. News and World Report, Roberts writes

a weekly newspaper column syndicated by United Media in major newspapers around the country. Her op-ed columns have appeared in The New York Times and The Washington Post; she also has written for The New York Times Magazine and The Atlantic.

Before joining ABC News in 1988, Roberts was a contributor to PBS-TV's MacNeil/Lehrer Newshour. Her coverage of the Iran/Contra affair for that program won her the Weintal Award in 1987.

Prior to joining NPR, Roberts was a reporter for CBS News in Athens, Greece, and also produced and hosted a public affairs program on WRC-TV in Washington, D.C.

From 1981 to 1984, in addition to her work at NPR, she co-hosted "The Lawmakers," a weekly public television program on Congress.

She is the recipient of numerous awards, including the highest award in public radio, the Edward R. Murrow Award, and was the first broadcast journalist to win the highly prestigious **Everett McKinley Dirksen** Award for coverage of Congress. She is the former

president of the Radio and Television Correspondent's Association.

A 1964 graduate in political science from Wellesley College, Roberts garnered a 1985 Distinguished Alumnae Achievement Award "in recognition of excellence and distinction in professional pursuits." She is the recipient of honorary degrees from Amherst College, Boston College, Columbia College, Gonzaga University, Loyola University and Manhattanville College.

a reporter for the Fauquier Times-Democrat newspaper in Warrenton, Va.



# 1994 Alumnus of the Year Award Recipient

DANIEL BARRY in April became the third St. Bonaventure University alumnus to receive journalism's top honor when the Providence (R.I.) Journal-Bulletin won the Pulitzer Prize

for investigative journalism. He is a 1980 mass communication graduate of St. Bonaventure.

Barry was part of a five-member reporting team that wrote a series of stories on corruption in Rhode Island's court system. That inquiry exposed a number of abuses - including ticketfixing, patronage and the existence of

a secret account — that led to the resignation and criminal conviction of Rhode Island's Supreme Court chief justice.

The team's reporting also garnered an Investigative Reporters and Editors Gold Medal.

Barry joined the Journal-Bulletin in 1987 and worked as a suburban bureau manager and general assignment reporter assigned to the city desk.

In 1991 he was appointed to a team of reporters charged with investigating the collapse of Rhode Island's credit union system. He and two other reporters subsequently won a George Polk Award for a

series chronicling the corruption and mismanagement which caused the failure of one credit union.

Barry is also a' regular essayist for the newspaper's Sunday magazine.

His writing also has appeared in \* other publications, including Catholic Digest, the Nation

and Connecticut magazine.

Prior to joining the Journal-Bulletin, the Deer Park, N.Y., native earned a master's degree in journalism from New York University and worked for several years at the Manchester, Conn., Journal Inquirer, where he won regional awards for his investigation of a religious cult.

Barry resides in Warwick, R.L. with his wife, Mary Trinity, a 1981 St Bonaventure alumna.

**ANTHONY LEWIS**, twice winner of the Pulitzer Prize, is a Boston-based columnist for The New York Times.

Lewis travels widely in this country and abroad. He also has covered the

Supreme Court for The Times, and has been chief of its London Bureau.

From 1948 to 1952 he worked for the Sunday Department of The Times.

In 1952 he became a general assignment reporter for the Washington Daily News. Three years later he won his first Pulitzer Prize for national reporting,

for a series of articles in the Daily News on the dismissal of a Navy employee as a security risk. The series led to the employee's reinstatement.

Lewis joined The Times' Washington bureau in 1955 to cover the Supreme Court, Justice Department and other legal subjects.

In 1956-57, he was a Nieman Fellow at Harvard, studying law.

In the following years he reported on, among other things, the Warren

Court and the federal government's response to the civil rights movement. He won his second Pulitzer Prize in 1963 for his coverage of the Supreme Court.

He is the author of three books: Gideon's Trumpet, about a landmark Supreme Court case; Portrait of a Decade, about the great changes in American race relations; and, in 1991, Make No Law: The Sullivan Case and the First Amendment. Lewis also has published numerous articles in legal journals.

Lewis was for 15 years a lecturer on law at the Harvard Law School, teaching a course on The Constitution and the Press. He has taught at a number of other universities as a visitor, among them the Universities of California, Illinois, Oregon and Arizona. Since 1983 he has held the James Madison Visiting Professorship at Columbia University.

The New York native has received a number of honorary degrees.

**BOB SCHIEFFER**, the anchor/moderator of CBS' "Face the Nation," is one of the nation's most respected broadcast journalists.

Schieffer has anchored the Sunday

morning public affairs broadcast since May 1991. In addition to his role on "Face the Nation," he anchors the Saturday edition of the "CBS Evening News," serves as chief Washington correspondent and is one of the substitute anchors on "The CBS Evening News With Dan Rather and Connie Chung."

As CBS News' chief

Washington correspondent since 1982, Schieffer is a principal contributor to the network's campaign coverage.

Schieffer has covered Washington for CBS News for 25 years and is one of the few broadcast or print journalists to cover all four major beats in the nation's capital — the White House, the Pentagon, the State Department and Capitol Hill.

The winner of many broadcast news awards — including four Emmys —

Schieffer has been a principal anchor for CBS News since 1973, when he was named anchor of the "CBS Sunday Night News." He has anchored the Saturday edition of the "CBS Evening

News" since November 1976, the longest tenure for an anchor of a regularly scheduled network newscast.

Schieffer also has covered every presidential election campaign since 1972 and has been a floor reporter at presidential nominating conventions.

He joined CBS in 1969 and, after a

brief stint as a general assignment reporter, was named Pentagon correspondent.

Before joining CBS News, Schieffer was a reporter for the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. He later became news anchorman at WBAP-TV in Fort Worth/Dallas, which led to his joining CBS News.

Schieffer is the author of The Acting President, a book about Ronald Reagan which was published in 1989.

# Hellinger Award recipient amazes audience

"I decided I could no longer stand back as the objective observer and do nothing but make sure the story made the front page. In those five months at the Fauquier (Va.) Times-Democrat I learned I wanted to participate, not merely observe. And in my heart I knew my short-lived career as a journalist was over."

These words, spoken by Tonya Littlefield Cummings, '94, in accepting St. Bonaventure University's Mark Hellinger Award, startled and amazed the audience gathered for St. Bonaventure's 34th annual Mark Hellinger Awards Ceremony at The Plaza in New York City last October.

Cummings told of leaving her job as a general assignment reporter covering police and court beats, including four shootings, a dozen child sexual abuse cases and a quadruple drowning, to return to her hometown and a position at The ReHabilitation Center in Olean, N.Y.

"Today I am part of a team that is working to improve the quality of life for people with disabilities with every single one of the communications skills I learned at St. Bonaventure University and elsewhere for a cause I truly believe in," she said.

"A little over four years ago I graduated from high school with one thing on my mind — to get out. I wanted to get out of small town U.S.A., out of poverty-stricken rural America. The avenue of my escape was my ability to write," Cummings related.

"Four years later, I am back living in the community where I grew up. The town and way of life I swore I hated, I now call home and I know that I will still be calling it home 50 years from now. What





Dallas Townsend, the recipient of the 1991 Douglas Edwards Award, anchored the CBS World News Roundup on the CBS Radio Network for 25 years, covered all major national political conventions from 1948 through 1980 and covered numerous manned space launchings and space recoveries during a career that spanned nearly half a century.

Mr. Townsend joined CBS as a junior newswriter in 1941. After a hiatus in the Army during World War II, Mr. Townsend resumed working at CBS in a number of positions, including senior newswriter, editor, director of special events, manager of television news broadcasts and correspondent.

After his retirement from CBS in November 1985, he taught broadcast journalism at the S.I. Newhouse School of Public Communications at Syracuse University during the 1986 and 1987 fall semesters. He now teaches occasionally at New College, the Sarasota campus of the University of South Florida.

In describing his most memorable broadcast, Mr. Townsend relates: "The one that remains the most painfully vivid in my mind was the emergency broadcast running about 10 hours that followed the assassination of President Kennedy on November 22, 1963. Both emotionally and professionally, it was my most agonizing experience in broadcasting."

Mr. Townsend earned a bachelor's degree at Princeton University and a master's degree in journalism from Columbia University. He and his wife, Lois, have four married children and 10 grandchildren.



### JANE PAULEY

NBC News correspondent Jane Pauley has presented probing and compassionate interviews to millions of American viewers throughout her career at NBC News. She currently serves as correspondent and anchor for prime-time specials and documentaries, substitutes for Tom Brokaw as anchor of "NBC Nightly News," and has begun work on an NBC News prime-time magazine. Recent documentaries have included "The Eighties" in December 1989, which she co-anchored with Tom Brokaw, and "Changes: Conversations with Jane Pauley" in March 1990.

Pauley came to NBC News as co-anchor of "Today," a position she held for thirteen years, from October 1976 to December 1989. She shared newsmaking interviews first with "Today" anchor Tom Brokaw and later Bryant Gumbel. She was named, along with Gumbel, the 1986 Broadcaster of the Year by the International Radio and Television Society.

She was morning co-anchor, with "Today's" Jimmy Cefalo and NBC Sportscaster Gayle Gardner, of coverage of the 1988 Seoul Summer Olympics.

Pauley was the principal writer and reporter on the Sunday editions of "NBC Nightly News" from January 1980 until April 1982.

She co-anchored "Today" from such foreign locales as China, Japan, and Australia; from London for the weddings of Prince Charles and Prince Andrew; from Rio de Janeiro for its carnival week; throughout Europe aboard the Orient Express; and from Rome where "Today" televised its audience with Pope John Paul II. Her U.S. travel schedule has taken her to the major cities of the West Coast, to the East Coast from aboard the S.S. Norway, throughout the South and Midwest in May 1985 and to every national political convention since 1976.

Prior to joining "Today" she was co-anchor of the evening news on WMAQ-TV, the NBC Television Station in Chicago. She was the first woman to co-anchor a regularly scheduled weeknight news program in that city.

Pauley was born October 31, 1950 and raised in Indianapolis, IN. She is a graduate of Indiana University in Bloomington, where she received a bachelor's degree with a major in political science. After graduation, she returned to Indianapolis and worked in state politics. She began her broadcast career in 1972 as a reporter at WISH-TV, Indianapolis. A year later she began co-anchoring the midday news reports and anchoring the weekend news broadcasts. Three years later, in September 1975, she moved to WMAQ-TV.

Pauley and her husband, cartoonist/playwright Garry Trudeau, are the parents of three children. They reside in New York City.
